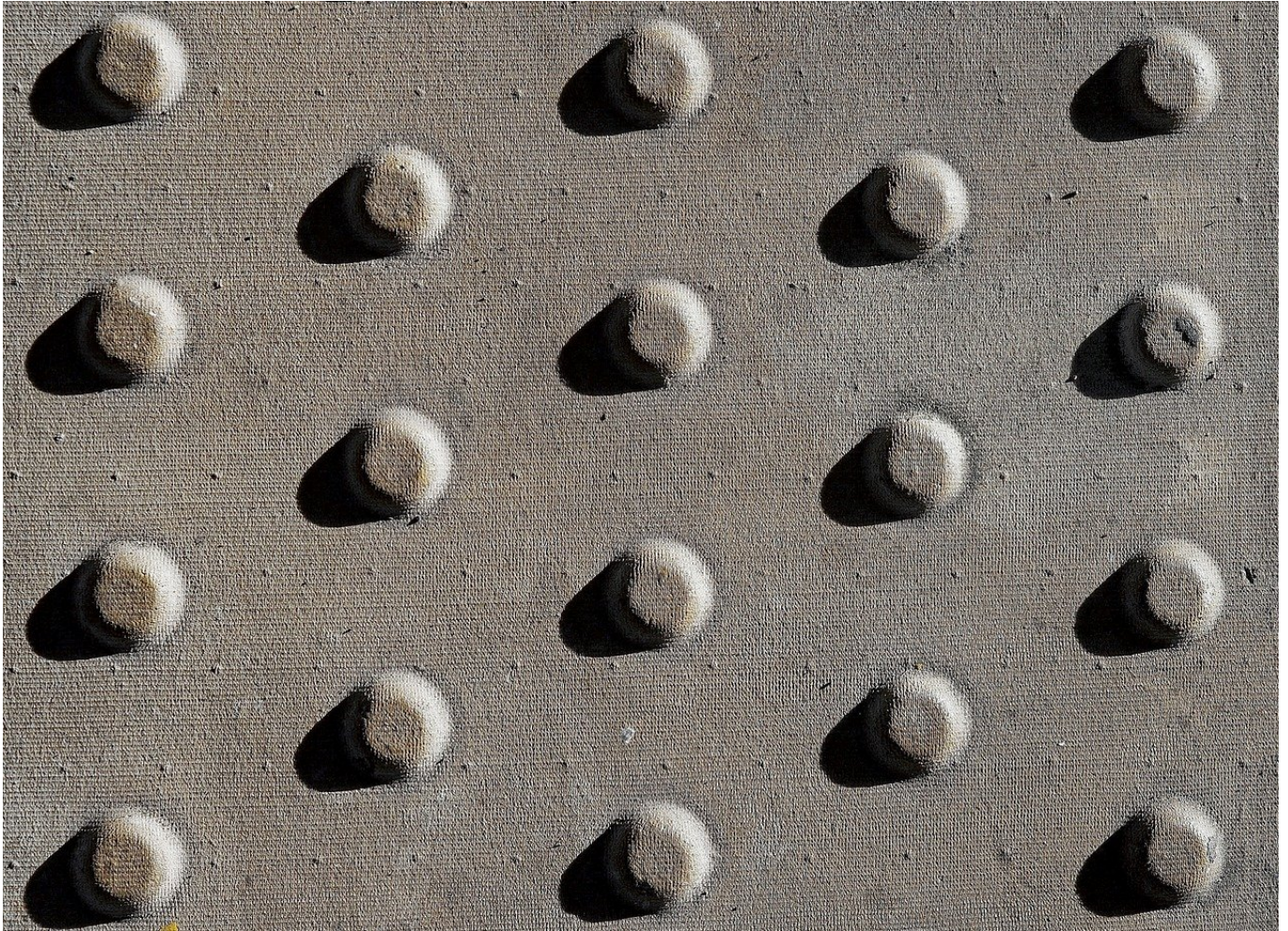
## Lump as a Noun

<b>cake</b>	A flattish compact mass of something, especially soap. <i>A delicious <b>cake</b> smothered with whipped cream.</i>
<b>carbuncle</b>	A severe abscess or multiple boil in the skin, typically infected with staphylococcus bacteria.
<b>chunk</b>	A compact mass. <i>Huge <b>chunks</b> of masonry littered the street.</i>
<b>clod</b>	A compact mass. <i>You re an insensitive <b>clod</b> and I hope you fall and break your neck.</i>
<b>clump</b>	A small group of trees or plants growing closely together. <i><b>Clumps</b> of earth.</i>
<b>cluster</b>	A natural subgroup of a population, used for statistical sampling or analysis. <i>A <b>cluster</b> of admirers.</i>
<b>concentration</b>	Strengthening the concentration as of a solute in a mixture by removing diluting material. <i>The <b>concentration</b> of power in the hands of nobles.</i>
<b>contusion</b>	The action of bruising. <i>The bruise resulted from a <b>contusion</b>.</i>
<b>corn</b>	Whiskey distilled from a mash of not less than 80 percent corn. <i>That movie was pure <b>corn</b>.</i>
<b>cube</b>	A block in the approximate shape of a cube. <i>A sugar <b>cube</b>.</i>
<b>dab</b>	A small amount of something. <i>Apply concealer with light <b>dabs</b>.</i>
<b>dollop</b>	A large, shapeless mass of something, especially soft food. <i>Great <b>dollops</b> of cream.</i>
<b>eruption</b>	(of volcanos) pouring out fumes or lava (or a deposit so formed). <i>Irritable skin <b>eruptions</b>.</i>
<b>gawk</b>	An awkward or shy person. <i>Let those country <b>gawks</b> dance to their hearts content.</i>

<b>glob</b>	A lump of a semi-liquid substance. <i>Thick <b>globs</b> of mozzarella cheese.</i>
<b>goon</b>	A guard in a German prisoner-of-war camp during the Second World War. <i>He hired <b>goons</b> to hunt down supporters.</i>
<b>growth</b>	Vegetation that has grown. <i>A <b>growth</b> of trees.</i>
<b>hunk</b>	A large, strong, sexually attractive man. <i>A Hollywood <b>hunk</b>.</i>
<b>lout</b>	An uncouth and aggressive man or boy. <i>Drunken <b>louts</b>.</i>
<b>lubber</b>	An awkward stupid person.
<b>lummoX</b>	A clumsy, stupid person. <i>Watch it you great <b>lummoX</b>.</i>
