### Synonyms of "Ludicrous" as an adjective (15 Words)

<b>absurd</b>	Arousing amusement or derision; ridiculous. <i>The <b>absurd</b> predicament of seeming to argue that virtue is highly desirable but intensely unpleasant.</i>
<a href="#">asinine</a>	Extremely stupid or foolish. <i>Lydia ignored his <b>asinine</b> remark.</i>
<b>cockeyed</b>	Turned or twisted toward one side- G.K.Chesterton. <i>That s a <b>cockeyed</b> idea.</i>

<b>derisory</b>	Incongruous;inviting ridicule. <i>They were given a <b>derisory</b> pay rise.</i>
<b>farcical</b>	Broadly or extravagantly humorous; resembling farce. <i>He considered the whole idea <b>farcical</b>.</i>
<b>foolish</b>	Devoid of good sense or judgment. <i><b>Foolish</b> remarks.</i>
<b>idiotic</b>	So unreasonable as to invite derision. <i>I was able to hum its <b>idiotic</b> theme tune.</i>
<b>inane</b>	Extremely silly or stupid. <i>Don t badger people with <b>inane</b> questions.</i>
<b>laughable</b>	Incongruous;inviting ridicule. <i>If it didn t make me so angry it would be <b>laughable</b>.</i>
<b>nonsensical</b>	Having no intelligible meaning. <i>A <b>nonsensical</b> jumble of words.</i>
<b>preposterous</b>	So unreasonable as to invite derision. <i>A <b>preposterous</b> attempt to turn back the pages of history.</i>
<b>ridiculous</b>	Inspiring scornful pity- Dashiell Hammett. <i>That <b>ridiculous</b> tartan cap.</i>
<b>risible</b>	Arousing or provoking laughter. <i>A <b>risible</b> scene of lovemaking in a tent.</i>
<b>silly</b>	Lacking seriousness; given to frivolity. <i>Don t be <b>silly</b> she said.</i>

- *It is ludicrous to call a cottage a mansion.*

<b>absurd</b>	An absurd state of affairs. <i>The <b>absurd</b> is the essential concept and the first truth.</i>
<b>amusing</b>	Providing enjoyment; pleasantly entertaining. <i>An <b>amusing</b> fellow.</i>

<b>comedy</b>	The style or genre represented by comedy films plays and broadcast programmes. <i>Satiric <b>comedy</b>.</i>
<b>comical</b>	Arousing or provoking laughter. <i>A series of <b>comical</b> misunderstandings.</i>
<b>derisive</b>	Expressing contempt or ridicule. <i>He gave a harsh <b>derisive</b> laugh.</i>
<b>droll</b>	Curious or unusual in a way that provokes dry amusement. <i>A <b>droll</b> little man with a quiet tongue in cheek kind of humor.</i>
<b>exhilaration</b>	A feeling of excitement, happiness, or elation. <i>They felt the <b>exhilaration</b> of victory.</i>
<b>farcical</b>	Relating to or resembling farce, especially because of absurd or ridiculous aspects. <i>The wild <b>farcical</b> exuberance of a clown.</i>
<b>foolish</b>	Having or revealing stupidity. <i>He was <b>foolish</b> enough to confide in her.</i>
<b>funny</b>	Unusual, especially in such a way as to arouse suspicion. <i>It s a <b>funny</b> old world.</i>
<b>goofy</b>	(in surfing and other board sports) having the right leg in front of the left on the board. <i>A <b>goofy</b> grin.</i>
<b>humor</b>	The trait of appreciating and being able to express the humorous. <i>He was in a bad <b>humor</b>.</i>
<b>humorous</b>	Full of or characterized by humor. <i>In a <b>humorous</b> vein.</i>
<b>idiotic</b>	Very stupid. <i>An <b>idiotic</b> idea.</i>
<b>illogical</b>	Lacking in correct logical relation. <i>An <b>illogical</b> fear of the supernatural.</i>
<b>incongruent</b>	(of melting, dissolution, or other process) affecting the components of an alloy or other substance differently.
<b>incongruity</b>	The state of being incongruous; incompatibility. <i>The <b>incongruity</b> of his fleshy face and skinny body disturbed her.</i>
<b>incongruous</b>	Lacking in harmony or compatibility or appropriateness. <i><b>Incongruous</b> behavior.</i>
<b>irrational</b>	An irrational number or quantity a surd. <i><b>Irrational</b> feelings of hostility.</i>

<b>laughable</b>	So ludicrous as to be amusing. <i>A contribution so small as to be <b>laughable</b>.</i>
<b>mocking</b>	Playfully vexing (especially by ridicule)- Lawrence Durrell. <i>He got jeers and <b>mocking</b> laughter as he addressed the marchers.</i>
<b>preposterous</b>	Contrary to reason or common sense; utterly absurd or ridiculous. <i>A <b>preposterous</b> attempt to turn back the pages of history.</i>
<b>ridiculous</b>	So unreasonable as to invite derision. <i>It seems absolutely <b>ridiculous</b> that anyone would try to pull a stunt like this.</i>
<b>risible</b>	Arousing or provoking laughter. <i><b>Risible</b> courtroom antics.</i>
<b>satiric</b>	Exposing human folly to ridicule. <i>A persistent campaign of mockery by the <b>satirical</b> fortnightly magazine.</i>
<b>skit</b>	A short theatrical episode. <i>Students will create <b>skits</b> about bullying and go to each elementary school to perform them.</i>
<b>slapstick</b>	Acoustic device consisting of two paddles hinged together; used by an actor to make a loud noise without inflicting injury when striking someone. <i><b>Slapstick</b> humour.</i>
<b>unreasonable</b>	Beyond the limits of acceptability or fairness. <i>She knew she was being <b>unreasonable</b> but she resented his domesticity.</i>
<b>unwise</b>	Showing or resulting from lack of judgment or wisdom. <i>An <b>unwise</b> investor is soon impoverished.</i>
<b>witty</b>	Showing or characterized by quick and inventive verbal humour. <i>Marlowe was charming and <b>witty</b>.</i>
