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Associations of "Lower class" (30 Words)

alumnus	A graduate or former student of a particular school, college, or university. <i>A Harvard alumnus.</i>
attendance	The action or state of going regularly to or being present at a place or event. <i>She is being blamed for the museum s low attendances.</i>
bookworm	(especially formerly) the larva of a wood-boring beetle which feeds on the paper and glue in books.
college	The teaching staff and students of a college considered collectively. <i>I m at college studying graphic design.</i>
collegian	A student (or former student) at a college or university.
debase	Corrupt debase or make impure by adding a foreign or inferior substance often by replacing valuable ingredients with inferior ones. <i>The King was forced to debase the coinage.</i>
decrease	Decrease in size extent or range. <i>A decrease in births.</i>
demoralize	Confuse or put into disorder. <i>The boss s behavior demoralized everyone in the office.</i>
demote	Move (someone) to a lower position or rank, usually as a punishment. <i>She was demoted because she always speaks up.</i>
depress	Press down. <i>The glut of oil depressed gas prices.</i>
dismay	The feeling of despair in the face of obstacles. <i>They were dismayed by the U turn in policy.</i>
downgrade	A downward gradient on a railway or road. <i>Some jobs had gradually been downgraded from skilled to semi skilled.</i>
grad	A person who has received a degree from a school (high school or college or university).

<u>graduate</u>	<p>A person who has successfully completed a course of study or training especially a person who has been awarded an undergraduate or first academic degree.</p> <p><i>He graduated from Glasgow University in 1990.</i></p>
homeroom	<p>A classroom in which all students in a particular grade (or in a division of a grade) meet at certain times under the supervision of a teacher who takes attendance and does other administrative business.</p>
mandible	<p>The jaw or a jawbone, especially the lower jawbone in mammals and fishes.</p> <p><i>The drake is all black except for an orange mark on the upper mandible.</i></p>
<u>minimize</u>	<p>Represent as less significant or important.</p> <p><i>The aim is to minimize costs.</i></p>
pupil	<p>A learner who is enrolled in an educational institution.</p> <p><i>Will you take me on as your pupil.</i></p>
<u>relegate</u>	<p>Assign to a class or kind.</p> <p><i>They aim to prevent women from being relegated to a secondary role.</i></p>
retrench	<p>Make (an employee) redundant.</p> <p><i>If people are forced to retrench their expenditure trade will suffer.</i></p>
riffraff	<p>Disparaging terms for the common people.</p>
scholastic	<p>An adherent of scholasticism a schoolman.</p> <p><i>To distinguish between them is little more than a scholastic exercise.</i></p>
schoolmaster	<p>A male teacher in a school.</p>
shrinkage	<p>An allowance made for reduction in the takings of a business due to wastage or theft.</p> <p><i>The material lost 2 inches per yard in shrinkage.</i></p>
sophomore	<p>Used of the second year in United States high school or college.</p> <p><i>Freshmen performed better than either sophomores or juniors.</i></p>
<u>substrate</u>	<p>An underlying substance or layer.</p> <p><i>The gardener talked about the proper substrate for acid loving plants.</i></p>
<u>under</u>	<p>Under water.</p> <p><i>See under for further discussion.</i></p>
undergraduate	<p>Denoting or relating to an undergraduate.</p> <p><i>An undergraduate degree.</i></p>
understate	<p>Represent as less significant or important.</p> <p><i>The press have understated the extent of the problem.</i></p>
<u>university</u>	<p>The body of faculty and students at a university.</p> <p><i>I went to university at the Sorbonne.</i></p>
