Synonyms of "Maid" as a noun (19 Words)

amah	A female domestic.
celibate	An unmarried person who has taken a religious vow of chastity. <i>He s attracted and attractive to women and yet he lives as a celibate.</i>
chambermaid	A maid who is employed to clean and care for bedrooms (now primarily in hotels).
<u>domestic</u>	A product not made abroad. <i>They are often called to sort out a domestic.</i>
drudge	A laborer who is obliged to do menial work. <i>I felt like a household drudge.</i>
female servant	An animal that produces gametes (ova) that can be fertilized by male gametes (spermatozoa).
<u>girl</u>	A person s girlfriend. <i>His girlfriend kicked him out.</i>

housemaid	A female domestic employee, especially one who cleans reception rooms and bedrooms.
lady's maid	An unmarried girl (especially a virgin).
maiden	(cricket) an over in which no runs are scored. <i>Two knights fought to win the hand of a fair maiden.</i>
maidservant	A female domestic servant.
<u>menial</u>	A person with a menial job.
<u>miss</u>	A young female. <i>It is the public who decide whether a film is a hit or a miss.</i>
parlourmaid	A maid employed to wait at table.
serving maid	An individual quantity of food or drink taken as part of a meal.
unmarried girl	A girl or young woman with whom a man is romantically involved.
vestal virgin	A person who is born while the sun is in Virgo.
young lady	United States film and television actress (1913-2000).
young woman	United States jazz tenor saxophonist (1909-1959).



Usage Examples of "Maid" as a noun

- *Mary eventually managed to find a job as a maid.*



Associations of "Maid" (30 Words)

- acolyte** An assistant or follower.
*She runs the department through a small group of **acolytes**.*
- allegiant** Steadfast in devotion (especially to your lawful monarch or government).
*It is impossible to be **allegiant** to two opposing forces.*
- butler** English novelist who described a fictitious land he called Erewhon (1835-1902).
- chore** A specific piece of work required to be done as a duty or for a specific fee.
*He sees interviews as a **chore**.*
- clean** Remove while making clean.
*A **clean** break.*

<u>cleaner</u>	A device for cleaning such as a vacuum cleaner. <i>My suit s at the cleaners.</i>
cleaning	The action of making something clean, especially the inside of a house. <i>The housekeeper will help with the cleaning.</i>
dutiful	Willingly obedient out of a sense of duty and respect. <i>A dutiful citizen.</i>
enslave	Make a slave of; bring into servitude. <i>They were enslaved by their need to take drugs.</i>
errand	The purpose or object of an errand. <i>She knew that if she stated her errand she would not be able to see him.</i>
factotum	An employee who does all kinds of work. <i>He was employed as the general factotum.</i>
<u>flatter</u>	Give an unrealistically favourable impression of. <i>I was very flattered to be given the commission.</i>
footman	A liveried servant whose duties include admitting visitors and waiting at table.
<u>housekeeper</u>	A servant who is employed to perform domestic task in a household.
housekeeping	The regulation of metabolic functions that are common to all cells. <i>Writing barely pays my part of the housekeeping.</i>
<u>janitor</u>	Someone employed to clean and maintain a building.
lackey	A person who tries to please someone in order to gain a personal advantage. <i>Lackeys were waiting to help them from the carriage.</i>
laundress	A working woman who takes in washing.
<u>minion</u>	A servile or fawning dependant. <i>He gets oppressed minions like me to fob them off.</i>
<u>mother</u>	A term of address for a mother superior. <i>A mother of three.</i>
retainer	A reduced rent paid to retain accommodation during a period of non-occupancy. <i>Faithful family retainers.</i>
scullion	A servant assigned the most menial kitchen tasks.
<u>secretary</u>	The principal assistant of a UK government minister or ambassador. <i>She was secretary to David Wilby MP.</i>
<u>servant</u>	A person employed in the service of a government. <i>He was a great servant of the Labour Party.</i>

- steward** An attendant on an airplane.
*The event was organized and **stewarded** properly.*
- sweeping** Dirt or refuse collected by sweeping.
***Sweeping** generalizations.*
- sycophant** A person who tries to please someone in order to gain a personal advantage.
- toady** A person who behaves obsequiously to someone important.
*She imagined him **toadying** to his rich clients.*
- vacuum** A vacuum cleaner.
*The political **vacuum** left by the death of the Emperor.*
- wash** The erosive process of washing away soil or gravel by water as from a roadway.
*The plan's impact on jobs would be a **wash** creating as many as it costs.*
