- A man of noble rank or high office; a nobleman.
- Used in compound titles of other people of authority.
- Terms referring to the Judeo-Christian God.
- (in the UK) the House of Lords, or its members collectively.
- (in the UK) a title given formally to a baron, and less formally to a marquess, earl, or viscount (prefixed to a family or territorial name).

<u>captain</u>	The pilot in command of a civil aircraft. <i>He did very well academically becoming school captain.</i>
chief	The upper third of the field. <i>A union chief.</i>
<u>commander</u>	A rank of naval officer above lieutenant commander and below captain. <i>The commander of a paratroop regiment.</i>

<u>emperor</u>	The male ruler of an empire. <i>He became emperor in 1930.</i>
god almighty	Any supernatural being worshipped as controlling some part of the world or some aspect of life or who is the personification of a force.
godhead	Terms referring to the Judeo-Christian God. <i>There on a skateboard was America s current godhead.</i>
governor	The head of a state government. <i>The governor of the Bank of England.</i>
grandee	A Spanish or Portuguese nobleman of the highest rank. <i>Several City grandees and eminent lawyers.</i>
jehovah	A name for the God of the Old Testament as transliterated from the Hebrew consonants YHVH.
<u>king</u>	One of the four playing cards in a deck bearing the picture of a king. <i>A country where football is king.</i>
leader	(in the UK) a member of the government officially responsible for initiating business in the House of Commons or House of Lords. <i>A leader in the use of video conferencing.</i>
liege	A feudal superior or sovereign. <i>The king s lieges.</i>
liege lord	A person holding a fief; a person who owes allegiance and service to a feudal lord.
lord and master	A titled peer of the realm.
maker	A business engaged in manufacturing some product. <i>A cabinetmaker.</i>
master	Someone who holds a master s degree from academic institution. <i>I had a master s in computer engineering.</i>
monarch	A sovereign head of state, especially a king, queen, or emperor. <i>This followed an attempt by the deposed monarch to regain his throne.</i>

<u>noble</u>	Especially in former times a person of noble rank or birth. <i>The king imposed a tax on both nobles and peasants.</i>
nobleman	A titled peer of the realm.
<u>overlord</u>	A person who has general authority over others. <i>The undisputed overlord of the crime family.</i>
patrician	An aristocrat or nobleman.
<u>peer</u>	A nobleman duke or marquis or earl or viscount or baron who is a member of the British peerage.
potentate	A ruler who is unconstrained by law.
prince	A close male relative of a monarch, especially a grandson. <i>He was the prince of a small kingdom that was now part of Pakistan.</i>
<u>ruler</u>	Measuring stick consisting of a strip of wood or metal or plastic with a straight edge that is used for drawing straight lines and measuring lengths.
<u>sovereign</u>	A supreme ruler, especially a monarch. <i>The Emperor became the first Japanese sovereign to visit Britain.</i>
superior	A person superior to another in rank or status especially a colleague in a higher position. <i>Obeying their superiors orders.</i>
suzerain	A sovereign or state having some control over another state that is internally autonomous.
the almighty	Terms referring to the Judeo-Christian God.
the deity	Any supernatural being worshipped as controlling some part of the world or some aspect of life or who is the personification of a force.
the father	The founder of a family.

<u>king</u>	Used in names of animals and plants that are particularly large e g king cobra. <i>The king of rock.</i>
<u>kingdom</u>	A domain in which something is dominant. <i>The kingdom of dreams.</i>
liege	City in eastern Belgium; largest French-speaking city in Belgium. <i>An oath of fealty and liege homage.</i>
monarchy	An autocracy governed by a monarch who usually inherits the authority. <i>The monarchy is the focus of loyalty and service.</i>
nobleman	A man who belongs by rank, title, or birth to the aristocracy; a peer.
nominally	In name only. <i>The Republicans nominally controlled both houses of Congress but by slim margins.</i>
<u>overlord</u>	A ruler, especially a feudal lord. <i>The undisputed overlord of the crime family.</i>
papal	Relating to a pope or to the papacy. <i>Papal dispensation.</i>
pontiff	The Pope. <i>The Pope s first visit to Poland as pontiff.</i>
pontifical	Characterized by a pompous air of infallibility. <i>A pontifical commission.</i>
pope	The head of the Roman Catholic Church.
possessor	A person who takes, occupies, or holds something without necessarily having ownership, or as distinguished from the owner. <i>His father was the possessor of a considerable fortune.</i>
prince	A male monarch of a small state, actually, nominally, or originally subject to a king or emperor. <i>He was the prince of a small kingdom that was now part of Pakistan.</i>
principality	(in traditional Christian angelology) the fifth-highest order of the ninefold celestial hierarchy.

<u>proprietor</u>	Someone who owns (is legal possessor of) a business. <i>Chinese restaurant proprietors.</i>
regency	The particular period of a regency especially in Britain from 1811 to 1820 and in France from 1715 to 1723. <i>The boy being a minor there would have to be a regency.</i>
<u>ruler</u>	A person exercising government or dominion.
<u>sovereign</u>	A former British gold coin worth one pound sterling, now only minted for commemorative purposes. <i>The Emperor became the first Japanese sovereign to visit Britain.</i>
tyrannize	Rule a country as a tyrant. <i>He tyrannizes over the servants.</i>
vassal	A person holding a fief; a person who owes allegiance and service to a feudal lord. <i>A vassal state of the Ottoman Empire.</i>
viceroys	A ruler exercising authority in a colony on behalf of a sovereign.
viscount	A son or younger brother or a count.
