## Associations of "Makes sense" (30 Words)

<b>build</b>	Build or establish something abstract. <i><b>Build</b> a reputation.</i>
<b>compel</b>	Necessitate or exact. <i>A sense of duty <b>compelled</b> Harry to answer her questions.</i>
<a href="#">compulsion</a>	An irrational motive for performing trivial or repetitive actions, even against your will. <i>He felt a <b>compulsion</b> to babble on about what had happened.</i>
<a href="#">concoct</a>	Make a concoction of by mixing. <i>His cronies <b>concocted</b> a simple plan.</i>
<b>constrain</b>	Bring about (something) by compulsion. <i>Calypso in her caves <b>constrained</b> his stay.</i>
<b>construct</b>	Put together out of artificial or natural components or parts. <i><b>Construct</b> an equilateral triangle.</i>
<b>create</b>	Create or manufacture a man made product. <i>Callas <b>created</b> only one role and that was Eurydice.</i>
<b>creativity</b>	The ability to create.
<b>creativity</b>	The use of imagination or original ideas to create something; inventiveness. <i>Firms are keen to encourage <b>creativity</b>.</i>
<a href="#">devise</a>	A will disposing of real property. <i>A training programme should be <b>devised</b>.</i>
<b>fabricate</b>	Make up something artificial or untrue. <i>You will have to <b>fabricate</b> an exhaust system.</i>
<a href="#">factory</a>	A person or organization that continually produces a great quantity of something specified. <i>A clothing <b>factory</b>.</i>

<b>figment</b>	A thing that someone believes to be real but that exists only in their imagination. <i>A <b>figment</b> of the imagination.</i>
<b>forge</b>	Create (something) strong, enduring, or successful. <i>He <b>forged</b> a great suit of black armour.</i>
<b>idea</b>	A personal view. <i>It was not a good <b>idea</b>.</i>
<b>imagination</b>	The faculty or action of forming new ideas, or images or concepts of external objects not present to the senses. <i>Her story captured the public's <b>imagination</b>.</i>
<b>impromptu</b>	A short musical passage that seems to have been made spontaneously without advance preparation. <i>An <b>impromptu</b> press conference.</i>
<b>improvised</b>	Done or made using whatever is available. <i>Crossed the river on <b>improvised</b> bridges.</i>
<b>instinctive</b>	Relating to or prompted by instinct; done without conscious thought. <i>An <b>instinctive</b> distaste for conflict.</i>
<b>invent</b>	Make up (an idea, name, story, etc.), especially so as to deceive someone. <i>I did not have to <b>invent</b> any tales about my past.</i>
<b>invention</b>	The creation of something in the mind. <i>The <b>invention</b> of printing in the 15th century.</i>
<b>inventive</b>	Showing creativity or original thought. <i>The most <b>inventive</b> composer of his time.</i>
<b>inventor</b>	A person who invented a particular process or device or who invents things as an occupation.
<b>makeshift</b>	A temporary substitute or device. <i>Arranging a row of chairs to form a <b>makeshift</b> bed.</i>
<b>manufacture</b>	Manufactured articles. <i>Exports and imports of <b>manufactures</b>.</i>
<b>originality</b>	The quality of being novel or unusual. <i>She's a writer of great <b>originality</b>.</i>
<b>produce</b>	Come to have or undergo a change of (physical features and attributes). <i>The vineyards in the Val d'Or <b>produce</b> excellent wines.</i>
<b>productive</b>	Achieving a significant amount or result. <i>The therapy sessions became more <b>productive</b>.</i>
<b>ruse</b>	An action intended to deceive someone; a trick. <i>Emma tried to think of a <b>ruse</b> to get Paul out of the house.</i>
