<b>legitimate</b>	(of a sovereign) having a title based on strict hereditary right. <i>A <b>legitimate</b> male heir.</i>
<b>lucid</b>	Transparently clear; easily understandable- Robert Burton. <i>A <b>lucid</b> moment in his madness.</i>
<b>natural</b>	Existing in or in conformity with nature or the observable world neither supernatural nor magical. <i>A perfectly <b>natural</b> explanation.</i>
<b>objective</b>	(of a person or their judgement) not influenced by personal feelings or opinions in considering and representing facts. <i>A matter of <b>objective</b> fact.</i>
<b>only to be expected</b>	Being the only one; single and isolated from others.
<b>ordered</b>	Having a systematic arrangement; especially having elements succeeding in order according to rule. <i>An <b>ordered</b> sequence.</i>
<b>rational</b>	Capable of being expressed as a quotient of integers. <i>A <b>rational</b> analysis.</i>
<b>reasonable</b>	Having sound judgement; fair and sensible. <i>It seems a <b>reasonable</b> enough request.</i>
<b>reasoned</b>	Logically valid. <i>A <b>reasoned</b> judgement.</i>
<b>reasoning</b>	Endowed with the capacity to reason.
<b>sensible</b>	Able to notice or appreciate; not unaware of. <i>We are <b>sensible</b> of the difficulties he faces.</i>
<b>sound</b>	Complete; thorough. <i>A <b>sound</b> thrashing.</i>
<b>thinking</b>	Endowed with the capacity to reason. <i>He seemed a <b>thinking</b> man.</i>
<b>understandable</b>	Able to be understood. <i>Such fears are <b>understandable</b>.</i>
<b>unsurprising</b>	Not causing surprise. <i>The outcome of this sombre film is <b>unsurprising</b>.</i>
<b>valid</b>	(of an argument or point) having a sound basis in logic or fact; reasonable or cogent. <i>A <b>valid</b> inference.</i>
<b>well reasoned</b>	Wise or advantageous and hence advisable.

**well thought out** In good health especially after having suffered illness or injury.

<b>deductive</b>	Relating to logical deduction. <i><b>Deductive</b> reasoning.</i>
<b><u>empirical</u></b>	Relying on medical quackery. <i>They provided considerable <b>empirical</b> evidence to support their argument.</i>
<b>empiricism</b>	The theory that all knowledge is based on experience derived from the senses. Stimulated by the rise of experimental science, it developed in the 17th and 18th centuries, expounded in particular by John Locke, George Berkeley, and David Hume.
<b><u>experimental</u></b>	Relating to or based on experiment. <i><b>Experimental</b> results.</i>
<b>extrapolate</b>	Estimate the value of. <i>It is always dangerous to <b>extrapolate</b> from a sample.</i>
<b>extrapolation</b>	Calculation of the value of a function outside the range of known values. <i><b>Extrapolation</b> of the logarithmic curve yielded an estimate of 66 species.</i>
<b>fatuity</b>	A ludicrous folly.
<b>inductive</b>	Of reasoning; proceeding from particular facts to a general conclusion. <i>Instinct rather than <b>inductive</b> reasoning marked her approach to life.</i>
<b><u>infer</u></b>	Reason by deduction; establish by deduction. <i>From these facts we can <b>infer</b> that crime has been increasing.</i>
<b>inference</b>	The process of inferring something. <i>His emphasis on order and health and by <b>inference</b> cleanliness.</i>
<b>logic</b>	The system of operations performed by a computer that underlies the machine's representation of logical operations. <i>The <b>logic</b> of the argument is faulty.</i>
<b>materialism</b>	The philosophical theory that matter is the only reality. <i>They hated the sinful <b>materialism</b> of the wicked city.</i>
<b>objectively</b>	With objectivity. <i>The physical world we think of as <b>objectively</b> true.</i>
<b>observational</b>	Relying on observation or experiment. <i>A master of <b>observational</b> comedy.</i>
<b>positivism</b>	A humanistic religious system founded on positivism.
<b>ratiocinate</b>	Form judgements by a process of logic; reason. <i>A tendency to <b>ratiocinate</b> in isolation.</i>
<b>ratiocination</b>	Logical and methodical reasoning.
<b>rationalism</b>	The doctrine that knowledge is acquired by reason without resort to experience. <i>Scientific <b>rationalism</b>.</i>

- reasonable** (of a price or product) not too expensive.  
*It seems a **reasonable** enough request.*
- reasoning** Thinking that is coherent and logical.  
*He explained the **reasoning** behind his decision at a media conference.*
- speculation** Investment in stocks, property, etc. in the hope of gain but with the risk of loss.  
*He was a millionaire from **speculations** on the stock market.*
- sylogistic** Of or relating to or consisting of syllogism.
- utilitarianism** The doctrine that actions are right if they are useful or for the benefit of a majority.
- verifiable** Able to be checked or demonstrated to be true, accurate, or justified.  
*An easily **verifiable** claim.*
