<b>flourishing</b>	Very lively and profitable. <i><b>Flourishing</b> businesses.</i>
<b>gilded</b>	Wealthy and privileged. <i>A painted and <b>gilded</b> wooden ceiling.</i>
<b>grand</b>	Large and impressive in physical size or extent. <i><b>Grand</b> staircase.</i>
<u><b>juicy</b></u>	Suggestive of sexual impropriety. <i>A <b>juicy</b> contract.</i>
<u><b>lavish</b></u>	Sumptuously rich, elaborate, or luxurious. <i><b>Lavish</b> praise.</i>
<u><b>luscious</b></u>	Having strong sexual appeal. <i>He ll fall for a <b>luscious</b> Spanish girl who can match him in passion.</i>
<b>luxuriant</b>	Displaying luxury and furnishing gratification to the senses. <i>Forests of dark <b>luxuriant</b> foliage.</i>
<u><b>luxurious</b></u>	Giving self-indulgent or sensual pleasure. <i>The island s most <b>luxurious</b> hotel.</i>
<b>luxury</b>	Luxurious or of the nature of a luxury. <i><b>Luxury</b> goods.</i>
<u><b>opulent</b></u>	Ostentatiously rich and superior in quality. <i>The <b>opulent</b> comfort of a limousine.</i>
<b>palatial</b>	Relating to or being a palace. <i><b>Palatial</b> furnishings.</i>
<b>princely</b>	(of a sum of money) large or generous (often used ironically). <i>He provided a first class funeral for the <b>princely</b> sum of 2.</i>
<u><b>profuse</b></u>	Produced or growing in extreme abundance. <i>I offered my <b>profuse</b> apologies.</i>
<u><b>prolific</b></u>	Bearing in abundance especially offspring. <i>In captivity tigers are <b>prolific</b> breeders.</i>
<b>red-hot</b>	Newest or most recent.
<b>rich</b>	Marked by richness and fullness of flavor. <i>His <b>rich</b> bass voice.</i>
<b>riotous</b>	Characterized by wild and uncontrolled behaviour. <i><b>Riotous</b> living.</i>

<b><u>succulent</u></b>	(of a plant, especially a xerophyte) having thick fleshy leaves or stems adapted to storing water. <i>A low plant with slightly <b>succulent</b> leaves.</i>
<b><u>sumptuous</u></b>	Rich and superior in quality. <i>The banquet was a <b>sumptuous</b> luxurious meal.</i>
<b>superabundant</b>	Most excessively abundant.
<b><u>teeming</u></b>	Full of people or things; crowded. <i>She walked through the <b>teeming</b> streets.</i>
<b>thriving</b>	Very lively and profitable. <i>The <b>thriving</b> business George has built up.</i>
<b>toothsome</b>	(of food) temptingly tasty. <i>A <b>toothsome</b> blonde in a tight dress.</i>
<b><u>vigorous</u></b>	Characterized by forceful and energetic action or activity. <i>Gave her skirt a <b>vigorous</b> shake.</i>
<b><u>voluptuous</u></b>	Having a large bosom and pleasing curves. <i>A <b>voluptuous</b> woman.</i>

Damp air or atmosphere.

### defoliate

Remove leaves from (a tree, plant, or area of land), for agricultural purposes or as a military tactic.

A **defoliated** poplar.

### deforestation

The action of clearing a wide area of trees.

A key aim is to try to halt widespread **deforestation** in the Amazon.

### dense

Permitting little if any light to pass through because of denseness of matter.

**Dense** vegetation.

### floodplain

An area of low-lying ground adjacent to a river, formed mainly of river sediments and subject to flooding.



<b>forest</b>	Denoting an area that was formerly a royal forest. <i>A <b>forest</b> of high rise apartments.</i>
<b>glade</b>	A tract of land with few or no trees in the middle of a wooded area. <i><b>Glades</b> of birch.</i>
<b>greenery</b>	Green foliage, growing plants, or vegetation.
<b>jungle</b>	A situation or place of bewildering complexity or brutal competitiveness. <i>The garden was a <b>jungle</b> of bluebells.</i>
<b>lea</b>	A field covered with grass or herbage and suitable for grazing by livestock. <i>The lowing herd winds slowly o er the <b>lea</b>.</i>
<b>logging</b>	The work of cutting down trees for timber. <i><b>Logging</b> companies.</i>
<b>luxuriate</b>	Enjoy (something) as a luxury; take self-indulgent delight in. <i>She was luxuriating in a long bath.</i>
<u><b>meadow</b></u>	A piece of low ground near a river. <i>A pleasant campsite in a <b>meadow</b> complete with sparkling stream.</i>
<b>nonporous</b>	Not porous; especially not having vessels that appear as pores.
<b>pasture</b>	Put animals to graze in a pasture. <i>Many a horse was put out to <b>pasture</b> there.</i>
<b>prairie</b>	A treeless grassy plain.
<b>rainforest</b>	A forest with heavy annual rainfall. <i>Tracts of <b>rainforest</b>.</i>
<u><b>rampant</b></u>	(of a plant) having a lush and unchecked growth. <i><b>Rampant</b> sex.</i>
<b>savanna</b>	A flat grassland in tropical or subtropical regions.
<b>subtropical</b>	Relating to or characteristic of the regions adjacent to or bordering on the tropics. <i>North Island enjoys a <b>subtropical</b> climate.</i>
<u><b>swamp</b></u>	Overwhelm or flood with water. <i>The country was <b>swamped</b> with goods from abroad.</i>
<b>timber</b>	Used to warn that a tree is about to fall after being cut. <i>Contracts to cut <b>timber</b>.</i>
<b>tree</b>	Force a hunted animal to take refuge in a tree. <i>Her dog likes to <b>tree</b> squirrels.</i>
<u><b>trek</b></u>	A haul of fish caught using a trek net. <i>Many licences are given to men who <b>trek</b> for sport rather than professional fishermen.</i>

<b>tropical</b>	Of weather or climate; hot and humid as in the tropics. <i><b>Tropical</b> weather.</i>
<b>underbrush</b>	The brush (small trees and bushes and ferns etc.) growing beneath taller trees in a wood or forest.
<b><u>verdant</u></b>	Of the bright green colour of lush grass. <i><b>Verdant</b> valleys.</i>
<b>wetland</b>	Land consisting of marshes or swamps; saturated land. <i>The draining of British <b>wetlands</b>.</i>
<b>woodland</b>	Land covered with trees. <i>Large areas of ancient <b>woodland</b>.</i>
