## Synonyms of "Mangled" as an adjective (3 Words)

lacerate	Irregularly slashed and jagged as if torn. <i>Lacerate leaves.</i>
lacerated	Having edges that are jagged from injury. <i>He suffered a <b>lacerated</b> hand and arm.</i>
<u>torn</u>	Having edges that are jagged from injury. <i>Torn</i> between love and hate.





# Associations of "Mangled" (30 Words)

<u>blemish</u>	Add a flaw or blemish to make imperfect or defective. <i>His reign as world champion has been</i> <b>blemish</b> <i>ed by controversy.</i>
corpse	The dead body of a human being. <i>He believed that fascism would revive the <b>corpse</b> of Europe.</i>
crumble	A pudding made with crumble and fruit. The easiest way to <b>crumble</b> blue cheese.
damage	Inflict damage upon. She <b>damage</b> d the car when she hit the tree.
<u>deface</u>	Mar or spoil the appearance of. <i>He <b>deface</b>d library books.</i>
deform	Become distorted or misshapen undergo deformation. <i>He was physically <b>deform</b>ed by a rare bone disease.</i>



<u>deformed</u>	(of a person or part of the body) not having the normal or natural shape or form; misshapen. <i>His deformed hands</i> .
<u>disable</u>	Make unable to perform a certain action. Their choice <b>disable</b> s them from pursuing certain avenues.
disassemble	Translate (a program) from machine code into a higher-level programming language. The piston can be <b>disassemble</b> d for transport.
disfigure	Spoil the appearance of. <i>Litter <b>disfigure</b>s the countryside</i> .
<u>disintegrate</u>	Lose strength or cohesion and gradually fail. Our shoes had to last until they <b>disintegrate</b> d on our feet.
dismember	Cut off the limbs of (a person or animal. The winning powers of World War I set out to <b>dismember</b> the Ottoman Empire.
<u>dissolve</u>	A gradual transition from one scene to the next; the next scene is gradually superimposed as the former scene fades out. <i>My courage <b>dissolve</b>d</i> .
<u>distort</u>	Affect as in thought or feeling. A grimace <b>distort</b> ed her mouth.
hamstring	Cripple a person or animal by cutting their hamstrings. <i>He pulled a <b>hamstring</b>.</i>
hurt	Hurt the feelings of. She <b>hurt</b> me when she did not include me among her guests.
<u>impair</u>	Make worse or less effective. <i>His vision was <b>impair</b>ed</i> .
injure	Hurt the feelings of. <i>He <b>injure</b>d his back helping the girl.</i>
injury	An instance of being injured. All escaped without serious <b>injury</b> .
<u>lame</u>	Make a person or animal lame. Anyone who doesn t know that is obviously <b>lame</b> .
maim	Injure or wound seriously and leave permanent disfiguration or mutilation. People were <b>maim</b> ed by the explosion.
mar	A mark or flaw that spoils the appearance of something especially on a person s body. Nothing <b>mar</b> red her beauty.



maul	Take part in a maul. During the trial she was <b>maul</b> ed by the media.
mutilate	Destroy or injure severely. <i>Mutilate</i> d bodies.
ruin	Reduce to ruins. The castle was <b>ruin</b> ed when dynamite was used to demolish one of the corner towers.
spoil	The act of spoiling something by causing damage to it. <i>He is <b>spoil</b>ing for a fight.</i>
trample	Walk on and flatten. The fence had been <b>trample</b> d down.
vitiate	Make imperfect. The insurance is <b>vitiate</b> d because of foolish acts on the part of the tenant.
wound	Inflict a wound on. A <b>wound</b> to the thigh.
