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| continued | Without a break in continuity; ongoing. <i>He asked for their continued support.</i> |
| continuously | With unflagging resolve. <i>These images loop continuously.</i> |
| detour | Avoid by taking a detour. <i>He detoured around the walls.</i> |
| elongate | Long in relation to width elongated. <i>The old man s gaunt and elongated frame.</i> |
| elongated | Having notably more length than width; being long and slender. <i>The old man s gaunt and elongated frame.</i> |
| endless | Tiresomely long; seemingly without end. <i>An endless conversation.</i> |
| endlessly | With unflagging resolve. <i>The original episodes were endlessly repeated.</i> |
| enduring | Unceasing. <i>He formed a number of enduring relationships with women.</i> |
| ever | At all times all the time and on every occasion. <i>Having to borrow ever larger sums.</i> |
| extend | Extend in scope or range or area. <i>My land extends over the hills on the horizon.</i> |
| extended | Fully extended or stretched forth. <i>The extended airport runways can accommodate larger planes.</i> |
| extensible | Designed to allow the addition of new capabilities and functionality. <i>An extensible architecture designed to accommodate changes.</i> |
| forever | For all future time; for always. <i>We had to wait forever and a day.</i> |

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| incessantly | With unflagging resolve. <i>She talked about him incessantly.</i> |
| indefinitely | To an unlimited or unspecified degree or extent. <i>Talks cannot go on indefinitely.</i> |
| infinitely | To a very great degree; immensely. <i>There are issues here that could be expanded infinitely.</i> |
| interminable | Tiresomely long; seemingly without end. <i>We got bogged down in interminable discussions.</i> |
| length | The length of a horse boat etc as a measure of the lead in a race. <i>The length of the syllable is isomorphic with the length of the syllabic vowel.</i> |
| lengthen | Make or become longer. <i>In the spring when the days are lengthening.</i> |
| lengthy | Relatively long in duration; tediously protracted. <i>Lengthy delays.</i> |
| perpetual | (of an investment) having no fixed maturity date; irredeemable. <i>Deep caves in perpetual darkness.</i> |
| perpetuation | The act of prolonging something. <i>We criticized the perpetuation of racial stereotypes.</i> |
| postpone | Hold back to a later time. <i>The visit had to be postponed for some time.</i> |
| prolongation | Amount or degree or range to which something extends. <i>An agreement on further prolongation of the boundary proved difficult.</i> |
| prolonged | Continuing for a long time or longer than usual; lengthy. <i>The region suffered a prolonged drought.</i> |
| protracted | Relatively long in duration tediously protracted. <i>Protracted negotiations.</i> |
| stretch | Make long or longer by pulling and stretching. <i>There were stretches of boredom.</i> |
| stretched | (of muscles) relieved of stiffness by stretching. <i>Well stretched muscles are less susceptible to injury.</i> |
| stretching | Exercise designed to extend the limbs and muscles to their full extent. |
| unceasingly | With unflagging resolve. |
