
Malaise as a Noun

Definitions of "Malaise" as a noun

According to the <u>Oxford Dictionary of English</u>, "malaise" as a noun can have the following definitions:

- Physical discomfort (as mild sickness or depression.
- A general feeling of discomfort, illness, or unease whose exact cause is difficult to identify.





Synonyms of "Malaise" as a noun (13 Words)

<u>angst</u>	A feeling of persistent worry about something trivial. Rock and pop have a tradition of celebrating adolescent angst .
<u>anguish</u>	Severe mental or physical pain or suffering. Philip gave a cry of anguish .
anxiety	A feeling of worry, nervousness, or unease about something with an uncertain outcome. <i>He felt a surge of anxiety</i> .
<u>dejection</u>	A sad and depressed state; low spirits. <i>He was slumped in deep dejection.</i>
depression	A state of depression and anhedonia so severe as to require clinical intervention. The original shallow depression s were slowly converted to creeks.



despondency	, Feeling downcast and disheartened and hopeless. An air of despondency .
disquiet	A feeling of worry or unease. Public disquiet about animal testing.
<u>melancholy</u>	A humor that was once believed to be secreted by the kidneys or spleen and to cause sadness and melancholy. <i>He had an ability to convey a sense of deep melancholy and yearning through much of his work.</i>
restlessness	The quality of being ceaselessly moving or active. Waiting gave him a feeling of restlessness .
trouble	A source of difficulty. <i>He s been in trouble with the police.</i>
<u>unease</u>	Anxiety or discontent. Public unease about defence policy.
uneasiness	Inability to rest or relax or be still. The media often express a general uneasiness with animal research.
unhappiness	Emotions experienced when not in a state of well-being. I ve seen too much unhappiness caused by broken marriages.





Usage Examples of "Malaise" as a noun

Associations of "Malaise" (30 Words)

<u>afraid</u>	Unwilling or reluctant to do something for fear of the consequences. <i>Afraid</i> of snakes.
agoraphobia	A morbid fear of open spaces (as fear of being caught alone in some public place.
<u>alarm</u>	An alarm clock. The boat tilted and the boatmen cried out in alarm .
<u>alarming</u>	Worrying or disturbing. Our countryside is disappearing at an alarming rate.



altercation	Noisy quarrel. I had an altercation with the ticket collector.
<u>angst</u>	A feeling of persistent worry about something trivial. The existential angst of the middle classes.
anxiety	Strong desire or concern to do something or for something to happen. <i>He felt a surge of anxiety.</i>
apprehension	Understanding; grasp. They acted with intent to prevent lawful apprehension .
claustrophobia	A morbid fear of being closed in a confined space. <i>The small stuffy room had begun to give him claustrophobia</i> .
disquiet	Make (someone) worried or uneasy. Public disquiet about animal testing.
distract	Perplex and bewilder. It was another attempt to distract attention from the truth.
doldrums	A belt of calms and light winds between the northern and southern trade winds of the Atlantic and Pacific. <i>The mortgage market has been in the</i> doldrums <i>for three years.</i>
<u>dread</u>	Causing fear or dread or terror. The dread presence of the headmaster.
fear	An anxious feeling. I fear she might get aggressive.
<u>frightening</u>	Making someone afraid or anxious; terrifying. A frightening experience.
<u>horror</u>	Something that inspires horror something horrible. Children screamed in horror .
misgiving	Uneasiness about the fitness of an action. I felt a sense of misgiving at the prospect of retirement.
<u>neurotic</u>	A neurotic person. He seemed a neurotic self obsessed character.
<u>panic</u>	Drive someone through panic into hasty action. Panic selling.
perturb	Cause a celestial body to deviate from a theoretically regular orbital motion, especially as a result of interposed or extraordinary gravitational pull. <i>Fundamentalists threaten to perturb the social order.</i>



phobia	An anxiety disorder characterized by extreme and irrational fear of simple things or social situations. Phobic disorder is a general term for all phobia s.
phobic	Suffering from irrational fears. She s phobic about spiders.
<u>qualm</u>	A momentary faint or sick feeling. Military regimes generally have no qualm s about controlling the press.
scruple	Raise scruples. I had no scruple s about eavesdropping.
<u>stagnation</u>	Lack of activity, growth, or development. A period of economic stagnation .
terrifying	Causing extreme terror. A terrifying wail.
terror	Terrorism. A terror suspect.
trouble	Take the trouble to do something concern oneself. <i>He did not</i> trouble <i>to call his mother on her birthday.</i>
uneasiness	Feelings of anxiety that make you tense and irritable. I sensed the uneasiness of people around me.
<u>worry</u>	A strong feeling of anxiety. I worry about my job.
