<u>hilarious</u>	Boisterously merry. The meal was noisy and <b>hilarious</b> .
hilarity	Boisterous merriment. <i>His incredulous expression was the cause of much <b>hilarity</b>.</i>
humor	The trait of appreciating and being able to express the humorous. <i>The humors are blood and phlegm and yellow and black bile.</i>
humorous	Causing laughter and amusement; comic. <i>Humorous</i> stories.
humour	The ability to express humour or amuse other people. <i>Her good humour vanished</i> .
jocular	With humor. They tried to deal with this painful subject <b>jocular</b> ly.



joggle	Fasten or join with a joggle. <i>The lurch and <b>joggle</b> of the car.</i>
joke	Tell a joke speak humorously. He told a very funny <b>joke</b> .
jollity	Lively and cheerful activity or celebration. A night of riotous <b>jollity</b> .
<u>jolly</u>	Lively and entertaining. Some regard it as a bit of a <b>jolly</b> .
<u>jovial</u>	Cheerful and friendly. She was in a <b>jovial</b> mood.
joviality	A jovial nature.
joy	A thing that causes joy. You ll get no <b>joy</b> out of her.
laugh	Something that causes laughter a source of fun amusement or derision. <i>He</i> <b>laugh</b> ed unpleasantly at his own jest.
laughing	Showing or feeling mirth or pleasure or happiness. <i>Laughing</i> children.
merriment	Activities that are enjoyable or amusing. <i>Her eyes sparkled with <b>merriment</b></i> .
<u>merry</u>	Full of or showing high-spirited merriment- Wordsworth. The streets were dense with <b>merry</b> throngs of students.
mirth	Great merriment. His six foot frame shook with <b>mirth</b> .
pleasure	Enjoyment and entertainment, as opposed to necessity. <i>He took his <b>pleasure</b> of her.</i>
repartee	Adroitness and cleverness in reply. <i>Quick fire <b>repartee</b>.</i>
slapstick	Characterized by horseplay and physical action. A loud and exhilarating rattle of bladders and <b>slapstick</b> s.
smile	Express with a smile. She <b>smile</b> d her thanks.
witticism	A message whose ingenuity or verbal skill or incongruity has the power to evoke laughter. Maurice roared with laughter at his own <b>witticism</b> s.
