<b>elevated</b>	Of high moral or intellectual value elevated in nature or style Oliver Franks. <i>An <b>elevated</b> temperature.</i>
<b>eminent</b>	(of a person) famous and respected within a particular sphere. <i><b>Eminent</b> members of the community.</i>
<b>exalted</b>	Of high moral or intellectual value; elevated in nature or style. <i>An <b>exalted</b> ideal.</i>
<b>fine</b>	Characterized by elegance or refinement or accomplishment. <i><b>Fine</b> rain.</i>
<b>gallant</b>	Grand or impressive. <i>They made a <b>gallant</b> array as they marched off.</i>
<b>giant</b>	Used in names of very large animals and plants e g giant hogweed giant tortoise. <i><b>Giant</b> multinational corporations.</i>
<b>grand</b>	(in names of family relationships) denoting one generation removed in ascent or descent. <i>She was such a <b>grand</b> lady.</i>
<b>haughty</b>	Arrogantly superior and disdainful. <i><b>Haughty</b> aristocrats.</i>
<b>high</b>	Used of sounds and voices high in pitch or frequency. <i>A <b>high</b> soprano voice.</i>
<b>high-flown</b>	Of high moral or intellectual value; elevated in nature or style- Oliver Franks.
<b>high-minded</b>	Of high moral or intellectual value; elevated in nature or style- Oliver Franks.
<b>idealistic</b>	Of or relating to the philosophical doctrine of the reality of ideas. <i><b>Idealistic</b> young doctors who went to work for the rebels.</i>
<b>majestic</b>	Majestic in manner or bearing superior to mundane matters. <i>The <b>majestic</b> Canadian Rockies.</i>
<b>noble</b>	Having or showing fine personal qualities or high moral principles. <i>There is nothing more <b>noble</b> than a mature pine forest.</i>
<b>noble-minded</b>	Of high moral or intellectual value; elevated in nature or style- Oliver Franks.
<b>patronizing</b>	(used of behavior or attitude) characteristic of those who treat others with condescension. <i>He smiled in a rather <b>patronizing</b> manner.</i>

<b>proud</b>	Of an event achievement etc causing someone to feel proud. <i>We have a <b>proud</b> history of innovation.</i>
<b>rarefied</b>	(of air, especially that at high altitudes) of lower pressure than usual; thin. <i>Every ounce carried counts triple when you re trudging uphill in <b>rarefied</b> air.</i>
<b>rarified</b>	Having low density.
<b>scornful</b>	Feeling or expressing contempt or derision. <i><b>Scornful</b> laughter.</i>
<b>self-important</b>	Having or showing feelings of unwarranted importance out of overbearing pride.
<b>snobbish</b>	Befitting or characteristic of those who incline to social exclusiveness and who rebuff the advances of people considered inferior. <i>The writer takes a rather <b>snobbish</b> tone.</i>
<b>soaring</b>	(of a bird) maintaining height in the air without flapping its wings. <i>The <b>soaring</b> spires of the cathedral.</i>
<b>sublime</b>	Of high moral or intellectual value; elevated in nature or style. <i>He had the <b>sublime</b> confidence of youth.</i>
<b>supercilious</b>	Having or showing arrogant superiority to and disdain of those one views as unworthy. <i>His mother eyed my clothes with a <b>supercilious</b> air.</i>
<b>tall</b>	Too improbable to admit of belief. <i>A <b>tall</b> broad shouldered man.</i>
<b>towering</b>	Of imposing height; especially standing out above others. <i>Hari looked up at the <b>towering</b> buildings.</i>
<b>worthy</b>	Worthy of being chosen especially as a spouse. <i>Behavior <b>worthy</b> of reprobation.</i>

**apex** The point in turning a corner when the vehicle is closest to the edge of the track.

*The **apex** of his career was in 1966 when he hoisted aloft the World Cup for England.*

<b>apogee</b>	The highest point in the development of something; a climax or culmination. <i>A film which was the <b>apogee</b> of German expressionist cinema.</i>
<b>elevated</b>	Of high moral or intellectual value elevated in nature or style. <i>This hotel has an <b>elevated</b> position above the village.</i>
<b>elevation</b>	The highest level or degree attainable; the highest stage of development. <i>His <b>elevation</b> to cardinal.</i>
<b>gangling</b>	Tall and thin and having long slender limbs. <i>A <b>gangling</b> youth with a trace of down on his cheeks.</i>
<b>giddy</b>	Excitable and frivolous. <i>Isobel s <b>giddy</b> young sister in law.</i>
<b>height</b>	The distance from head to foot. <i>It would be the <b>height</b> of bad manners not to attend the wedding.</i>
<b>high</b>	Being at or having a relatively great or specific elevation or upward extension sometimes used in combinations like knee high. <i>A <b>high</b> squeaky voice.</i>
<b>ladder</b>	With reference to tights or stockings develop or cause to develop a ladder. <i>The first time I put them on one of the stockings <b>laddered</b>.</i>
<b>meridian</b>	Relating to or situated at a meridian. <i>At the end of February Jupiter transits the <b>meridian</b> due south at 6 15 a m.</i>
<b>minaret</b>	Slender tower with balconies.
<b>peak</b>	A stiff brim at the front of a cap. <i>Whisk two egg whites to stiff <b>peaks</b>.</i>
<b>pinnacle</b>	Raise on or as if on a pinnacle. <i>He did not want to be <b>pinnacled</b>.</i>
<b>plateau</b>	An area of fairly level high ground. <i>The peace process had reached a <b>plateau</b>.</i>
<b>raised</b>	Embellished with a raised pattern created by pressure or embroidery. <i>As we age we are more likely to have <b>raised</b> blood pressure.</i>
<b>rise</b>	The property possessed by a slope or surface that rises. <i>Local people are worried by the <b>rise</b> in crime.</i>
<b>rung</b>	A strengthening crosspiece in the structure of a chair. <i>We must ensure that the low skilled do not get trapped on the bottom <b>rung</b>.</i>
<b>skyscraper</b>	A very tall building with many stories.
<b>soaring</b>	Increasing rapidly above the usual level. <i>The coloured trails of <b>soaring</b> rockets.</i>
<b>stepladder</b>	A folding portable ladder hinged at the top.

<b>stilted</b>	(of a manner of talking or writing) stiff and self-conscious or unnatural. <i>We made <b>stilted</b> conversation.</i>
<b>summit</b>	Reach the summit of a mountain. <i>Two binding treaties were agreed at the <b>summit</b>.</i>
<b>tall</b>	A garment size for a tall person. <i>He was over six feet <b>tall</b>.</i>
<b>top</b>	Cut the top off. <i>She bought a couple of new <b>tops</b>.</i>
<b>towering</b>	Of imposing height; especially standing out above others. <i>A majestic <b>towering</b> album.</i>
<b>up</b>	Raise or pick up something. <i>Every time <b>up</b> he had a different stance.</i>
<b>upper</b>	The higher of two berths. <i>The <b>upper</b> bunk.</i>
<b>willowy</b>	(of a person) tall, slim, and lithe. <i>A beautiful <b>willowy</b> blonde.</i>
<b>zenith</b>	The time at which something is most powerful or successful. <i>The sun was well past the <b>zenith</b>.</i>
