<u>charismatic</u>	Relating to the charismatic movement in the Christian Church. <i>A charismatic leader.</i>
<u>charming</u>	Possessing or using or characteristic of or appropriate to supernatural powers. <i>Charming incantations.</i>
choice	Appealing to refined taste. <i>He had a few choice words at his command.</i>
<u>delectable</u>	Extremely pleasing to the sense of taste. <i>The delectable Ms Davis.</i>
delicious	Delightful. <i>A delicious irony.</i>
<u>delightful</u>	Causing delight; charming. <i>A delightful surprise.</i>
<u>desirable</u>	Wished for as being an attractive, useful, or necessary course of action. <i>A desirable outcome.</i>

<u>enchanting</u>	Delightfully charming or attractive. <i>Enchanting views.</i>
engaging	Attracting or delighting. <i>An engaging frankness.</i>
fetching	Very attractive; capturing interest. <i>A fetching little garment of pink satin.</i>
flavourful	(of food or drink) having a full, distinctive taste; full of flavour. <i>A higher temperature results in a darker more flavourful beer.</i>
flavoursome	(of food or drink) having a pleasant, distinct flavour; tasty. <i>An incredibly rich and flavoursome dish.</i>
gorgeous	Beautiful; very attractive. <i>Gorgeous colours and exquisite decoration.</i>
handsome	Pleasing in appearance especially by reason of conformity to ideals of form and proportion. <i>He was elected by a handsome majority.</i>
<u>irresistible</u>	Overpoweringly attractive. <i>She felt an irresistible urge to object.</i>
<u>juicy</u>	Temptingly appealing. <i>Juicy gossip.</i>
lovely	Very pleasant or enjoyable; delightful. <i>How lovely to see you.</i>
<u>lush</u>	(of vegetation, especially grass) growing luxuriantly. <i>I had some really lush pressies.</i>
mouth-watering	Pleasing to the sense of taste.
nubile	Of girls or women who are eligible to marry. <i>He employed a procession of nubile young secretaries.</i>
<u>palatable</u>	(of food or drink) pleasant to taste. <i>A device that made increased taxation more palatable.</i>
pleasant-tasting	Extremely pleasing to the sense of taste.
prepossessing	Attractive or appealing in appearance. <i>Strong and vigorous and of prepossessing appearance.</i>
<u>pretty</u>	(used ironically) unexpectedly bad. <i>He led me a pretty dance.</i>
<u>ravishing</u>	Delightful; entrancing. <i>A ravishing blonde.</i>
red-hot	Newest or most recent.

<u>scrumptious</u>	(of a person) very attractive. <i>A scrumptious chocolate tart.</i>
<u>sensuous</u>	Attractive or gratifying physically, especially sexually. <i>The work showed a deliberate disregard of the more sensuous and immediately appealing aspects of painting.</i>
sexually attractive	Having power to arouse interest.
<u>striking</u>	Sensational in appearance or thrilling in effect. <i>His striking good looks always created a sensation.</i>
stunning	Extremely impressive or attractive. <i>A stunning detonation with volumes of black smoke.</i>
<u>succulent</u>	(of food) tender, juicy, and tasty. <i>Succulent plants with thick fleshy leaves.</i>
sultry	Characterized by oppressive heat and humidity. <i>The summer was sultry and oppressive.</i>
<u>sweet</u>	With sweetening added. <i>Sweet milk.</i>
<u>tasty</u>	Pleasing to the sense of taste. <i>A tasty deal at the building society.</i>
toothsome	(of a person) good-looking; attractive. <i>A toothsome blonde in a tight dress.</i>
<u>voluptuous</u>	Displaying luxury and furnishing gratification to the senses. <i>Lucullus spent the remainder of his days in voluptuous magnificence.</i>
winning	Gaining, resulting in, or relating to victory in a contest or competition. <i>A winning streak.</i>
<u>yummy</u>	Extremely pleasing to the sense of taste. <i>Who s that yummy guy with the black hair.</i>

meal	The food eaten during a meal. <i>The evening meal.</i>
nip	Sever or remove by pinching or snipping. <i>A keen nip in the air.</i>
palatable	Acceptable to the taste or mind. <i>A device that made increased taxation more palatable.</i>
piquancy	The quality of being pleasantly stimulating or exciting; interest. <i>The tangy soy dip gave them a slightly Asian piquancy.</i>
repast	A meal. <i>A sumptuous repast.</i>
savor	The taste experience when a savoury condiment is taken into the mouth. <i>Savor the soup.</i>
savory	Dwarf aromatic shrub of Mediterranean regions. <i>A past that was scarcely savory.</i>
savour	The taste experience when a savoury condiment is taken into the mouth. <i>Their genuflections savoured of superstition and popery.</i>

Make sour or more sour.

*A false or **sour** note.*

spicy

Exciting or entertaining, especially through being mildly indecent.

*Pasta in a **spicy** tomato sauce.*

sweet

Having a sweet nature befitting an angel or cherub.

*A **sweet** shop.*

tang

A characteristic quality.

*His words came out with a distinct **tang** of broad Lancashire.*

taste

Have a distinctive or characteristic taste.

*This pudding is too sweet for my **taste**.*

tasty

(of food) having a pleasant, distinct flavour.

*A **tasty** young lady.*

zesty

Marked by spirited enjoyment.
