build	Build or establish something abstract. <i>Build a reputation.</i>
compel	Necessitate or exact. <i>A sense of duty compelled Harry to answer her questions.</i>
<u>compulsion</u>	An irrational motive for performing trivial or repetitive actions, even against your will. <i>He felt a compulsion to babble on about what had happened.</i>
<u>concoct</u>	Make a concoction of by mixing. <i>His cronies concocted a simple plan.</i>
constrain	Bring about (something) by compulsion. <i>Calypso in her caves constrained his stay.</i>
construct	Put together out of artificial or natural components or parts. <i>Construct an equilateral triangle.</i>
create	Create or manufacture a man made product. <i>Callas created only one role and that was Eurydice.</i>
creativity	The ability to create.
creativity	The use of imagination or original ideas to create something; inventiveness. <i>Firms are keen to encourage creativity.</i>
<u>devise</u>	A will disposing of real property. <i>A training programme should be devised.</i>
fabricate	Make up something artificial or untrue. <i>You will have to fabricate an exhaust system.</i>
<u>factory</u>	A person or organization that continually produces a great quantity of something specified. <i>A clothing factory.</i>

figment	A thing that someone believes to be real but that exists only in their imagination. <i>A figment of the imagination.</i>
forge	Create (something) strong, enduring, or successful. <i>He forged a great suit of black armour.</i>
idea	A personal view. <i>It was not a good idea.</i>
imagination	The faculty or action of forming new ideas, or images or concepts of external objects not present to the senses. <i>Her story captured the public's imagination.</i>
impromptu	A short musical passage that seems to have been made spontaneously without advance preparation. <i>An impromptu press conference.</i>
improvised	Done or made using whatever is available. <i>Crossed the river on improvised bridges.</i>
instinctive	Relating to or prompted by instinct; done without conscious thought. <i>An instinctive distaste for conflict.</i>
invent	Make up (an idea, name, story, etc.), especially so as to deceive someone. <i>I did not have to invent any tales about my past.</i>
invention	The creation of something in the mind. <i>The invention of printing in the 15th century.</i>
inventive	Showing creativity or original thought. <i>The most inventive composer of his time.</i>
inventor	A person who invented a particular process or device or who invents things as an occupation.
makeshift	A temporary substitute or device. <i>Arranging a row of chairs to form a makeshift bed.</i>
manufacture	Manufactured articles. <i>Exports and imports of manufactures.</i>
originality	The quality of being novel or unusual. <i>She's a writer of great originality.</i>
produce	Come to have or undergo a change of (physical features and attributes). <i>The vineyards in the Val d'Or produce excellent wines.</i>
productive	Achieving a significant amount or result. <i>The therapy sessions became more productive.</i>
ruse	An action intended to deceive someone; a trick. <i>Emma tried to think of a ruse to get Paul out of the house.</i>

spontaneous (of a plant) growing naturally and without being tended or cultivated.
