- So unreasonable as to invite derision.
- Broadly or extravagantly humorous; resembling farce.
- So foolish, unreasonable, or out of place as to be amusing.

Synonyms of "Ludicrous" as an adjective (15 Words)

Arousing amusement or derision; ridiculous.

absurd The **absurd** predicament of seeming to argue that virtue is highly desirable

but intensely unpleasant.

Extremely stupid or foolish.

Lydia ignored his **asinine** remark.

cockeyed Turned or twisted toward one side- G.K.Chesterton.

That s a **cockeyed** idea.



derisory Incongruous; inviting ridicule.

They were given a **derisory** pay rise.

farcical Broadly or extravagantly humorous; resembling farce.

He considered the whole idea farcical.

foolish Devoid of good sense or judgment.

Foolish remarks.

idiotic So unreasonable as to invite derision.

I was able to hum its **idiotic** theme tune.

inane Extremely silly or stupid.

Don t badger people with **inane** questions.

laughable Incongruous; inviting ridicule.

If it didn t make me so angry it would be **laughable**.

nonsensical Having no intelligible meaning.

A nonsensical jumble of words.

preposterous So unreasonable as to invite derision.

A preposterous attempt to turn back the pages of history.

ridiculous Inspiring scornful pity- Dashiell Hammett.

That **ridiculous** tartan cap.

risible Arousing or provoking laughter.

A **risible** scene of lovemaking in a tent.

silly Lacking seriousness; given to frivolity.

Don t be **silly** she said.

Usage Examples of "Ludicrous" as an adjective

• Every night he wore a ludicrous outfit.

• It's ludicrous that I have been fined.

• It is ludicrous to call a cottage a mansion.

• Ludicrous green hair.

absurd An absurd state of affairs.

The **absurd** is the essential concept and the first truth.

amusing Providing enjoyment; pleasantly entertaining.

The style or genre represented by comedy films plays and broadcast

programmes. comedy

Satiric **comedy**.

Arousing or provoking laughter. comical

A series of **comical** misunderstandings.

Expressing contempt or ridicule. derisive

He gave a harsh **derisive** laugh.

Curious or unusual in a way that provokes dry amusement. droll

A **droll** little man with a quiet tongue in cheek kind of humor.

A feeling of excitement, happiness, or elation. exhilaration

They felt the **exhilaration** of victory.

Relating to or resembling farce, especially because of absurd or ridiculous

farcical aspects.

The wild **farcical** exuberance of a clown.

Having or revealing stupidity. foolish

He was **foolish** enough to confide in her.

Unusual, especially in such a way as to arouse suspicion. funny

It s a **funny** old world.

(in surfing and other board sports) having the right leg in front of the left

on the board. goofy

A goofy grin.

The trait of appreciating and being able to express the humorous. humor

He was in a bad humor.

Full of or characterized by humor. humorous

In a **humorous** vein.

Very stupid. idiotic

An **idiotic** idea.

Lacking in correct logical relation. illogical

An **illogical** fear of the supernatural.

(of melting, dissolution, or other process) affecting the components of an <u>incongruent</u>

alloy or other substance differently.

The state of being incongruous; incompatibility. incongruity

The **incongruity** of his fleshy face and skinny body disturbed her.

Lacking in harmony or compatibility or appropriateness. **incongruous**

Incongruous behavior.

An irrational number or quantity a surd. irrational

Irrational feelings of hostility.



laughable So ludicrous as to be amusing.

A contribution so small as to be **laughable**.

mocking Playfully vexing (especially by ridicule)- Lawrence Durrell.

He got jeers and **mocking** laughter as he addressed the marchers.

preposterous Contrary to reason or common sense; utterly absurd or ridiculous.

A **preposterous** attempt to turn back the pages of history.

So unreasonable as to invite derision.

ridiculous It seems absolutely **ridiculous** that anyone would try to pull a stunt like

this.

risible Arousing or provoking laughter.

Risible courtroom antics.

Exposing human folly to ridicule.

A persistent campaign of mockery by the **satiric**al fortnightly magazine.

A short theatrical episode.

skit Students will create **skit**s about bullying and go to each elementary school

to perform them.

Acoustic device consisting of two paddles hinged together; used by an actor

slapstick to make a loud noise without inflicting injury when striking someone.

Slapstick humour.

unreasonable Challenge share a hair a supplier to the limits of acceptability or fairness.

She knew she was being **unreasonable** but she resented his domesticity.

Showing or resulting from lack of judgment or wisdom.

An **unwise** investor is soon impoverished.

Showing or characterized by guick and inventive verbal humour.

*witty*Marlowe was charming and witty.
