Associations of "Make a change" (30 Words)

adjustment	The act of adjusting something to match a standard. <i>Only slight adjustments to the boat are necessary.</i>
alter	Make an alteration to. <i>This dress needs to be altered.</i>
compatibility	A feeling of sympathetic understanding. <i>They felt the bond of true compatibility.</i>
conversion	Act of exchanging one type of money or security for another. <i>Conversion from Fahrenheit to Centigrade.</i>
convert	A person who has been converted to another religious or political belief. <i>Convert slaves to laborers.</i>
defection	The state of having rejected your religious beliefs or your political party or a cause (often in favor of opposing beliefs or causes). <i>A number of defections by leading ballet dancers.</i>
disabuse	Persuade (someone) that an idea or belief is mistaken. <i>He quickly disabused me of my fanciful notions.</i>
diversion	An activity that diverts the mind from tedious or serious concerns; a recreation or pastime. <i>The road was closed and diversions put into operation.</i>
fluctuation	An irregular rising and falling in number or amount; a variation. <i>The current fluctuation in energy prices.</i>
interchange	A station where passengers may change from one railway line, bus service, etc. to another. <i>Interchange this screw for one of a smaller size.</i>
interchangeable	Such that the arguments or roles can be interchanged. <i>Interchangeable electric outlets.</i>
metamorphose	Change completely the nature or appearance of. <i>The extreme heat metamorphosed the sandstone baking it white and producing a quartzite rock.</i>

<u>modification</u>	The act of making something different (as e.g. the size of a garment). <i>The neighborhood had undergone few modifications since his last visit years ago.</i>
modify	Add a modifier to a constituent. <i>Please modify this letter to make it more polite.</i>
permute	Change the order or arrangement of. <i>We wish to permute the order of the bytes.</i>
remold	Give new treads to (a tire).
replace	Put (something) back in a previous place or position. <i>He drained his glass and replaced it on the bar.</i>
reschedule	Arrange a new scheme of repayments of (a debt). <i>The concert has been rescheduled for September.</i>
revisal	The act of rewriting something.
revise	Revise or reorganize especially for the purpose of updating and improving. <i>He had cause to revise his opinion a moment after expressing it.</i>
transfigure	Change completely the nature or appearance of. <i>The world is made luminous and is transfigured.</i>
<u>transform</u>	Change a mathematical entity by transformation. <i>Transform energy to light.</i>
transformation	A sudden dramatic change of scenery on stage. <i>British society underwent a radical transformation.</i>
transition	Make or undergo a transition from one state or system to another. <i>He began the transition from female to male in the 10th grade.</i>
transmogrify	Transform in a surprising or magical manner. <i>His home was transmogrified into a hippy crash pad.</i>
<u>transmute</u>	Alter the nature of (elements). <i>The quest to transmute lead into gold.</i>
turnabout	Turning in the opposite direction. <i>The move was a significant turnabout for the company.</i>
<u>variability</u>	The quality of being uneven and lacking uniformity. <i>A great deal of variability in quality.</i>
<u>variance</u>	A quantity equal to the square of the standard deviation. <i>They were at variance with all their previous allies.</i>
<u>vary</u>	Become different in some particular way, without permanently losing one's or its former characteristics or essence. <i>The properties vary in price.</i>
