bankable	Acceptable to or at a bank. <i>Bankable funds.</i>
cost-effective	Productive relative to the cost.
gainful	Serving to increase wealth or resources; providing money or other benefit. <i>He soon found gainful employment.</i>
moneymaking	Producing a profit, especially with little effort; profitable. <i>A moneymaking business.</i>
paying	Yielding a fair profit. <i>A paying job.</i>
profitable	Beneficial; useful. <i>He d had a profitable day.</i>

remunerative Financially rewarding; lucrative.
*Since June 2003 he has not had any **remunerative** employment.*

well paid Wise or advantageous and hence advisable.

Usage Examples of "Lucrative" as an adjective

- *A lucrative career as a stand-up comedian.*

Associations of "Lucrative" (30 Words)

advantageous Involving or creating favourable circumstances that increase the chances of success or effectiveness; beneficial.
*We are in an **advantageous** position.*

affluent An affluent person a person who is financially well off.
*The so called emerging **affluents**.*

alimony Court-ordered support paid by one spouse to another after they are separated.
*He is said to have paid 300 000 **alimony** to his first wife.*

beneficial Promoting or enhancing well-being.
*The process was **beneficial** to both supplier and customer.*

benefit Derive a benefit from.
*The areas would **benefit** from regeneration.*

bough Any of the larger branches of a tree.
*Apple **boughs** laden with blossom.*

business Business concerns collectively.
*The tea **business**.*

cash Exchange for cash.
*She was always short of **cash**.*

earnings Income derived from an investment or product.
*Export **earnings**.*

fecund Producing or capable of producing an abundance of offspring or new growth; highly fertile.
*A **fecund** imagination.*

fertile Marked by great fruitfulness.
*Her **fertile** imagination.*

flourishing Developing rapidly and successfully; thriving.
***Flourishing** businesses.*

fruitful	(of a tree, plant, or land) producing much fruit; fertile. <i>Be fruitful and multiply.</i>
gainful	Serving to increase wealth or resources; providing money or other benefit. <i>He soon found gainful employment.</i>
helpful	Useful. <i>People are friendly and helpful.</i>
industrialist	Someone who manages or has significant financial interest in an industrial enterprise. <i>The exploitation of child labour by nineteenth century industrialists.</i>
money	Sums of money. <i>The college is very short of money.</i>
paid	Marked by the reception of pay. <i>A paid check.</i>
pawnbroker	A person who lends money at interest in exchange for personal property that is deposited as security.
paying	For which money is paid. <i>A paying job.</i>
productive	(of a cough) that raises mucus from the respiratory tract. <i>Many suffixes are common and productive.</i>
profit	Make a profit gain money or materially. <i>The only people to profit from the episode were the lawyers.</i>
profitable	Beneficial; useful. <i>He d had a profitable day.</i>
prolific	(of an artist, author, or composer) producing many works. <i>Flying foxes are extremely prolific.</i>
remunerative	Financially rewarding; lucrative. <i>Highly remunerative activities.</i>
reward	Strengthen and support with rewards. <i>The scout was rewarded for courageous action.</i>
rich	Marked by richness and fullness of flavor. <i>A rich gas mixture.</i>
sinecure	A benefice to which no spiritual or pastoral duties are attached. <i>Political sinecures for the supporters of ministers.</i>
successful	Having achieved fame, wealth, or social status. <i>A successful actor.</i>
wages	A recompense for worthy acts or retribution for wrongdoing. <i>The wages of sin is death.</i>
