Definitions of "Lovingly" as an adverb

fondly With fondness; with love.
They **fondly** believed the cheers were for them.



Usage Examples of "Lovingly" as an adverb

- *A lovingly restored building.*
- *They smile lovingly at each other.*

Associations of "Lovingly" (30 Words)

affection	A gentle feeling of fondness or liking. <i>He had trouble expressing the affection he felt.</i>
<u>caress</u>	A gentle affectionate stroking (or something resembling it). <i>She caressed the girl's forehead.</i>
cherish	Be fond of; be attached to. <i>I cherish the letters she wrote.</i>
<u>couple</u>	An indefinite small number. <i>He hoped she'd be better in a couple of days.</i>
cuddly	Inviting cuddling or hugging. <i>A cuddly teddybear.</i>
<u>duo</u>	Two items of the same kind. <i>Two duos for violin and viola.</i>

embrace	Used to refer to something which is regarded as surrounding, holding, or restricting someone. <i>They embraced.</i>
family	A social unit living together. <i>All manuscripts that share this reading constitute a family.</i>
fondly	With affection or liking. <i>Things I fondly recall from my childhood.</i>
househusband	A husband who keeps house while his wife earns the family income.
hug	Hold (something) closely or tightly round or against part of one's body. <i>Come here and give me a big hug.</i>
husband	Use (resources) economically. <i>She husbanded their financial resources through difficult times.</i>
join	Cause to become joined or linked. <i>Her brothers joined up in 1914.</i>
kiss	Touch lightly or gently. <i>There was a brief kiss of their hands in passing.</i>
kissing	Affectionate play (or foreplay without contact with the genital organs).
kith	Your friends and acquaintances. <i>A widow without kith or kin.</i>
lovable	Inspiring or deserving love or affection. <i>A mischievous but lovable child.</i>
love	A person or thing that one loves. <i>She loves her boss and works hard for him.</i>
marriage	The act of marrying; the nuptial ceremony. <i>A happy marriage.</i>
married	A person who is married. <i>Married life.</i>
mate	South American tea like drink made from leaves of a South American holly called mate. <i>Camels hate leaving their mates.</i>
newlywed	Someone recently married.
partner	Associate or work together as partners. <i>Young farmers who partnered Isabel to the village dance.</i>
pat	Pat or squeeze fondly or playfully especially under the chin. <i>He patted him consolingly on the shoulder.</i>
polygamist	Someone who is married to two or more people at the same time. <i>A Mississippi based group of practising polygamists.</i>

prenuptial	Relating to events before a marriage. <i>Prenuptial pregnancy.</i>
treasure	Be fond of; be attached to. <i>She set out to look at the art treasures.</i>
wed	Combine (two factors or qualities, especially desirable ones). <i>Will you wed your daughter to him.</i>
