## Synonyms of "Mangled" as an adjective (3 Words)

**lacerate** Irregularly slashed and jagged as if torn.  
***Lacerate** leaves.*

**lacerated** Having edges that are jagged from injury.  
*He suffered a **lacerated** hand and arm.*

**torn** Having edges that are jagged from injury.  
***Torn** between love and hate.*





## Associations of "Mangled" (30 Words)

- blemish** Add a flaw or blemish to make imperfect or defective.  
*His reign as world champion has been **blemished** by controversy.*
- corpse** The dead body of a human being.  
*He believed that fascism would revive the **corpse** of Europe.*
- crumble** A pudding made with crumble and fruit.  
*The easiest way to **crumble** blue cheese.*
- damage** Inflict damage upon.  
*She **damaged** the car when she hit the tree.*
- deface** Mar or spoil the appearance of.  
*He **defaced** library books.*
- deform** Become distorted or misshapen undergo deformation.  
*He was physically **deformed** by a rare bone disease.*

<b><u>deformed</u></b>	(of a person or part of the body) not having the normal or natural shape or form; misshapen. <i>His <b>deformed</b> hands.</i>
<b><u>disable</u></b>	Make unable to perform a certain action. <i>Their choice <b>disables</b> them from pursuing certain avenues.</i>
<b>disassemble</b>	Translate (a program) from machine code into a higher-level programming language. <i>The piston can be <b>disassembled</b> for transport.</i>
<b>disfigure</b>	Spoil the appearance of. <i>Litter <b>disfigures</b> the countryside.</i>
<b><u>disintegrate</u></b>	Lose strength or cohesion and gradually fail. <i>Our shoes had to last until they <b>disintegrated</b> on our feet.</i>
<b>dismember</b>	Cut off the limbs of (a person or animal). <i>The winning powers of World War I set out to <b>dismember</b> the Ottoman Empire.</i>
<b><u>dissolve</u></b>	A gradual transition from one scene to the next; the next scene is gradually superimposed as the former scene fades out. <i>My courage <b>dissolved</b>.</i>
<b><u>distort</u></b>	Affect as in thought or feeling. <i>A grimace <b>distorted</b> her mouth.</i>
<b>hamstring</b>	Cripple a person or animal by cutting their hamstrings. <i>He pulled a <b>hamstring</b>.</i>
<b>hurt</b>	Hurt the feelings of. <i>She <b>hurt</b> me when she did not include me among her guests.</i>
<b><u>impair</u></b>	Make worse or less effective. <i>His vision was <b>impaired</b>.</i>
<b>injure</b>	Hurt the feelings of. <i>He <b>injured</b> his back helping the girl.</i>
<b>injury</b>	An instance of being injured. <i>All escaped without serious <b>injury</b>.</i>
<b><u>lame</u></b>	Make a person or animal lame. <i>Anyone who doesn't know that is obviously <b>lame</b>.</i>
<b>maim</b>	Injure or wound seriously and leave permanent disfiguration or mutilation. <i>People were <b>maimed</b> by the explosion.</i>
<b>mar</b>	A mark or flaw that spoils the appearance of something especially on a person's body. <i>Nothing <b>marred</b> her beauty.</i>

<b>maul</b>	Take part in a maul. <i>During the trial she was <b>mauled</b> by the media.</i>
<b>mutilate</b>	Destroy or injure severely. <i><b>Mutilated</b> bodies.</i>
<b>ruin</b>	Reduce to ruins. <i>The castle was <b>ruined</b> when dynamite was used to demolish one of the corner towers.</i>
<b>spoil</b>	The act of spoiling something by causing damage to it. <i>He is <b>spoiling</b> for a fight.</i>
<b>trample</b>	Walk on and flatten. <i>The fence had been <b>trampled</b> down.</i>
<b>vitiate</b>	Make imperfect. <i>The insurance is <b>vitiated</b> because of foolish acts on the part of the tenant.</i>
<b>wound</b>	Inflict a wound on. <i>A <b>wound</b> to the thigh.</i>