<a href="#"><u>mass</u></a>	(often followed by `of') a large number or amount or extent. <i>The masterly distribution of <b>masses</b>.</i>
<b>mound</b>	The slight elevation on which the pitcher stands. <i>They have a southpaw on the <b>mound</b>.</i>
<b>node</b>	A lymph node or other structure consisting of a small mass of differentiated tissue. <i>The company's internal worldwide area network now has some 22 000 <b>nodes</b>.</i>
<b>nugget</b>	A small lump of gold or other precious metal found ready-formed in the earth. <i><b>Nuggets</b> of meat.</i>
<b>oaf</b>	An awkward stupid person. <i>They are just big clumsy <b>oafs</b>.</i>
<b>outgrowth</b>	A natural development or result of something. <i>The eye first appears as an <b>outgrowth</b> from the brain.</i>
<b>pat</b>	A quick, light touch with the hand. <i>Giving him a friendly <b>pat</b> on the arm she went off to join the others.</i>
<b>piece</b>	A separate part of a whole. <i>A haunting <b>piece</b> of music.</i>
<b>protrusion</b>	Something that bulges out or is protuberant or projects from its surroundings. <i>A <b>protrusion</b> of rock jutted from the mountainside.</i>
<b>protuberance</b>	The condition of being protuberant; the condition of bulging out. <i>The large size and <b>protuberance</b> of the incisors.</i>

<b>puffiness</b>	An abnormal protuberance or localized enlargement.
<b>slab</b>	A pack containing 24 bottles or cans of beer. <i>She settled on a <b>slab</b> of rock.</i>
<b>stumblebum</b>	An awkward stupid person.
<b>swelling</b>	Something that bulges out or is protuberant or projects from its surroundings. <i>Painless <b>swellings</b> may appear in the lower abdomen.</i>
<b>tumour</b>	An abnormal new mass of tissue that serves no purpose.
<b>wart</b>	An imperfection in someone or something that is suggestive of a wart especially in smallness or unattractiveness. <i>Few products are without their <b>warts</b>.</i>
<b>wedge</b>	An object or piece of something shaped like a wedge. <i>He invested his <b>wedge</b> in stocks and shares.</i>
<b>wen</b>	A common cyst of the skin; filled with fatty matter (sebum) that is secreted by a sebaceous gland that has been blocked. <i>The great <b>wen</b> of London.</i>

