### Definitions of "Majority" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “majority” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *More than half of the votes.*
- *The age at which persons are considered competent to manage their own affairs.*
- *The property resulting from being or relating to the greater in number of two parts; the main part.*
- *The greater number.*
- *(elections) more than half of the votes.*
- *The rank or office of a major.*
- *The number by which the votes cast for one party or candidate exceed those for the next.*
- *The age at which a person is legally a full adult, usually either 18 or 21.*
- *The number by which votes for one candidate are more than those for all other candidates together.*
- *A party or group receiving the greater number of votes.*



**Synonyms of "Majority" as a noun (21 Words)**

<b>absolute majority</b>	Something that is conceived or that exists independently and not in relation to other things; something that does not depend on anything else and is beyond human control; something that is not relative.
<b><u>adulthood</u></b>	The period of time in your life after your physical growth has stopped and you are fully developed. <i>Most of the larvae die although some survive to <b>adulthood</b>.</i>
<b>best part</b>	Canadian physiologist (born in the United States) who assisted F. G. Banting in research leading to the discovery of insulin (1899-1978).
<b>better part</b>	The superior one of two alternatives.
<b><u>bulk</u></b>	Large in quantity. <i><b>Bulk</b> orders of over 100 copies.</i>
<b>coming of age</b>	The temporal property of becoming nearer in time.
<b>greater number</b>	A person who has achieved distinction and honor in some field.
<b>greater part</b>	A person who has achieved distinction and honor in some field.
<b>larger number</b>	A garment size for a large person.
<b>larger part</b>	A garment size for a large person.
<b>main part</b>	A principal pipe in a system that distributes water or gas or electricity or that collects sewage.
<b>major part</b>	A commissioned military officer in the United States Army or Air Force or Marines; below lieutenant colonel and above captain.
<b>manhood</b>	The state or period of being a man rather than a child. <i>He feared the speedy decline of all <b>manhood</b>.</i>
<b>margin</b>	A profit margin. <i>The notations in the <b>margin</b>.</i>
<b><u>maturity</u></b>	An insurance policy security etc having a fixed maturity date. <i>The <b>maturity</b> date.</i>
<b>more than half</b>	English statesman who opposed Henry VIII's divorce from Catherine of Aragon and was imprisoned and beheaded; recalled for his concept of Utopia, the ideal state.
<b>seniority</b>	A privileged position earned by reason of longer service or higher rank. <i>Pay and benefits rise with <b>seniority</b>.</i>
<b>superiority of numbers</b>	The quality of being at a competitive advantage.
<b>superiority of votes</b>	Displaying a sense of being better than others.

**winning margin**

Succeeding with great difficulty.

**womanhood**

Women considered collectively.

*She was on the very brink of **womanhood**.*

**bulk**

The greater part of something.  
*He took dietary supplements to **bulk** up as he lifted weights.*

**concurrence**

The fact of two or more events or circumstances happening or existing at the same time.  
*Delays can be avoided by arriving at political **concurrence** at the start.*

**considerable**

(of a person) having merit or distinction.  
*Spent a **considerable** amount of time on the problem.*

**countless**

Too numerous to be counted.  
*She apologized **countless** times before.*

**disservice**

A harmful action.  
*He did them a **disservice**.*

<b>enormous</b>	Very large in size, quantity, or extent. <i>The possibilities are <b>enormous</b>.</i>
<b>gargantuan</b>	Enormous. <i>A <b>gargantuan</b> appetite.</i>
<b>huge</b>	Extremely large; enormous. <i><b>Huge</b> popular demand for higher education.</i>
<b>incalculable</b>	Too much to be measured. <i>Under the pressure of anxiety his temper became <b>incalculable</b>.</i>
<b>large</b>	A garment size for a large person. <i>A <b>large</b> sum.</i>
<b>lot</b>	A plot of land assigned for sale or for a particular use. <i>A vacant <b>lot</b>.</i>
<b>mammoth</b>	So exceedingly large or extensive as to suggest a giant or mammoth. <i>Supervision of a ward is a <b>mammoth</b> task.</i>
<b>many</b>	The majority of people. <i>A good <b>many</b>.</i>
<b>massive</b>	Being the same substance throughout. <i><b>Massive</b> changes.</i>
<b>more</b>	Forming the comparative of adjectives and adverbs especially those of more than one syllable. <i>For them enthusiasm is <b>more</b> important than talent.</i>
<b>most</b>	Almost. <i>The baby was <b>almost</b> asleep when the alarm sounded.</i>
<b>much</b>	For a large part of one's time; often. <i>We enjoyed ourselves very <b>much</b>.</i>
<b>number</b>	Add up in number or quantity. <i>The demonstrators <b>numbered</b> more than 5 000.</i>
<b>overwhelming</b>	Very strong; urgently felt. <i><b>Overwhelming</b> joy.</i>
<b>ratio</b>	The quantitative relation between two amounts showing the number of times one value contains or is contained within the other. <i>The <b>ratio</b> of men s jobs to women s is 8 to 1.</i>
<b>scads</b>	A large number or quantity. <i>They raised <b>scads</b> of children.</i>
<b>sized</b>	Having a specified size. <i>A grapefruit <b>sized</b> lump.</i>

<b>tremendous</b>	Very great in amount, scale, or intensity. <i>A plane took off with a <b>tremendous</b> noise.</i>
<b>twelve</b>	The cardinal number that is the sum of eleven and one.
<b>untold</b>	Of an incalculable amount. <i><b>Untold</b> suffering.</i>
<b>upstream</b>	In the direction against a stream's current. <i>Two miles <b>upstream</b> from London.</i>
<b>vast</b>	An immense space. <i>A <b>vast</b> plain full of orchards.</i>
<b>virtually</b>	(of actions or states) slightly short of or not quite accomplished; all but. <i><b>Virtually</b> all the parties signed the contract.</i>
<b>voluminous</b>	Large in volume or bulk. <i>A subject of <b>voluminous</b> legislation.</i>
