## Synonyms of "Magnified" as an adjective (2 Words)

- enlarged**      Enlarged to an abnormal degree.  
                    ***Enlarged** joints.*
- exaggerated**      Enlarged or altered beyond normal proportions.  
                    *Thick lenses **exaggerated** the size of her eyes.*



## Associations of "Magnified" (30 Words)

- aggrandize**      Increase the power, status, or wealth of.  
                    *He hoped to **aggrandize** himself by dying a hero's death.*
- amplification**      The act of increasing voltage or power or current.  
                    *The words no real prospect of succeeding do not need any **amplification**.*
- amplify**      To enlarge beyond bounds or the truth.  
                    ***Amplify** sound.*

<b>augment</b>	A vowel prefixed to past tenses of verbs in Greek and certain other Indo-European languages. <i>The pressure <b>augmented</b>.</i>
<b>augmentation</b>	The statement of a theme in notes of greater duration (usually twice the length of the original). <i>The <b>augmentation</b> of the curriculum with new subjects.</i>
<b>bloat</b>	Make bloated or swollen. <i>The fungus has <b>bloated</b> their abdomens.</i>
<b>broaden</b>	Become broader. <i><b>Broaden</b> the road.</i>
<b>corroboration</b>	Confirmation that some fact or statement is true through the use of documentary evidence. <i>There is no independent <b>corroboration</b> for this.</i>
<b>dilate</b>	Become wider. <i><b>Dilated</b> pupils.</i>
<b>distend</b>	Cause to expand as it by internal pressure. <i>The abdomen <b>distended</b> rapidly.</i>
<b>diversify</b>	Make (more) diverse. <i><b>Diversify</b> a course of study.</i>
<b>enlarge</b>	Add details, as to an account or idea; clarify the meaning of and discourse in a learned way, usually in writing. <i>She <b>enlarged</b> the flower beds.</i>
<b>escalation</b>	An increase to counteract a perceived discrepancy. <i>An <b>escalation</b> of violence.</i>
<b>expand</b>	Expand the influence of. <i>The minister <b>expanded</b> on the government's proposals.</i>
<b>expanded</b>	Increased in extent or size or bulk or scope. <i>The <b>expanded</b> fins of the ray.</i>
<b>expansion</b>	The act of increasing (something) in size or volume or quantity or scope. <i>A small <b>expansion</b> of industry.</i>
<b>expansionist</b>	Relating to or characteristic of a policy of territorial or economic expansion. <i>The imperial government became increasingly bent on <b>expansionist</b> policies.</i>
<b>exponentially</b>	(with reference to an increase) more and more rapidly. <i>Values distributed <b>exponentially</b> according to a given time constant.</i>
<b>extend</b>	Thrust or extend out. <i>My memory <b>extends</b> back to my fourth year of life.</i>

<b><u>extension</u></b>	A room or rooms added to an existing building. <i>They applied for an <b>extension</b> of the loan.</i>
<b>increase</b>	The amount by which something increases. <i>The boss finally <b>increased</b> her salary.</i>
<b>magnification</b>	A magnified reproduction of something. <i>The lines are only visible under high <b>magnification</b>.</i>
<b><u>maximize</u></b>	Make as large or great as possible. <i>The company was aiming to <b>maximize</b> profits.</i>
<b>overstate</b>	State too strongly; exaggerate. <i>I <b>overstated</b> my case to make my point.</i>
<b>prolongation</b>	The act of prolonging something. <i>An examiner analysed the angle formed by the <b>prolongations</b> of the lines.</i>
<b>stretched</b>	Extended or spread over a wide area or distance. <i>Broad fields lay <b>stretched</b> on both sides of us.</i>
<b>stretching</b>	Exercise designed to extend the limbs and muscles to their full extent.
<b>swell</b>	A crescendo followed by a decrescendo. <i>The soft <b>swell</b> of her breast.</i>
<b>telescopic</b>	Capable of viewing and magnifying distant objects. <i>A <b>telescopic</b> eye.</i>
<b>widen</b>	Become broader or wider or more extensive. <i>The road <b>widened</b>.</i>
