Synonyms of "Ludicrous" as an adjective (15 Words)

absurd	Arousing amusement or derision; ridiculous. <i>The absurd predicament of seeming to argue that virtue is highly desirable but intensely unpleasant.</i>
asinine	Extremely stupid or foolish. <i>Lydia ignored his asinine remark.</i>
cockeyed	Turned or twisted toward one side- G.K.Chesterton. <i>That s a cockeyed idea.</i>

derisory	Incongruous;inviting ridicule. <i>They were given a derisory pay rise.</i>
farcical	Broadly or extravagantly humorous; resembling farce. <i>He considered the whole idea farcical.</i>
foolish	Devoid of good sense or judgment. <i>Foolish remarks.</i>
idiotic	So unreasonable as to invite derision. <i>I was able to hum its idiotic theme tune.</i>
inane	Extremely silly or stupid. <i>Don t badger people with inane questions.</i>
laughable	Incongruous;inviting ridicule. <i>If it didn t make me so angry it would be laughable.</i>
nonsensical	Having no intelligible meaning. <i>A nonsensical jumble of words.</i>
preposterous	So unreasonable as to invite derision. <i>A preposterous attempt to turn back the pages of history.</i>
ridiculous	Inspiring scornful pity- Dashiell Hammett. <i>That ridiculous tartan cap.</i>
risible	Arousing or provoking laughter. <i>A risible scene of lovemaking in a tent.</i>
silly	Lacking seriousness; given to frivolity. <i>Don t be silly she said.</i>

amusing	Providing enjoyment; pleasantly entertaining. <i>An amusing fellow.</i>

comedy	The style or genre represented by comedy films plays and broadcast programmes. <i>Satiric comedy.</i>
comical	Arousing or provoking laughter. <i>A series of comical misunderstandings.</i>
derisive	Expressing contempt or ridicule. <i>He gave a harsh derisive laugh.</i>
droll	Curious or unusual in a way that provokes dry amusement. <i>A droll little man with a quiet tongue in cheek kind of humor.</i>

foolish	Having or revealing stupidity. <i>He was foolish enough to confide in her.</i>
funny	Unusual, especially in such a way as to arouse suspicion. <i>It s a funny old world.</i>
goofy	(in surfing and other board sports) having the right leg in front of the left on the board. <i>A goofy grin.</i>
humor	The trait of appreciating and being able to express the humorous. <i>He was in a bad humor.</i>
humorous	Full of or characterized by humor. <i>In a humorous vein.</i>
idiotic	Very stupid. <i>An idiotic idea.</i>
illogical	Lacking in correct logical relation. <i>An illogical fear of the supernatural.</i>
incongruent	(of melting, dissolution, or other process) affecting the components of an alloy or other substance differently.
incongruity	The state of being incongruous; incompatibility. <i>The incongruity of his fleshy face and skinny body disturbed her.</i>
incongruous	Lacking in harmony or compatibility or appropriateness. <i>Incongruous behavior.</i>
irrational	An irrational number or quantity a surd. <i>Irrational feelings of hostility.</i>

<u>laughable</u>	So ludicrous as to be amusing. <i>A contribution so small as to be laughable.</i>
mocking	Playfully vexing (especially by ridicule)- Lawrence Durrell. <i>He got jeers and mocking laughter as he addressed the marchers.</i>
preposterous	Contrary to reason or common sense; utterly absurd or ridiculous. <i>A preposterous attempt to turn back the pages of history.</i>
ridiculous	So unreasonable as to invite derision. <i>It seems absolutely ridiculous that anyone would try to pull a stunt like this.</i>
risible	Arousing or provoking laughter. <i>Risible courtroom antics.</i>
satiric	Exposing human folly to ridicule. <i>A persistent campaign of mockery by the satirical fortnightly magazine.</i>
skit	A short theatrical episode. <i>Students will create skits about bullying and go to each elementary school to perform them.</i>
slapstick	Acoustic device consisting of two paddles hinged together; used by an actor to make a loud noise without inflicting injury when striking someone. <i>Slapstick humour.</i>
<u>unreasonable</u>	Beyond the limits of acceptability or fairness. <i>She knew she was being unreasonable but she resented his domesticity.</i>
<u>unwise</u>	Showing or resulting from lack of judgment or wisdom. <i>An unwise investor is soon impoverished.</i>
<u>witty</u>	Showing or characterized by quick and inventive verbal humour. <i>Marlowe was charming and witty.</i>
