### **firm**

Marked by firm determination or resolution not shakable.  
*A **firm** contract.*

### **patriotic**

Inspired by love for your country.  
*Today s game will be played before a fiercely **patriotic** crowd.*

### **true**

Of a compass bearing measured relative to true north.  
*A **true** story.*

### **true-blue**

Marked by unswerving loyalty.

### **truehearted**

Unwavering in devotion to friend or vow or cause- Campaign song for William Henry Harrison.

## Associations of "Loyal" (30 Words)

- allegiance** Loyalty or commitment to a superior or to a group or cause.  
*Those wishing to receive citizenship must swear **allegiance** to the republic.*
- allegiant** Steadfast in devotion (especially to your lawful monarch or government).  
*It is impossible to be **allegiant** to two opposing forces.*
- chauvinistic** Fanatically patriotic.  
*She overcomes the surly objections of her **chauvinistic** editor to uncover the truth.*
- confidant** Someone to whom private matters are confided.  
*A close **confidante** of the princess.*
- confiding** Willing to entrust personal matters.  
*She was in a **confiding** mood.*
- dedication** Complete and wholehearted fidelity.  
*A faintly engraved inscription or **dedication**.*
- devoted** Dedicated exclusively to a purpose or use.  
*He was a **devoted** husband.*

<b>dutiful</b>	Motivated by duty rather than desire or enthusiasm. <i>A <b>dutiful</b> visit.</i>
<b>epigone</b>	A less distinguished follower or imitator of someone, especially an artist or philosopher. <i>The humdrum compositions of some of Beethoven s <b>epigones</b>.</i>
<b><u>faith</u></b>	Loyalty or allegiance to a cause or a person. <i>He lost his <b>faith</b> but not his morality.</i>
<b><u>faithful</u></b>	Those who are faithful to a particular religion or political party. <i>The city has always been <b>faithful</b> to the Conservative party.</i>
<b>faithfully</b>	In a loyal manner. <i>He swore that he would serve the king <b>faithfully</b>.</i>
<b>follower</b>	A person who takes an active interest in a particular activity. <i><b>Followers</b> of Nietzsche.</i>
<b><u>housekeeper</u></b>	A person employed to manage a household.
<b>jingoism</b>	An appeal intended to arouse patriotic emotions. <i>The popular <b>jingoism</b> that swept the lower middle classes.</i>
<b>liege</b>	A feudal superior or sovereign. <i>The Scots obeyed him as their <b>liege</b> lord.</i>
<b>loyalty</b>	The act of binding yourself (intellectually or emotionally) to a course of action. <i>His extreme <b>loyalty</b> to the Crown.</i>
<b><u>minion</u></b>	A servile or fawning dependant. <i>He gets oppressed <b>minions</b> like me to fob them off.</i>
<b><u>obedient</u></b>	Dutifully complying with the commands or instructions of those in authority. <i>An <b>obedient</b> soldier.</i>
<b>patriotic</b>	Having or expressing devotion to and vigorous support for one's country. <i>Today s game will be played before a fiercely <b>patriotic</b> crowd.</i>
<b><u>servant</u></b>	A person employed in the service of a government. <i>He was a great <b>servant</b> of the Labour Party.</i>
<b>subservience</b>	The condition of being something that is useful in reaching an end or carrying out a plan. <i>Blind <b>subservience</b> to authority.</i>
<b>toady</b>	A pufferfish. <i>She imagined him <b>toadying</b> to his rich clients.</i>
<b>trust</b>	An organization or company managed by trustees. <i>He betrayed their <b>trust</b>.</i>

<b><u>trusted</u></b>	(of persons) worthy of trust or confidence. <i>A <b>trusted</b> adviser.</i>
<b>trustful</b>	Inclined to believe or confide readily; full of trust. <i>A <b>trustful</b> acceptance of authority.</i>
<b>trusting</b>	Inclined to believe or confide readily; full of trust- Nordhoff & Hall. <i>A shy and <b>trusting</b> child.</i>
<b><u>trustworthy</u></b>	Taking responsibility for one's conduct and obligations. <i>A <b>trustworthy</b> report.</i>
<b>underling</b>	A person lower in status or rank. <i>She was shouting orders at <b>underlings</b> between gulps of coffee.</i>
