## **Loom as a Verb**

### **Definitions of "Loom" as a verb**

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “loom” as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Appear very large or occupy a commanding position.*
- *Weave on a loom.*
- *Hang over, as of something threatening, dark, or menacing.*
- *Come into view indistinctly, often threateningly.*



## Synonyms of "Loom" as a verb (6 Words)

### **brood**

Hang over, as of something threatening, dark, or menacing.  
*The terrible vision **brooded** over her all day long.*

### **bulk large**

Stick out or up.

### **hover**

Move to and fro.  
*She **hovered** anxiously in the background.*

### **hulk**

Appear very large or occupy a commanding position.

### **predominate**

Be the strongest or main element; be greater in number or amount.  
*Private interest was not allowed to **predominate** over the public good.*

### **tower**

Rise to or reach a great height.  
*He seemed to **tower** over everyone else.*

- *Another air plane loomed into the sky.*
- *Materials loomed in Egypt.*

<b>aboveground</b>	On or above the surface of the ground. <i><b>Aboveground</b> nuclear testing.</i>
<b>appear</b>	Come into being or existence or appear on the scene. <i>Gielgud <b>appears</b> briefly in this movie.</i>
<b>betide</b>	Happen to (someone). <i>I waited with beating heart not knowing what would <b>betide</b>.</i>
<b>blur</b>	Make unclear indistinct or blurred. <i>The haze <b>blurs</b> the hills.</i>
<b>blurred</b>	Unable to see or be seen clearly. <i>The <b>blurred</b> aims of the group.</i>
<b>blurry</b>	Perceived or remembered indistinctly. <i>There s a very <b>blurry</b> line between art and advertising.</i>
<b>concealed</b>	Not accessible to view. <i>A <b>concealed</b> compartment in his briefcase.</i>
<b>dim</b>	Make dim or lusterless. <i>His eyes <b>dimmed</b>.</i>

<b>dimly</b>	In a way that is not clearly perceived or recalled. <i>We perceived the change only <b>dimly</b>.</i>
<b>emerge</b>	(of an insect or other invertebrate) break out from an egg, cocoon, or pupal case. <i>Some nice results <b>emerged</b> from the study.</i>
<b>esoteric</b>	Intended for or likely to be understood by only a small number of people with a specialized knowledge or interest. <i>A compilation of <b>esoteric</b> philosophical theories.</i>
<b>faint</b>	Feeling weak and dizzy and close to losing consciousness. <i>Suddenly felt <b>faint</b> from the pain.</i>
<b>hazy</b>	Indistinct or hazy in outline. <i>It was a beautiful day but quite <b>hazy</b>.</i>
<b>hidden</b>	Not accessible to view. <i>Her <b>hidden</b> feelings.</i>
<b>inconspicuous</b>	Not prominent or readily noticeable. <i>He pushed the string through an <b>inconspicuous</b> hole.</i>
<b>indistinct</b>	Not clearly defined or easy to perceive or understand. <i>Only <b>indistinct</b> notions of what to do.</i>
<b>invisible</b>	Invisible exports and imports. <i><b>Invisible</b> exports.</i>
<b>lightproof</b>	Not penetrable by light. <i>A <b>lightproof</b> envelope.</i>
<b>noncommittal</b>	Refusing to bind oneself to a particular course of action or view or the like. <i>Her boyfriend was <b>noncommittal</b> about their future together.</i>
<b>obscure</b>	Make obscure or unclear. <i>An <b>obscure</b> turn of phrase.</i>
<b>potential</b>	Latent qualities or abilities that may be developed and lead to future success or usefulness. <i>The <b>potentials</b> of the technology were never wholly controllable.</i>
<b>questionable</b>	Subject to question. <i>A <b>questionable</b> reputation.</i>
<b>recondite</b>	(of a subject or knowledge) little known; abstruse. <i>Some <b>recondite</b> problem in historiography.</i>
<b>seem</b>	Seem to be true probable or apparent. <i>It would <b>seem</b> that he has been fooling us all.</i>
<b>subtlety</b>	The quality or state of being subtle. <i>You had to admire the <b>subtlety</b> of the distinctions he drew.</i>



**unclear** Having or feeling doubt or confusion.  
*The law itself was **unclear** on that point.*

**unobtrusive** Not conspicuous or attracting attention.  
*A quiet **unobtrusive** life of self denial.*

**vague** Not clearly understood or expressed-Anatole Broyard- P.A.So.  
*He had been very **vague** about his activities.*

**vaguely** In a way that is uncertain, indefinite or unclear; roughly.  
*He looked **vaguely** familiar.*

**wispy** Thin and weak.  
*A **wispy** little fellow with small hands and feet.*
