Definitions of "Lone" as an adjective

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “lone” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *Lacking the support of others; isolated.*
- *Being the only one; single and isolated from others.*
- *Having no companions; solitary or single.*
- *(of a parent) not having a partner to share the care of one's child or children.*
- *Lacking companions or companionship.*
- *Characterized by or preferring solitude.*
- *(of a place) unfrequented and remote.*



Synonyms of "Lone" as an adjective (30 Words)

all alone	Quantifier; used with either mass or count nouns to indicate the whole number or amount of or every one of a class.
alone	Having no one else present. <i>Cannot live by bread alone.</i>
barren	Completely wanting or lacking. <i>The sports hall turned out to be a rather barren concrete building.</i>
companionless	Having no companion; lacking companions.
<u>deserted</u>	(of a place) empty of people. <i>Deserted beaches of soft sand.</i>
desolate	Feeling or showing great unhappiness or loneliness. <i>A low desolate wail.</i>
godforsaken	Lacking any merit or attraction. <i>What are you doing in this godforsaken place.</i>

in the back of beyond	Directed or bound inward.
in the middle of nowhere	Currently fashionable.
isolated	Remote and separate physically or socially- W.H.Hudson. <i>Tiny isolated villages remote from centers of civilization.</i>
lonely	Without companions; solitary. <i>A lonely existence.</i>
lonesome	Marked by dejection from being alone. <i>Lonesome when her husband is away.</i>
marooned	Cut off or left behind. <i>Travelers marooned by the blizzard.</i>
off the beaten track	Below a satisfactory level.
only	Being the only one single and isolated from others. <i>An only child.</i>
out of the way	Outside or external.
remote	Alloof and unfriendly in manner. <i>A remote possibility.</i>
secluded	Hidden from general view or use. <i>The gardens are quiet and secluded.</i>
sequestered	Providing privacy or seclusion. <i>A sequestered jury.</i>
single	Being or characteristic of a single thing or person. <i>Judging a contest with a single eye.</i>
sole	Not divided or shared with others. <i>Sole rights of publication.</i>
solitary	Of plants and animals; not growing or living in groups or colonies. <i>We have not a solitary shred of evidence to go on.</i>
solo	(of a motorbike) without a sidecar. <i>He released his second solo album.</i>
unaccompanied	(of a state or an event) taking place without something specified occurring at the same time. <i>A headache unaccompanied by other symptoms.</i>
unattached	Able to swim about; not attached. <i>Local people unattached to any organization.</i>
unescorted	Not escorted. <i>Children unescorted by an adult.</i>

unfrequented	(of a place) visited only rarely. <i>A trail leading to an unfrequented lake.</i>
<u>uninhabited</u>	Not having inhabitants; not lived in. <i>An uninhabited island.</i>
unmarried	Not married or related to the unmarried state. <i>Unmarried life.</i>
unpopulated	(of a printed circuit board) having no components fitted. <i>Vast unpopulated plains.</i>

alone	Having no one else present. <i>The pillar stood alone supporting nothing.</i>
cloistered	Kept away from the outside world; sheltered. <i>A cloistered upbringing.</i>
<u>forlorn</u>	Marked by or showing hopelessness. <i>A forlorn cause.</i>

hermit	One retired from society for religious reasons.
idiosyncratic	Relating to idiosyncrasy; peculiar or individual. <i>Michelangelo s highly idiosyncratic style of painting.</i>
individual	Characteristic of a particular person or thing. <i>Mark the individual pages.</i>
individuality	Separate existence. <i>Clothes with real style and individuality.</i>
individuation	Discriminating the individual from the generic group or species.
isolate	A culture of microorganisms isolated for study. <i>The best way to isolate sick fish is to set up a hospital tank.</i>
isolated	Single; exceptional. <i>Isolated patients.</i>
isolation	A country's withdrawal from international politics. <i>He opposed a policy of American isolation.</i>
lonely	Characterized by or preferring solitude. <i>A lonely country lane.</i>
lonesome	Marked by dejection from being alone. <i>A lonesome unfriendly place.</i>
privacy	The state of being free from public attention. <i>A law to restrict newspapers freedom to invade people s privacy.</i>
purely	Restricted to something. <i>The purpose of the meeting was purely to give information.</i>
recluse	Favouring a solitary life. <i>She has turned into a virtual recluse.</i>
remote	A remote control device. <i>Universal remotes which let you operate all your audio video components from one handset.</i>
respectively	Separately or individually and in the order already mentioned (used when enumerating two or more items or facts that refer back to a previous statement). <i>The brothers were called Felix and Max respectively.</i>
seclude	Keep away from others. <i>I secluded myself up here for a life of study and meditation.</i>
secluded	Hidden from general view or use. <i>The gardens are quiet and secluded.</i>
seclusion	The act of secluding yourself from others. <i>They enjoyed ten days of peace and seclusion.</i>

separated	Separated at the joint. <i>Thought of herself as alone and separated from the others.</i>
<u>sequester</u>	A general cut in government spending. <i>The estate was sequestered.</i>
<u>single</u>	Hit a single. <i>The studio was a single large room.</i>
<u>sole</u>	Put a new sole on. <i>The sole heir.</i>
<u>solitary</u>	Characterized by or preferring solitude. <i>Tigers are essentially solitary.</i>
troglydyte	A hermit.
<u>unappreciated</u>	Not likely to be rewarded. <i>She had been brought up in a family where she felt unappreciated and undervalued.</i>
unrewarding	Not rewarding or satisfying. <i>It was dull unrewarding work.</i>
unshared	Not shared. <i>Most of those placed in hostels would prefer unshared independent accommodation.</i>
