## Lovingly as an Adverb

### Definitions of "Lovingly" as an adverb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “lovingly” as an adverb can have the following definitions:

- *With love or great care.*
- *With fondness; with love.*



### Synonyms of "Lovingly" as an adverb (1 Word)

**fondly** With fondness; with love.  
They **fondly** believed the cheers were for them.





## Usage Examples of "Lovingly" as an adverb

- A lovingly restored building.
- They smile lovingly at each other.

## Associations of "Lovingly" (30 Words)

<b>affection</b>	A gentle feeling of fondness or liking. <i>He had trouble expressing the <b>affection</b> he felt.</i>
<b><u>caress</u></b>	A gentle affectionate stroking (or something resembling it). <i>She <b>caressed</b> the girl's forehead.</i>
<b>cherish</b>	Be fond of; be attached to. <i>I <b>cherish</b> the letters she wrote.</i>
<b><u>couple</u></b>	An indefinite small number. <i>He hoped she'd be better in a <b>couple</b> of days.</i>
<b>cuddly</b>	Inviting cuddling or hugging. <i>A <b>cuddly</b> teddybear.</i>
<b><u>duo</u></b>	Two items of the same kind. <i>Two <b>duos</b> for violin and viola.</i>

<b>embrace</b>	Used to refer to something which is regarded as surrounding, holding, or restricting someone. <i>They <b>embraced</b>.</i>
<b>family</b>	A social unit living together. <i>All manuscripts that share this reading constitute a <b>family</b>.</i>
<b>fondly</b>	With affection or liking. <i>Things I <b>fondly</b> recall from my childhood.</i>
<b>househusband</b>	A husband who keeps house while his wife earns the family income.
<b>hug</b>	Hold (something) closely or tightly round or against part of one's body. <i>Come here and give me a big <b>hug</b>.</i>
<b>husband</b>	Use (resources) economically. <i>She <b>husbanded</b> their financial resources through difficult times.</i>
<b>join</b>	Cause to become joined or linked. <i>Her brothers <b>joined</b> up in 1914.</i>
<b>kiss</b>	Touch lightly or gently. <i>There was a brief <b>kiss</b> of their hands in passing.</i>
<b>kissing</b>	Affectionate play (or foreplay without contact with the genital organs).
<b>kith</b>	Your friends and acquaintances. <i>A widow without <b>kith</b> or kin.</i>
<b>lovable</b>	Inspiring or deserving love or affection. <i>A mischievous but <b>lovable</b> child.</i>
<b>love</b>	A person or thing that one loves. <i>She <b>loves</b> her boss and works hard for him.</i>
<b>marriage</b>	The act of marrying; the nuptial ceremony. <i>A happy <b>marriage</b>.</i>
<b>married</b>	A person who is married. <i><b>Married</b> life.</i>
<b>mate</b>	South American tea like drink made from leaves of a South American holly called mate. <i>Camels hate leaving their <b>mates</b>.</i>
<b>newlywed</b>	Someone recently married.
<b>partner</b>	Associate or work together as partners. <i>Young farmers who <b>partnered</b> Isabel to the village dance.</i>
<b>pat</b>	Pat or squeeze fondly or playfully especially under the chin. <i>He <b>patted</b> him consolingly on the shoulder.</i>
<b>polygamist</b>	Someone who is married to two or more people at the same time. <i>A Mississippi based group of practising <b>polygamists</b>.</i>

<b>prenuptial</b>	Relating to events before a marriage. <i><b>Prenuptial</b> pregnancy.</i>
<b>treasure</b>	Be fond of; be attached to. <i>She set out to look at the art <b>treasures</b>.</i>
<b>wed</b>	Combine (two factors or qualities, especially desirable ones). <i>Will you <b>wed</b> your daughter to him.</i>
