<b>glory</b>	A state of high honor. <i>He valued <b>glory</b> above life itself.</i>
<b>grandeur</b>	High rank or social importance. <i>The majestic <b>grandeur</b> and simplicity of Roman architecture.</i>
<b>grandness</b>	A prominent status. <i>Advertisers capitalize on the <b>grandness</b> and elegance it brings to their products.</i>
<b>highness</b>	The quality of being high. <i>Responsible for the <b>highness</b> of the rates.</i>
<b>impressiveness</b>	The quality of making a strong or vivid impression on the mind.
<b>loftiness</b>	The quality of being high or lofty.
<b>magnificence</b>	A title or form of address for a monarch or other distinguished person. <i>The <b>magnificence</b> of the surrounding countryside.</i>
<b>nobility</b>	The quality of being noble in character. <i>A member of the English <b>nobility</b>.</i>
<b>nobleness</b>	The quality of elevation of mind and exaltation of character or ideals or conduct.
<b>pomp</b>	Ceremonial elegance and splendor. <i>Entertaining overseas visitors with the right degree of <b>pomp</b>.</i>
<b>power</b>	Denoting a sports player team or style of play that makes use of power rather than finesse. <i>The mysterious presence of an evil <b>power</b>.</i>
<b>pride</b>	A group of lions. <i>In the <b>pride</b> of youth.</i>
<b>regality</b>	A territory subject to regality jurisdiction. <i>Enid awaited her guests radiating <b>regality</b>.</i>
<b>resplendence</b>	Brilliant radiant beauty.
<b>royal highness</b>	A sail set next above the topgallant on a royal mast.
<b>royalness</b>	The fact or quality of being royal; majesty; magnificence.
<b>royalty</b>	A royal right (now especially over minerals) granted by the sovereign to an individual or corporation. <i>Diplomats heads of state and <b>royalty</b> shared tables at the banquet.</i>
<b>serenity</b>	A title given to a reigning prince or similar dignitary. <i>An oasis of <b>serenity</b> amidst the bustling city.</i>
<b>solemnity</b>	A formal, dignified rite or ceremony. <i>His ashes were laid to rest with great <b>solemnity</b>.</i>

<b>sovereignty</b>	The authority of a state to govern another state. <i>National <b>sovereignty</b>.</i>
<b>splendour</b>	A quality that outshines the usual. <i>The <b>splendours</b> of the imperial court.</i>
<b>stateliness</b>	Impressiveness in scale or proportion. <i>She served coffee with great <b>stateliness</b>.</i>
<b>sublimity</b>	Nobility in thought or feeling or style.
<b>supremacy</b>	The state or condition of being superior to all others in authority, power, or status. <i>The <b>supremacy</b> of the king.</i>

<b>corinthian</b>	Or pertaining to the Corinthian style of architecture.
<b>diadem</b>	An ornamental jeweled headdress signifying sovereignty. <i>He refused the <b>diadem</b> of all the Caesars.</i>

<b>grandeur</b>	The quality of elevation of mind and exaltation of character or ideals or conduct. <i>An imaginative mix of old fashioned <b>grandeur</b> and colorful art.</i>
<b>greatness</b>	The quality of being great; eminence or distinction. <i>Elgar s <b>greatness</b> as a composer.</i>
<a href="#"><u>imperial</u></a>	Belonging to or befitting a supreme ruler. <i>Britain s <b>imperial</b> past.</i>
<a href="#"><u>king</u></a>	Used in names of animals and plants that are particularly large e g king cobra. <i>A country where football is <b>king</b>.</i>
<a href="#"><u>kingdom</u></a>	The domain ruled by a king or queen. <i>The <b>kingdom</b> of dreams.</i>
<b>kingship</b>	The state or position of being a king. <i>Edmund assumed <b>kingship</b> of Mercia.</i>
<b>majestic</b>	Majestic in manner or bearing superior to mundane matters. <i>His <b>majestic</b> presence.</i>
<a href="#"><u>noble</u></a>	Especially in former times a person of noble rank or birth. <i>Chardonnay is the <b>noble</b> grape from which some of the finest white wines are produced.</i>
<a href="#"><u>palace</u></a>	A large, splendid house or place of entertainment. <i>The royal <b>palace</b>.</i>

<b>patrician</b>	A member of a long-established wealthy family. <i>Patrician tastes.</i>
<b>prince</b>	The son of a monarch. <i>He was the <b>prince</b> of a small kingdom that was now part of Pakistan.</i>
<b>princess</b>	A close female relative of a monarch, especially a granddaughter. <i>Stop being such a <b>princess</b>.</i>
<b>principality</b>	Territory ruled by a prince.
<b>queen</b>	Become a queen. <i>Paris is the <b>queen</b> of cities.</i>
<b>regal</b>	Of, resembling, or fit for a monarch, especially in being magnificent or dignified. <i>Her <b>regal</b> bearing.</i>
<b>regalia</b>	The distinctive clothing worn and ornaments carried at formal occasions as an indication of status. <i>The Bishop of Florence in full <b>regalia</b>.</i>
<b>regency</b>	The particular period of a regency especially in Britain from 1811 to 1820 and in France from 1715 to 1723. <i>The boy being a minor there would have to be a <b>regency</b>.</i>
<b>royal</b>	A member of the royal family. <i>Treated with <b>royal</b> acclaim.</i>
<b>ruler</b>	A straight strip or cylinder of plastic, wood, metal, or other rigid material, typically marked at regular intervals and used to draw straight lines or measure distances.
<b>scepter</b>	The imperial authority symbolized by a scepter.
<b>sovereign</b>	(of political bodies) not controlled by outside forces. <i>A <b>sovereign</b> democratic republic.</i>
<b>ukase</b>	An arbitrary or peremptory command. <i>Tsar Alexander I issued his famous <b>ukase</b> unilaterally decreeing the North Pacific Coast Russian territory.</i>
<b>vassal</b>	A person holding a fief; a person who owes allegiance and service to a feudal lord. <i>A <b>vassal</b> state of the Ottoman Empire.</i>