<b>consider together</b>	Give careful consideration to.
<b><u>consolidate</u></b>	Combine (a number of financial accounts or funds) into a single overall account or set of accounts. <i><b>Consolidated</b> accounts.</i>
<b><u>fuse</u></b>	Cause an electrical appliance to stop working when a fuse melts. <i>Intermarriage had <b>fused</b> the families into a large unit.</i>
<b>group</b>	Form a group or groups. <i>Molluscs are <b>grouped</b> into seven different classes.</i>
<b>join</b>	Cause to become joined or linked. <i>Her brothers <b>joined</b> up in 1914.</i>
<b><u>mass</u></b>	Join together into a mass or collect or form a mass. <i>Clouds <b>massed</b> heavily on the horizon.</i>
<b><u>merge</u></b>	Blend or cause to blend gradually into something else so as to become indistinguishable from it. <i>The merchant bank <b>merged</b> with another broker.</i>
<b>mix</b>	Mix together different elements. <i>The people he <b>mixed</b> with were nothing to do with show business.</i>
<b><u>pool</u></b>	Of liquid form a pool on the ground or another surface. <i>We <b>pooled</b> resources.</i>
<b>put</b>	Put into a certain place or abstract location. <i>A large aid programme was <b>put</b> into practice.</i>

She **unites** charm with a good business sense.

<b>flesh</b>	Remove adhering flesh from hides when preparing leather manufacture. <i>I have <b>fleshed</b> my bloodhound.</i>
<b>golf</b>	Play golf. <i>He was a fixture at the <b>golf</b> club in Rockport where he <b>golfed</b> until his early nineties.</i>
<b>juggle</b>	Organize (information or figures) in order to give a particular impression. <i>Charles <b>juggled</b> five tangerines his hands a frantic blur.</i>
<b>juggling</b>	Throwing and catching several objects simultaneously.
<b>kernel</b>	The choicest or most essential or most vital part of some idea or experience. <i>The milky <b>kernel</b> of the wheat grain.</i>
<b>kick</b>	Kick a leg up. <i>The team s <b>kicking</b> was excellent.</i>
<b>large</b>	Fairly large or important in effect influential. <i>Many <b>large</b> investors are likely to take a different view.</i>
<b>marrow</b>	Very tender and very nutritious tissue from marrowbones. <i>A bone <b>marrow</b> transplant.</i>
<b>mass</b>	Join together into a mass or collect or form a mass. <i>Both countries began <b>massing</b> troops in the region.</i>
<b>massive</b>	A group of young people from a particular area with a common interest in dance music. <i>The Bristol <b>massive</b>.</i>
<b>meat</b>	The flesh of an animal, typically a mammal or bird, as food (the flesh of domestic fowls is sometimes distinguished as poultry). <i>Place <b>meat</b> and poultry in the refrigerator immediately.</i>
<b>monolithic</b>	(of a building) very large and characterless. <i>The <b>monolithic</b> proportions of Stalinist architecture.</i>
<b>monumental</b>	Great in importance, extent, or size. <i>Einstein s <b>monumental</b> contributions to physics.</i>
<b>pith</b>	Remove the pith from a plant. <i>Peel and <b>pith</b> the oranges.</i>
<b>pork</b>	The flesh of a pig used as food, especially when uncured. <i>Roast <b>pork</b>.</i>
<b>rebound</b>	The act of securing possession of the rebounding basketball after a missed shot. <i>He is still on the <b>rebound</b> from his wife s death.</i>

- roller** Relating to or involving roller skates.  
*The sheets moved through **rollers** and down the folding machine.*
- soccer** A football game in which two teams of 11 players try to kick or head a ball into the opponents' goal.
- sphere** The apparent surface of the imaginary sphere on which celestial bodies appear to be projected.  
*The markers on the route included two conspicuous black **spheres**.*
- sphericity** The roundness of a 3-dimensional object.
- volley** Be dispersed in a volley.  
*He took his chance well **volleying** into the top corner from 25 yards.*
- volleyball** An inflated ball used in playing volleyball.
- wallow** A depression containing mud or shallow water formed by the wallowing of large mammals.  
*He had been **wallowing** in self pity.*
