conceited	Characteristic of false pride; having an exaggerated sense of self-importance. <i>A conceited fool.</i>
<u>condescending</u>	Having or showing an attitude of patronizing superiority. <i>A condescending smile.</i>
<u>contemptuous</u>	Showing contempt; scornful. <i>She was intolerant and contemptuous of the majority of the human race.</i>
disdainful	Expressing extreme contempt. <i>Some economists are disdainful of their colleagues in other social disciplines.</i>

elevated	Of high moral or intellectual value elevated in nature or style Oliver Franks. <i>An elevated temperature.</i>
eminent	(of a person) famous and respected within a particular sphere. <i>Eminent members of the community.</i>
<u>exalted</u>	Of high moral or intellectual value; elevated in nature or style. <i>An exalted ideal.</i>
fine	Characterized by elegance or refinement or accomplishment. <i>Fine rain.</i>
<u>gallant</u>	Grand or impressive. <i>They made a gallant array as they marched off.</i>
giant	Used in names of very large animals and plants e g giant hogweed giant tortoise. <i>Giant multinational corporations.</i>
grand	(in names of family relationships) denoting one generation removed in ascent or descent. <i>She was such a grand lady.</i>
<u>haughty</u>	Arrogantly superior and disdainful. <i>Haughty aristocrats.</i>
high	Used of sounds and voices high in pitch or frequency. <i>A high soprano voice.</i>
high-flown	Of high moral or intellectual value; elevated in nature or style- Oliver Franks.
high-minded	Of high moral or intellectual value; elevated in nature or style- Oliver Franks.
idealistic	Of or relating to the philosophical doctrine of the reality of ideas. <i>Idealistic young doctors who went to work for the rebels.</i>
majestic	Majestic in manner or bearing superior to mundane matters. <i>The majestic Canadian Rockies.</i>
<u>noble</u>	Having or showing fine personal qualities or high moral principles. <i>There is nothing more noble than a mature pine forest.</i>
noble-minded	Of high moral or intellectual value; elevated in nature or style- Oliver Franks.
patronizing	(used of behavior or attitude) characteristic of those who treat others with condescension. <i>He smiled in a rather patronizing manner.</i>

proud	Of an event achievement etc causing someone to feel proud. <i>We have a proud history of innovation.</i>
rarefied	(of air, especially that at high altitudes) of lower pressure than usual; thin. <i>Every ounce carried counts triple when you re trudging uphill in rarefied air.</i>
rarified	Having low density.
<u>scornful</u>	Feeling or expressing contempt or derision. <i>Scornful laughter.</i>
self-important	Having or showing feelings of unwarranted importance out of overbearing pride.
<u>snobbish</u>	Befitting or characteristic of those who incline to social exclusiveness and who rebuff the advances of people considered inferior. <i>The writer takes a rather snobbish tone.</i>
<u>soaring</u>	(of a bird) maintaining height in the air without flapping its wings. <i>The soaring spires of the cathedral.</i>
<u>sublime</u>	Of high moral or intellectual value; elevated in nature or style. <i>He had the sublime confidence of youth.</i>
supercilious	Having or showing arrogant superiority to and disdain of those one views as unworthy. <i>His mother eyed my clothes with a supercilious air.</i>
tall	Too improbable to admit of belief. <i>A tall broad shouldered man.</i>
towering	Of imposing height; especially standing out above others. <i>Hari looked up at the towering buildings.</i>
worthy	Worthy of being chosen especially as a spouse. <i>Behavior worthy of reprobation.</i>

altitude The apparent height of a celestial object above the horizon, measured in angular distance.

*The mechanism can freeze at **altitude**.*

apex The point in turning a corner when the vehicle is closest to the edge of the track.

*The **apex** of his career was in 1966 when he hoisted aloft the World Cup for England.*

apogee	The highest point in the development of something; a climax or culmination. <i>A film which was the apogee of German expressionist cinema.</i>
elevated	Of high moral or intellectual value elevated in nature or style. <i>This hotel has an elevated position above the village.</i>
elevation	The highest level or degree attainable; the highest stage of development. <i>His elevation to cardinal.</i>
gangling	Tall and thin and having long slender limbs. <i>A gangling youth with a trace of down on his cheeks.</i>
giddy	Excitable and frivolous. <i>Isobel s giddy young sister in law.</i>
height	The distance from head to foot. <i>It would be the height of bad manners not to attend the wedding.</i>
high	Being at or having a relatively great or specific elevation or upward extension sometimes used in combinations like knee high. <i>A high squeaky voice.</i>
ladder	With reference to tights or stockings develop or cause to develop a ladder. <i>The first time I put them on one of the stockings laddered.</i>
meridian	Relating to or situated at a meridian. <i>At the end of February Jupiter transits the meridian due south at 6 15 a m.</i>
minaret	Slender tower with balconies.
peak	A stiff brim at the front of a cap. <i>Whisk two egg whites to stiff peaks.</i>
pinnacle	Raise on or as if on a pinnacle. <i>He did not want to be pinnacled.</i>
plateau	An area of fairly level high ground. <i>The peace process had reached a plateau.</i>
raised	Embellished with a raised pattern created by pressure or embroidery. <i>As we age we are more likely to have raised blood pressure.</i>
rise	The property possessed by a slope or surface that rises. <i>Local people are worried by the rise in crime.</i>
rung	A strengthening crosspiece in the structure of a chair. <i>We must ensure that the low skilled do not get trapped on the bottom rung.</i>
skyscraper	A very tall building with many stories.
soaring	Increasing rapidly above the usual level. <i>The coloured trails of soaring rockets.</i>
stepladder	A folding portable ladder hinged at the top.

stilted	(of a manner of talking or writing) stiff and self-conscious or unnatural. <i>We made stilted conversation.</i>
<u>summit</u>	Reach the summit of a mountain. <i>Two binding treaties were agreed at the summit.</i>
tall	A garment size for a tall person. <i>He was over six feet tall.</i>
top	Cut the top off. <i>She bought a couple of new tops.</i>
towering	Of imposing height; especially standing out above others. <i>A majestic towering album.</i>
<u>up</u>	Raise or pick up something. <i>Every time up he had a different stance.</i>
<u>upper</u>	The higher of two berths. <i>The upper bunk.</i>
willowy	(of a person) tall, slim, and lithe. <i>A beautiful willowy blonde.</i>
<u>zenith</u>	The time at which something is most powerful or successful. <i>The sun was well past the zenith.</i>
