- *Expressed clearly; easy to understand.*
- *Showing or having the ability to think clearly, especially in intervals between periods of confusion or insanity.*
- *Bright or luminous.*
- *Capable of thinking and expressing yourself in a clear and consistent manner.*
- *Transmitting light; able to be seen through with clarity.*
- *Transparently clear; easily understandable- Robert Burton.*

Having inherent physical or mental ability or capacity.

articulate

Consisting of segments held together by joints.

Articulate speech.

bright

Made smooth and bright by or as if by rubbing reflecting a sheen or glow.

Bright dress.

brilliant

Clear and sharp and ringing.

Brilliant chandeliers.

cogent

(of an argument or case) clear, logical, and convincing.

A **cogent** argument.

coherent

(of an argument, theory, or policy) logical and consistent.

She was lucid and **coherent** and did not appear to be injured.

communicative

Relating to the conveyance or exchange of information.

Lew was a very **communicative** chap.

comprehensible	Able to be understood; intelligible. <i>Clear and comprehensible English.</i>
crystalline	Consisting of or containing or of the nature of crystals. <i>He writes a crystalline prose.</i>
dazzling	Shining intensely. <i>A dazzling display of football.</i>
eloquent	Clearly expressing or indicating something. <i>The bus journey alone is eloquent of class inequality.</i>
gleaming	Bright with a steady but subdued shining. <i>Gleaming black limousines.</i>
glowing	Highly enthusiastic. <i>Glowing praise.</i>
in one's right mind	Holding office.
in possession of one's faculties	Directed or bound inward.
intelligible	Able to be understood; comprehensible. <i>Intelligible pronunciation.</i>
limpid	Transparently clear; easily understandable- Robert Burton. <i>Could see the sand on the bottom of the limpid pool.</i>
logical	Marked by an orderly logical and aesthetically consistent relation of parts. <i>A logical mind.</i>
luculent	Brightly shining. <i>A luculent oration.</i>
luminescent	Emitting light not caused by heat. <i>There s something calming about watching a luminescent jellyfish.</i>
luminous	Giving off light; bright or shining. <i>The luminous dial on his watch.</i>
lustrous	Reflecting light. <i>Large lustrous eyes.</i>
of sound mind	Financially secure and safe.
pellucid	Transparently clear; easily understandable- Robert Burton. <i>Pellucid prose.</i>
perspicuous	(of language) transparently clear; easily understandable. <i>It provides simpler and more perspicuous explanations than its rivals.</i>

phosphorescent	Emitting light without appreciable heat as by slow oxidation of phosphorous. <i>The phosphorescent glow of decaying wood.</i>
radiant	Of an appliance designed to emit radiant energy especially for cooking or heating. <i>She gave him a radiant smile.</i>
rational	Capable of being expressed as a quotient of integers. <i>I m sure there s a perfectly rational explanation.</i>
sane	Marked by sound judgment. <i>Sane nuclear policy.</i>
shining	Brilliant or excellent at something. <i>He has set a shining example with his model behaviour.</i>
<u>transparent</u>	Easily understood or seen through (because of a lack of subtlety). <i>The meaning of the poem is by no means transparent.</i>
understandable	Able to be understood. <i>Though his accent was strange the words were perfectly understandable.</i>

Associations of "Lucid" (30 Words)

- alert** A warning serves to make you more alert to danger.
*Caught by a couple of **alert** cops.*
- apparent** Appearing as such but not necessarily so.
*For all his **apparent** wealth he had no money to pay the rent.*
- awake** Stop sleeping; wake from sleep.
*The noise might keep you **awake** at night.*
- candor** The quality of being honest and straightforward in attitude and speech.

clarify	Make (a statement or situation) less confused and more comprehensible. <i>Clarify the butter.</i>
clarity	The quality of clear water. <i>When she awoke the clarity was back in her eyes.</i>
clear	Make free from confusion or ambiguity make clear. <i>He clears 5 000 each month.</i>
crystalline	Very clear. <i>Granite is crystalline.</i>
decidedly	Without question and beyond doubt. <i>It was decidedly too expensive.</i>
diaphanous	(especially of fabric) light, delicate, and translucent. <i>A diaphanous dress of pale gold.</i>
discerning	Having or showing good judgement. <i>A discerning critic.</i>
distinct	Constituting a separate entity or part. <i>At a distinct or decided disadvantage.</i>
expressly	Explicitly; clearly. <i>She was expressly forbidden to use the stove.</i>
glaringly	In a highly obvious or conspicuous manner. <i>The reason was glaringly obvious.</i>
limpid	(especially of writing or music) clear and accessible or melodious. <i>The limpid notes of a recorder.</i>
noticed	Being perceived or observed. <i>An easily noticed effect on the rate of growth.</i>
obvious	Easily perceived or understood; clear, self-evident, or apparent. <i>Unemployment has been the most obvious cost of the recession.</i>
opalescent	Having a play of lustrous rainbow colors. <i>A milky opalescent or opaline luster.</i>
palpability	The quality of being perceivable by touch.
pellucid	Easily understood; lucid. <i>A pellucid brook.</i>
perspicuity	Clarity as a consequence of being perspicuous.
perspicuous	(of language) transparently clear; easily understandable. <i>A perspicuous argument.</i>
plain	Express complaints discontent displeasure or unhappiness. <i>Plain water.</i>

sleepless	Experiencing or accompanied by sleeplessness. <i>The sleepless river.</i>
<u>sober</u>	Make or become sober after drinking alcohol. <i>A sobering thought.</i>
<u>straightforward</u>	Without concealment or deception; honest. <i>A straightforward gaze.</i>
<u>transparent</u>	Transmitting heat or other radiation without distortion. <i>A transparent explanation.</i>
<u>unambiguous</u>	Not open to more than one interpretation. <i>As a horror apartheid is absolutely unambiguous.</i>
<u>unequivocal</u>	Admitting of no doubt or misunderstanding; having only one meaning or interpretation and leading to only one conclusion. <i>Took an unequivocal position.</i>
<u>unmistakable</u>	Clearly evident to the mind. <i>His opposition to slavery was unmistakable.</i>
