### **Definitions of "Magistrate" as a noun**

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “magistrate” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *A civil officer who administers the law, especially one who conducts a court that deals with minor offences and holds preliminary hearings for more serious ones.*
- *A lay judge or civil authority who administers the law (especially one who conducts a court dealing with minor offenses).*

**acquit** Pronounce not guilty of criminal charges.

**adjudge** Declare to be.

**appellate** Of or relating to or taking account of appeals (usually legal appeals).  
*Courts of **appellate** jurisdiction.*

**arbiter** Someone chosen to judge and decide a disputed issue.  
*The critic was considered to be an **arbiter** of modern literature.*

**assessor** A person who calculates or estimates the price or value of something.  
*The **assessor** interviews the candidates and observes them actually using the language.*

**chancery** A public record office.

**civil** Relating to civil law.  
*Even if he didn't like them he should have been **civil**.*

**court** The place where a court meets.  
*Television cameras were admitted in the **courtroom**.*

**courtroom** The place or room in which a court of law meets.  
*Television cameras were admitted in the **courtroom**.*

**evaluator** An authority who is able to estimate worth or quality.  
*The government appointed an independent **evaluator** to determine the value of the mine.*

**examiner** Someone who administers a test to determine your qualifications.  
*A police vehicle **examiner**.*

**eyewitness** A person who has seen something happen and can give a first-hand description of it.  
***Eyewitness** accounts of the London blitz.*

**judge** Judge tentatively or form an estimate of quantities or time.  
*I cannot **judge** some works of modern art.*

<b>jury</b>	A body of people (typically twelve in number) sworn to give a verdict in a legal case on the basis of evidence submitted to them in court. <i>The <b>jury</b> returned unanimous guilty verdicts.</i>
<b>justice</b>	A public official authorized to decide questions brought before a court of justice. <i>The <b>justice</b> of his case.</i>
<b>lawful</b>	Of a child born within a lawful marriage. <i>The true and <b>lawful</b> king.</i>
<b>lawgiver</b>	A person who draws up and enacts laws. <i>The monarch was supreme executive <b>lawgiver</b> judge and warrior.</i>
<b>lawmaker</b>	A legislator. <i>The game s official <b>lawmakers</b> are preparing the new legislation.</i>
<b>legality</b>	Obligations imposed by law. <i>Documentation testifying to the <b>legality</b> of the arms sale.</i>
<b>magistracy</b>	The position of magistrate. <i>He twice ran for a <b>magistracy</b> in his home town.</i>
<b>mistrial</b>	A trial rendered invalid through an error in the proceedings. <i>The judge dismissed the charge and declared a <b>mistrial</b>.</i>
<b>referee</b>	Be a referee or umpire in a sports competition. <i>He <b>refereed</b> two of the first round group matches.</i>
<b>respectfully</b>	Used to express politeness to mitigate the effect of a refusal or disagreement. <i>The butler bowed <b>respectfully</b> to them both.</i>
<b>ruling</b>	Exercising power or authority. <i>The <b>ruling</b> was reversed in the appeal court.</i>
<b>senate</b>	Assembly possessing high legislative powers. <i>The <b>senate</b> must ratify any treaty with a two thirds majority.</i>
<b>sheriff</b>	An officer of the Supreme Court who enforces judgements and the execution of writs.
<b>suspicion</b>	Doubt about someone's honesty. <i>Police would not say what aroused their <b>suspicions</b>.</i>
<b>trial</b>	Of a horse dog or other animal compete in trials. <i>The newspaper accounts of the <b>trial</b>.</i>
<b>umpire</b>	Be a referee or umpire in a sports competition. <i>An <b>umpire</b> was appointed to settle the tax case.</i>
<b>unbiased</b>	Showing no prejudice for or against something; impartial. <i>His assessment of the benefits and drawbacks was <b>unbiased</b>.</i>
