| appear | Appear as a character on stage or appear in a play etc. <i>He appeared on Broadway.</i> |
| askance | With an attitude or look of suspicion or disapproval. <i>Her eyes with their misted askance look.</i> |
| browse | Reading superficially or at random. <i>They reach upward to browse on bushes.</i> |
| contented | Feeling or expressing happiness or satisfaction. <i>She gave a contented little smile.</i> |
| descend | Come from; be connected by a relationship of blood, for example. <i>A side road descended into the forest.</i> |
| descending | Moving or sloping downwards. <i>A passage of descending chords.</i> |
| descent | An unexpected visit. <i>A descent on the Channel ports.</i> |
| falling | Becoming lower or less in degree or value. <i>Falling standards.</i> |
| fixate | Cause (someone) to develop an obsessive attachment to someone or something. <i>Her eyes fixated on a point on the horizon.</i> |
| gape | A disease of birds with gaping of the mouth as a symptom caused by infestation with gapeworm. <i>A gape of the jaws.</i> |
| gawk | An awkward stupid person. <i>They were gawking at some pin up.</i> |
| gaze | A long fixed look. <i>He turned following her gaze.</i> |

| glance | Throw a glance at take a brief look at. <i>Fish sporting with quick glance Show to the Sun their wavy coats.</i> |
| <u>glimpse</u> | Catch a glimpse of or see briefly. <i>She caught a glimpse of the ocean.</i> |
| hairstyle | A particular way in which a person's hair is cut or arranged. |
| <u>low</u> | Low or inferior in station or quality. <i>I was feeling low.</i> |
| observing | Quick to notice; showing quick and keen perception. |
| onlooker | Someone who looks on. <i>A crowd of fascinated onlookers.</i> |
| <u>peek</u> | Look quickly or furtively. <i>I only peeked I didn't see anything interesting.</i> |
| probation | (law) a way of dealing with offenders without imprisoning them; a defendant found guilty of a crime is released by the court without imprisonment subject to conditions imposed by the court. <i>Probation is part of the sentencing process.</i> |
| <u>rummage</u> | Search unsystematically and untidily through something. <i>Open up the box and have a rummage around.</i> |
| searching | Having keenness and forcefulness and penetration in thought, expression, or intellect. <i>You have to ask yourselves some searching questions.</i> |
| <u>seem</u> | Seem to be true probable or apparent. <i>He couldn't seem to remember his lines.</i> |
| sidelong | To or from one side; sideways. <i>He looked sidelong at her with a quick smile.</i> |
| sideways | At an angle. <i>Leaning sideways.</i> |
| <u>smug</u> | Marked by excessive complacency or self-satisfaction. <i>A smug glow of self-congratulation.</i> |
| squint | The act of squinting looking with the eyes partly closed. <i>I had a bad squint.</i> |
| <u>stare</u> | Fixate one's eyes. <i>The students stared at the teacher with amazement.</i> |
| <u>staring</u> | Open and fixed as if in fear or wonder. <i>Staring eyes.</i> |

watch

A watchman or group of watchmen who patrolled and guarded the streets of a town before the introduction of the police force.

*In spring and summer **watch** for kingfishers.*
