enlarged Enlarged to an abnormal degree.
Enlarged joints.

exaggerated Enlarged or altered beyond normal proportions.
*Thick lenses **exaggerated** the size of her eyes.*

aggrandize Increase the power, status, or wealth of.
*He hoped to **aggrandize** himself by dying a hero's death.*

amplification The act of increasing voltage or power or current.
*The words no real prospect of succeeding do not need any **amplification**.*

amplify To enlarge beyond bounds or the truth.
***Amplify** sound.*

augment	A vowel prefixed to past tenses of verbs in Greek and certain other Indo-European languages. <i>The pressure augmented.</i>
augmentation	The statement of a theme in notes of greater duration (usually twice the length of the original). <i>The augmentation of the curriculum with new subjects.</i>
bloat	Make bloated or swollen. <i>The fungus has bloated their abdomens.</i>
broaden	Become broader. <i>Broaden the road.</i>
corroboration	Confirmation that some fact or statement is true through the use of documentary evidence. <i>There is no independent corroboration for this.</i>
dilate	Become wider. <i>Dilated pupils.</i>
distend	Cause to expand as it by internal pressure. <i>The abdomen distended rapidly.</i>
diversify	Make (more) diverse. <i>Diversify a course of study.</i>
enlarge	Add details, as to an account or idea; clarify the meaning of and discourse in a learned way, usually in writing. <i>She enlarged the flower beds.</i>
escalation	An increase to counteract a perceived discrepancy. <i>An escalation of violence.</i>
expand	Expand the influence of. <i>The minister expanded on the government s proposals.</i>
expanded	Increased in extent or size or bulk or scope. <i>The expanded fins of the ray.</i>
expansion	The act of increasing (something) in size or volume or quantity or scope. <i>A small expansion of industry.</i>
expansionist	Relating to or characteristic of a policy of territorial or economic expansion. <i>The imperial government became increasingly bent on expansionist policies.</i>
exponentially	(with reference to an increase) more and more rapidly. <i>Values distributed exponentially according to a given time constant.</i>
extend	Thrust or extend out. <i>My memory extends back to my fourth year of life.</i>

<u>extension</u>	A room or rooms added to an existing building. <i>They applied for an extension of the loan.</i>
increase	The amount by which something increases. <i>The boss finally increased her salary.</i>
magnification	A magnified reproduction of something. <i>The lines are only visible under high magnification.</i>
<u>maximize</u>	Make as large or great as possible. <i>The company was aiming to maximize profits.</i>
overstate	State too strongly; exaggerate. <i>I overstated my case to make my point.</i>
prolongation	The act of prolonging something. <i>An examiner analysed the angle formed by the prolongations of the lines.</i>
stretched	Extended or spread over a wide area or distance. <i>Broad fields lay stretched on both sides of us.</i>
stretching	Exercise designed to extend the limbs and muscles to their full extent.
swell	A crescendo followed by a decrescendo. <i>The soft swell of her breast.</i>
telescopic	Capable of viewing and magnifying distant objects. <i>A telescopic eye.</i>
widen	Become broader or wider or more extensive. <i>The road widened.</i>
