companionless	Having no companion; lacking companions.
<u>deserted</u>	(of a place) empty of people. <b>Deserted</b> beaches of soft sand.
desolate	Feeling or showing great unhappiness or loneliness. A low <b>desolate</b> wail.
godforsaken	Lacking any merit or attraction. What are you doing in this <b>godforsaken</b> place.

in the middle of nowhere	e Currently fashionable.

lonely	Without companions; solitary. A <b>lonely</b> existence.
lonesome	Marked by dejection from being alone. <i>Lonesome</i> when her husband is away.
marooned	Cut off or left behind. Travelers <b>marooned</b> by the blizzard.
off the beaten track	Below a satisfactory level.
<u>only</u>	Being the only one single and isolated from others. An <b>only</b> child.
out of the way	Outside or external.
<u>remote</u>	Aloof and unfriendly in manner. A <b>remote</b> possibility.
secluded	Hidden from general view or use. The gardens are quiet and <b>secluded</b> .
sequestered	Providing privacy or seclusion. A <b>sequestered</b> jury.
<u>single</u>	Being or characteristic of a single thing or person. Judging a contest with a <b>single</b> eye.
<u>sole</u>	Not divided or shared with others. <i>Sole</i> rights of publication.
<u>solitary</u>	Of plants and animals; not growing or living in groups or colonies. We have not a <b>solitary</b> shred of evidence to go on.
<u>solo</u>	(of a motorbike) without a sidecar. He released his second <b>solo</b> album.
unaccompanied	(of a state or an event) taking place without something specified occurring at the same time. A headache <b>unaccompanied</b> by other symptoms.
unattached	Able to swim about; not attached. Local people <b>unattached</b> to any organization.
unescorted	Not escorted. Children <b>unescorted</b> by an adult.



unfrequented	(of a place) visited only rarely. A trail leading to an <b>unfrequented</b> lake.
<u>uninhabited</u>	Not having inhabitants; not lived in. An <b>uninhabited</b> island.
unmarried	Not married or related to the unmarried state. <b>Unmarried</b> life.
unpopulated	(of a printed circuit board) having no components fitted. <i>Vast <b>unpopulated</b> plains.</i>

respectively	Separately or individually and in the order already mentioned (used when enumerating two or more items or facts that refer back to a previous statement. The brothers were called Felix and Max <b>respectively</b> .
seclude	Keep away from others. I <b>seclude</b> d myself up here for a life of study and meditation.
secluded	Hidden from general view or use. The gardens are quiet and <b>secluded</b> .
seclusion	The act of secluding yourself from others. They enjoyed ten days of peace and <b>seclusion</b> .



separated	Separated at the joint. Thought of herself as alone and <b>separated</b> from the others.
<u>sequester</u>	A general cut in government spending. <i>The estate was <b>sequester</b>ed.</i>
<u>single</u>	Hit a single. The studio was a <b>single</b> large room.
<u>sole</u>	Put a new sole on. The <b>sole</b> heir.
<u>solitary</u>	Characterized by or preferring solitude. <i>Tigers are essentially <b>solitary</b>.</i>
troglodyte	A hermit.
<u>unappreciated</u>	Not likely to be rewarded. She had been brought up in a family where she felt <b>unappreciated</b> and undervalued.
unrewarding	Not rewarding or satisfying. It was dull <b>unrewarding</b> work.
unshared	Not shared. Most of those placed in hostels would prefer <b>unshared</b> independent accommodation.
