public house	People in general considered as a whole.
resident	A physician (especially an intern) who lives in a hospital and cares for hospitalized patients under the supervision of the medical staff of the hospital. <i>Arctic residents are joined annually by long distance migrants.</i>
saloon	A car that is closed and that has front and rear seats and two or four doors. <i>A four door saloon.</i>
<u>tavern</u>	An inn or pub. <i>He had spent some time in a nearby tavern and was drunk.</i>
wine bar	Fermented juice (of grapes especially).

Local as an Adjective

Definitions of "Local" as an adjective

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), "local" as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *Denoting a device that can be accessed without the use of a network.*
- *Of or belonging to or characteristic of a particular locality or neighborhood.*
- *Denoting a variable or other entity that is only available for use in one part of a program.*
- *Affecting only a restricted part or area of the body.*
- *(in technical use) relating to a particular region or part, or to each of any number of these.*
- *Relating or restricted to a particular area or one's neighbourhood.*
- *Relating to or applicable to or concerned with the administration of a city or town or*

district rather than a larger area.

- *Denoting a phone call made to a nearby place and charged at a relatively low rate.*
- *Denoting a train or bus serving a particular district, with frequent stops.*

- parochial** Having a limited or narrow outlook or scope.
*Their interests are too **parochial**.*
- provincial** Of or associated with a province.

- regional** Relating to the regions of a country rather than the capital.
***Regional** variations.*
- restricted** Restricted in meaning as e g man in a tall man.
*The mechanism of **restricted** virus replication.*

autonomous	Having the freedom to act independently. <i>The spread of autonomous robotic weaponry.</i>
borough	A town (as distinct from a city) with a corporation and privileges granted by a royal charter.
bucolic	Relating to shepherds or herdsmen or devoted to raising sheep or cattle. <i>The church is lovely for its bucolic setting.</i>
capital	A book written by Karl Marx (1867) describing his economic theories. <i>Our capital concern was to avoid defeat.</i>
city	A town created a city by charter and usually containing a cathedral. <i>The city council.</i>
commune	A territorial division similar to a French commune in other countries. <i>We all went out of Beijing by bus to spend a morning at a commune.</i>
community	Common ownership. <i>Preparing prisoners for life back in the community.</i>
constituency	An area whose voters elect a representative to a legislative body. <i>Most politicians are more interested in the voice of their constituency.</i>
county	Relating to or characteristic of aristocratic people with an ancestral home in a particular county. <i>The county has a population of 12 345 people.</i>
depopulate	Substantially reduce the population of (an area). <i>The epidemic depopulated the countryside.</i>
district	An area of a country or city, especially one characterized by a particular feature or activity. <i>An elegant shopping district.</i>
hamlet	A small settlement, generally one smaller than a village, and strictly (in Britain) one without a church.
localization	The process of making something local in character or restricting it to a particular place. <i>Differences in localization of growth control molecules in carcinoma.</i>
metropolitan	Relating to or denoting a metropolitan or his see. <i>A metropolitan bishop.</i>
municipal	Relating or belonging to or characteristic of a municipality. <i>National and municipal elections.</i>
municipality	The governing body of a municipality. <i>Voters in each municipality choose between four candidates.</i>

outskirts	Outlying areas (as of a city or town). <i>He built a new factory on the outskirts of Birmingham.</i>
populous	Having a large population; densely populated. <i>The populous city of Shanghai.</i>
prefecture	A prefect's office or tenure. <i>Enraged fans besieged the Prefecture of Police.</i>
<u>province</u>	A territory outside Italy under a Roman governor. <i>She knew little about wine that had been her father's province.</i>
<u>provincial</u>	Of or concerning the regions outside the capital city of a country, especially when regarded as unsophisticated or narrow-minded. <i>In that well educated company I felt uncomfortably provincial.</i>
<u>region</u>	The approximate amount of something usually used prepositionally as in in the region of. <i>Penguins inhabit the polar regions.</i>
<u>rural</u>	Of or relating to the countryside as opposed to the city. <i>An economy that is basically rural.</i>
<u>rustic</u>	Characteristic of rural life. <i>A rustic oak bench.</i>
<u>slum</u>	Spend time at a lower socio-economic level than one's own, motivated by curiosity or desire for adventure; usage considered condescending and insensitive. <i>The area was fast becoming a slum for the destitute.</i>
subdivide	Divide (something that has already been divided or that is a separate unit). <i>This apartment cannot be subdivided any further.</i>
suburban	Relating to or characteristic of or situated in suburbs. <i>Suburban life.</i>
<u>town</u>	The chief city or town of a region. <i>The whole town cheered the team.</i>
urban	In, relating to, or characteristic of a town or city. <i>Urban property owners.</i>
<u>village</u>	A self contained district or community within a town or city regarded as having features characteristic of village life. <i>The Olympic village.</i>
