awe	Capacity to inspire awe. <i>The sight filled me with awe.</i>
awesomeness	The quality of being extremely good; excellence. <i>The Hubble telescope presents the mind blowing awesomeness of the universe.</i>
dignity	A composed or serious manner or style. <i>Showed his true dignity when under pressure.</i>
dominion	Sovereignty or control. <i>Man s attempt to establish dominion over nature.</i>
exaltation	A flock of larks (especially a flock of larks in flight overhead). <i>She was in a frenzy of exaltation and terror.</i>

glory	A state of high honor. <i>He valued glory above life itself.</i>
grandeur	High rank or social importance. <i>The majestic grandeur and simplicity of Roman architecture.</i>
grandness	A prominent status. <i>Advertisers capitalize on the grandness and elegance it brings to their products.</i>
highness	The quality of being high. <i>Responsible for the highness of the rates.</i>
impressiveness	The quality of making a strong or vivid impression on the mind.
loftiness	The quality of being high or lofty.
magnificence	A title or form of address for a monarch or other distinguished person. <i>The magnificence of the surrounding countryside.</i>
nobility	The quality of being noble in character. <i>A member of the English nobility.</i>
nobleness	The quality of elevation of mind and exaltation of character or ideals or conduct.
pomp	Ceremonial elegance and splendor. <i>Entertaining overseas visitors with the right degree of pomp.</i>
power	Denoting a sports player team or style of play that makes use of power rather than finesse. <i>The mysterious presence of an evil power.</i>
pride	A group of lions. <i>In the pride of youth.</i>
regality	A territory subject to regality jurisdiction. <i>Enid awaited her guests radiating regality.</i>
resplendence	Brilliant radiant beauty.
royal highness	A sail set next above the topgallant on a royal mast.
royalness	The fact or quality of being royal; majesty; magnificence.
royalty	A royal right (now especially over minerals) granted by the sovereign to an individual or corporation. <i>Diplomats heads of state and royalty shared tables at the banquet.</i>
serenity	A title given to a reigning prince or similar dignitary. <i>An oasis of serenity amidst the bustling city.</i>
solemnity	A formal, dignified rite or ceremony. <i>His ashes were laid to rest with great solemnity.</i>

sovereignty	The authority of a state to govern another state. <i>National sovereignty.</i>
splendour	A quality that outshines the usual. <i>The splendours of the imperial court.</i>
stateliness	Impressiveness in scale or proportion. <i>She served coffee with great stateliness.</i>
sublimity	Nobility in thought or feeling or style.
<u>supremacy</u>	The state or condition of being superior to all others in authority, power, or status. <i>The supremacy of the king.</i>

baton	A thin stick used by a conductor to direct an orchestra or choir. <i>Batons of cheddar cheese.</i>
corinthian	Or pertaining to the Corinthian style of architecture.
diadem	An ornamental jeweled headdress signifying sovereignty. <i>He refused the diadem of all the Caesars.</i>
<u>dynasty</u>	A sequence of powerful leaders in the same family. <i>The Guinness dynasty.</i>
<u>emperor</u>	The male ruler of an empire. <i>He became emperor in 1930.</i>
<u>empire</u>	An extensive sphere of activity controlled by one person or group. <i>He encouraged the Greeks in their dream of empire in Asia Minor.</i>
grandeur	The quality of elevation of mind and exaltation of character or ideals or conduct. <i>An imaginative mix of old fashioned grandeur and colorful art.</i>
greatness	The quality of being great; eminence or distinction. <i>Elgar s greatness as a composer.</i>
<u>imperial</u>	Belonging to or befitting a supreme ruler. <i>Britain s imperial past.</i>
<u>king</u>	Used in names of animals and plants that are particularly large e g king cobra. <i>A country where football is king.</i>
<u>kingdom</u>	The domain ruled by a king or queen. <i>The kingdom of dreams.</i>
kingship	The state or position of being a king. <i>Edmund assumed kingship of Mercia.</i>
majestic	Majestic in manner or bearing superior to mundane matters. <i>His majestic presence.</i>
<u>noble</u>	Especially in former times a person of noble rank or birth. <i>Chardonnay is the noble grape from which some of the finest white wines are produced.</i>
<u>palace</u>	A large, splendid house or place of entertainment. <i>The royal palace.</i>

patrician	A member of a long-established wealthy family. <i>Patrician tastes.</i>
prince	The son of a monarch. <i>He was the prince of a small kingdom that was now part of Pakistan.</i>
princess	A close female relative of a monarch, especially a granddaughter. <i>Stop being such a princess.</i>
principality	Territory ruled by a prince.
queen	Become a queen. <i>Paris is the queen of cities.</i>
regal	Of, resembling, or fit for a monarch, especially in being magnificent or dignified. <i>Her regal bearing.</i>
regalia	The distinctive clothing worn and ornaments carried at formal occasions as an indication of status. <i>The Bishop of Florence in full regalia.</i>
regency	The particular period of a regency especially in Britain from 1811 to 1820 and in France from 1715 to 1723. <i>The boy being a minor there would have to be a regency.</i>
royal	A member of the royal family. <i>Treated with royal acclaim.</i>
ruler	A straight strip or cylinder of plastic, wood, metal, or other rigid material, typically marked at regular intervals and used to draw straight lines or measure distances.
scepter	The imperial authority symbolized by a scepter.
sovereign	(of political bodies) not controlled by outside forces. <i>A sovereign democratic republic.</i>
ukase	An arbitrary or peremptory command. <i>Tsar Alexander I issued his famous ukase unilaterally decreeing the North Pacific Coast Russian territory.</i>
vassal	A person holding a fief; a person who owes allegiance and service to a feudal lord. <i>A vassal state of the Ottoman Empire.</i>
