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Associations of "Looked down upon" (30 Words)

appear	Appear as a character on stage or appear in a play etc. <i>The symbol appears in many paintings of the period.</i>
<u>askance</u>	With a side or oblique glance. <i>The reformers looked askance at the mystical tradition.</i>
<u>browse</u>	Shop around; not necessarily buying. <i>This book is a useful browse for a new worker in the field.</i>
contented	Satisfied or showing satisfaction with things as they are. <i>A contented smile.</i>
descend	(of a road, path, or flight of steps) slope or lead downwards. <i>The militia descended on Rye.</i>
descending	Moving or sloping downwards. <i>A rocky descending path.</i>
<u>descent</u>	A downward slope or bend. <i>The ancient empire s slow descent into barbarism.</i>
<u>falling</u>	Becoming lower or less in degree or value. <i>Falling incomes.</i>
fixate	(in Freudian theory) arrest (a person or their libidinal energy) at an immature stage, causing an obsessive attachment. <i>Erotomaniacs are convinced that the person they have fixated on loves them in return.</i>
gape	A disease of birds with gaping of the mouth as a symptom caused by infestation with gapeworm. <i>A large duffel bag gaped open by her feet.</i>
<u>gawk</u>	An awkward stupid person. <i>They were gawking at some pin up.</i>
<u>gaze</u>	A long fixed look. <i>Offices screened from the public gaze.</i>

glance	Throw a glance at take a brief look at. <i>I stole a glance at John.</i>
<u>glimpse</u>	Catch a glimpse of or see briefly. <i>She caught a glimpse of the ocean.</i>
hairstyle	A particular way in which a person's hair is cut or arranged.
<u>low</u>	Low or inferior in station or quality. <i>Low ceilings.</i>
observing	Quick to notice; showing quick and keen perception.
onlooker	Someone who looks on. <i>A crowd of fascinated onlookers.</i>
<u>peek</u>	A secret look. <i>She sneaked a peek at the map.</i>
probation	(law) a way of dealing with offenders without imprisoning them; a defendant found guilty of a crime is released by the court without imprisonment subject to conditions imposed by the court. <i>Probation is part of the sentencing process.</i>
<u>rummage</u>	A jumble of things to be given away. <i>He gave the attic a good rummage but couldn't find his skis.</i>
searching	Diligent and thorough in inquiry or investigation. <i>Searching insights.</i>
<u>seem</u>	Seem to be true probable or apparent. <i>I seem to remember giving you very precise instructions.</i>
sidelong	To, toward or at one side. <i>Sidelong glances.</i>
sideways	To, toward or at one side. <i>A picture lit sideways.</i>
<u>smug</u>	Having or showing an excessive pride in oneself or one's achievements. <i>He was feeling smug after his win.</i>
squint	Be cross eyed have a squint or strabismus. <i>Let me have a squint.</i>
<u>stare</u>	A long fixed or vacant look. <i>She gave him a cold stare.</i>
<u>staring</u>	Open and fixed as if in fear or wonder. <i>Staring eyes.</i>
<u>watch</u>	The officers and crew on duty during a watch. <i>I guess I can rest a while with you here to watch over me.</i>
