build	Commission finance and oversee the building of something. <i>People scrimp and save to build a better life for their children.</i>
compel	Bring about (something) by the use of force or pressure. <i>The water shortage compels conservation.</i>
compulsion	An irrational motive for performing trivial or repetitive actions, even against your will. <i>He felt a compulsion to babble on about what had happened.</i>
concoct	Make a concoction of by mixing. <i>She began to concoct a dinner likely to appeal to him.</i>
constrain	Restrict. <i>Calypso in her caves constrained his stay.</i>
construct	Form (a sentence) according to grammatical rules. <i>These rules tell us how to construct a grammatical sentence in a given language.</i>
create	Create or manufacture a man made product. <i>Create a furor.</i>
creativity	The ability to create. <i>Firms are keen to encourage creativity.</i>
devise	A gift of real property by will. <i>Devise a plan to take over the director s office.</i>
fabricate	Construct or manufacture (an industrial product), especially from prepared components. <i>Officers fabricated evidence.</i>
factory	A plant consisting of one or more buildings with facilities for manufacturing. <i>He is chaplain to the British factory at St Petersburg.</i>

figment	A thing that someone believes to be real but that exists only in their imagination. <i>It really was Ross and not a figment of her overheated imagination.</i>
forge	Create (something) strong, enduring, or successful. <i>Forge a pair of tongues.</i>
idea	The aim or purpose. <i>The idea of linking pay to performance has caught on.</i>
imagination	The faculty or action of forming new ideas, or images or concepts of external objects not present to the senses. <i>She'd never been blessed with a vivid imagination.</i>
impromptu	Done without being planned, organized, or rehearsed. <i>He spoke impromptu.</i>
improvised	Done or made using whatever is available; makeshift. <i>Crossed the river on improvised bridges.</i>
instinctive	Unthinking; prompted by (or as if by) instinct. <i>He was an instinctive cook.</i>
invent	Make up something artificial or untrue. <i>He invented an improved form of the steam engine.</i>
invention	The action of inventing something, typically a process or device. <i>Medieval inventions included spectacles for reading and the spinning wheel.</i>
inventive	Showing creativity or original thought. <i>The most inventive composer of his time.</i>
inventor	Someone who is the first to think of or make something.
makeshift	Done or made using whatever is available. <i>Arranging a row of chairs to form a makeshift bed.</i>
manufacture	Manufactured articles. <i>Julia manufactured a smile.</i>
originality	The ability to think and act independently. <i>He congratulated her on the originality of her costume.</i>
produce	Make or manufacture from components or raw materials. <i>The video was produced and directed by film maker Neil Campbell.</i>
productive	Achieving a significant amount or result. <i>A productive vineyard.</i>
ruse	An action intended to deceive someone; a trick. <i>Emma tried to think of a ruse to get Paul out of the house.</i>

spontaneous Having an open, natural, and uninhibited manner.
Spontaneous laughter.
