



| defoliate | Remove leaves from (a tree, plant, or area of land), for agricultural purposes or as a military tactic. <i>A defoliated poplar.</i> |
| <u>deforestation</u> | The action of clearing a wide area of trees. A key aim is to try to halt widespread deforestation in the Amazon. |
| dense | Permitting little if any light to pass through because of denseness of matter. Dense vegetation. |
| floodplain | An area of low-lying ground adjacent to a river, formed mainly of river sediments and subject to flooding. |



| forest | Denoting an area that was formerly a royal forest. A forest of high rise apartments. |

| glade | A tract of land with few or no trees in the middle of a wooded area. <i>Glades of birch.</i> |
| greenery | Green foliage, growing plants, or vegetation. |
| jungle | A situation or place of bewildering complexity or brutal competitiveness. <i>The garden was a jungle of bluebells.</i> |
| lea | A field covered with grass or herbage and suitable for grazing by livestock. <i>The lowing herd winds slowly o er the lea</i> . |
| logging | The work of cutting down trees for timber. <i>Logging</i> companies. |
| luxuriate | Enjoy (something) as a luxury; take self-indulgent delight in. She was luxuriating in a long bath. |
| <u>meadow</u> | A piece of low ground near a river. A pleasant campsite in a meadow complete with sparkling stream. |
| nonporous | Not porous; especially not having vessels that appear as pores. |
| pasture | Put animals to graze in a pasture. Many a horse was put out to pasture there. |
| prairie | A treeless grassy plain. |
| rainforest | A forest with heavy annual rainfall. <i>Tracts of rainforest</i> . |
| <u>rampant</u> | (of a plant) having a lush and unchecked growth. <i>Rampant</i> sex. |
| savanna | A flat grassland in tropical or subtropical regions. |
| subtropical | Relating to or characteristic of the regions adjacent to or bordering on the tropics. North Island enjoys a subtropical climate. |
| <u>swamp</u> | Overwhelm or flood with water. The country was swamp ed with goods from abroad. |
| timber | Used to warn that a tree is about to fall after being cut. <i>Contracts to cut timber.</i> |
| tree | Force a hunted animal to take refuge in a tree. <i>Her dog likes to tree squirrels.</i> |
| <u>trek</u> | A haul of fish caught using a trek net. Many licences are given to men who trek for sport rather than professional fishermen. |



| tropical | Of weather or climate; hot and humid as in the tropics. Tropical weather. |

| underbrush | The brush (small trees and bushes and ferns etc.) growing beneath taller trees in a wood or forest. |
| <u>verdant</u> | Of the bright green colour of lush grass. Verdant valleys. |
| wetland | Land consisting of marshes or swamps; saturated land. <i>The draining of British wetlands.</i> |
| woodland | Land covered with trees. Large areas of ancient woodland . |
