Associations of "Long lasting" (30 Words)

abiding	Lasting a long time. <i>He had an abiding respect for her.</i>
changeless	Not subject or susceptible to change or variation in form or quality or nature. <i>Changeless truths.</i>
constant	A quantity or parameter that does not change its value whatever the value of the variables, under a given set of conditions. <i>These discs rotate at a constant speed.</i>
<u>continually</u>	Seemingly without interruption. <i>I was continually moving around.</i>
continued	Without a break in continuity; ongoing. <i>The continued existence of nationalism.</i>
continuing	Without a break in continuity; ongoing. <i>A continuing controversy.</i>
continuous	(of a function) of which the graph is a smooth unbroken curve, i.e. one such that as the value of x approaches any given value a, the value of f(x) approaches that of f(a) as a limit. <i>A continuous line has no gaps or breaks in it.</i>
continuously	Without interruption or gaps. <i>These images loop continuously.</i>
endless	Having or seeming to have no end or limit. <i>Endless loop cassette tapes.</i>
<u>endlessly</u>	All the time; seemingly without stopping. <i>The original episodes were endlessly repeated.</i>
<u>enduring</u>	Lasting over a period of time; durable. <i>He formed a number of enduring relationships with women.</i>

eternal	Seeming to last or persist forever, especially on account of being tedious or annoying. <i>She is an eternal optimist.</i>
ever	At all times all the time and on every occasion. <i>Our biggest ever range.</i>
everlasting	Without qualification; used informally as (often pejorative) intensifiers. <i>An everlasting reminder of this evening.</i>
forever	Lasting or permanent. <i>She took forever to write the paper.</i>
incessant	Uninterrupted in time and indefinitely long continuing. <i>The incessant beat of the music.</i>
incessantly	With unflagging resolve. <i>She talked about him incessantly.</i>
indefinitely	To an unlimited or unspecified degree or extent. <i>Talks cannot go on indefinitely.</i>
ineradicable	Unable to be destroyed or removed. <i>Ineradicable superstitions.</i>
interminable	Endless or apparently endless (often used hyperbolically). <i>An interminable sermon.</i>
permanence	The state or quality of lasting or remaining unchanged indefinitely. <i>The clarity and permanence of the dyes.</i>
permanency	The property of being able to exist for an indefinite duration.
permanent	Lasting or intended to last or remain unchanged indefinitely. <i>A permanent ban on the dumping of radioactive waste at sea.</i>
perpetual	(of a plant) blooming or fruiting several times in one season. <i>A perpetual secretary of the society.</i>
perpetuation	The act of prolonging something. <i>Perpetuation of the species is our purpose.</i>
prolongation	Amount or degree or range to which something extends. <i>There was an indefinite prolongation of the peace talks.</i>
steady	In a steady manner. <i>A steady increase.</i>
unceasing	Continuing forever or indefinitely. <i>The unceasing efforts of the staff.</i>
unceasingly	With unflagging resolve.
