<b>be a sign of</b>	Have the quality of being; (copula, used with an adjective or a predicate noun).

<b>bespeak</b>	Be a signal for or a symptom of. <i>The defendant's insurers took steps to <b>bespeak</b> his medical records.</i>

<b><u>declare</u></b>	Declare to be. <i>Do you have anything to <b>declare</b>.</i>
<b>demonstrate</b>	Provide evidence for; stand as proof of; show by one's behavior, attitude, or external attributes. <i>The experiment <b>demonstrated</b> the instability of the compound.</i>
<b>display</b>	Attract attention by displaying some body part or posing of animals. <i>Both players <b>displayed</b> a great deal of spirit.</i>
<b>establish</b>	Build or establish something abstract. <i>The right plan would be to <b>establish</b> dummy's diamonds.</i>
<b>evidence</b>	Provide evidence for. <i>The quality of the bracelet as <b>evidenced</b> by the workmanship is exceptional.</i>
<b>evince</b>	Reveal the presence of (a quality or feeling); indicate. <i>The news stories <b>evinced</b> the usual mixture of sympathy and satisfaction.</i>
<b>exhibit</b>	Give an exhibition of to an interested audience. <i>She was invited to <b>exhibit</b> at several French museums.</i>
<b>express</b>	Give expression to. <i>She <b>expressed</b> the letter to Florida.</i>

<b>indicate</b>	Indicate a place direction person or thing either spatially or figuratively. <i>He <b>indicated</b> his opponents.</i>
<b>make plain</b>	Make, formulate, or derive in the mind.
<b>present</b>	Present somebody with something usually to accuse or criticize. <i>We <b>presented</b> the arguments to him.</i>
<b>prove</b>	Prove formally demonstrate by a mathematical formal proof. <i>Firearms <b>proved</b> for black powder should not be used with smokeless ammunition.</i>
<u><b>reflect</b></u>	Reflect deeply on a subject. <i>The clergy were strictly charged not to <b>reflect</b> on the Catholic religion in their discourses.</i>
<b>reveal</b>	Disclose directly or through prophets. <i>Brenda was forced to <b>reveal</b> Robbie s whereabouts.</i>
<b>show</b>	Show in or as in a picture. <i>He bet 2 on number six to <b>show</b>.</i>
<u><b>substantiate</b></u>	Represent in bodily form. <i>The painting <b>substantiates</b> the feelings of the artist.</i>
<b>verify</b>	To declare or affirm solemnly and formally as true. <i>Can you <b>verify</b> that the guns are licensed.</i>

<b><u>blatant</u></b>	Without any attempt at concealment; completely obvious. <i><b>Blatant</b> lies.</i>
<b><u>clear</u></b>	Clear and distinct to the senses easily perceptible. <i>The letter brought back a <b>clear</b> image of his grandfather.</i>
<b><u>conspicuous</u></b>	Obvious to the eye or mind. <i>A tower <b>conspicuous</b> at a great distance.</i>

<b>distinct</b>	Recognizably different in nature from something else of a similar type. <i>Gold is <b>distinct</b> from iron.</i>



<u>evident</u>	Clearly revealed to the mind or the senses or judgment. <i>A clearly <b>evident</b> erasure in the manuscript.</i>
<u>explicit</u>	Of a person stating something in an explicit manner. <i>A sexually <b>explicit</b> blockbuster.</i>
<u>glaring</u>	Giving out or reflecting a strong or dazzling light. <i>The <b>glaring</b> sun.</i>
<u>noticeable</u>	Undesirably noticeable. <i><b>Noticeable</b> grey hairs.</i>
<b>observable</b>	Able to be noticed or perceived; discernible. <i>An <b>observable</b> change in behavior.</i>
<b>obvious</b>	Easily perceived or understood; clear, self-evident, or apparent. <i>Unemployment has been the most <b>obvious</b> cost of the recession.</i>
<u>overt</u>	Open and observable; not secret or hidden. <i><b>Overt</b> intelligence gathering.</i>
<u>palpable</u>	Plain to see or comprehend. <i>There was a <b>palpable</b> sense of joy in the air.</i>
<u>patent</u>	Made and marketed under a patent proprietary. <i>The patient is usually left with a <b>patent</b> vessel.</i>
<b>perceptible</b>	Easily seen or detected. <i>A <b>perceptible</b> sense of expectation in the court.</i>
<b>plain</b>	Not mixed with extraneous elements. <i>A <b>plain</b> honest man with no nonsense about him.</i>
<u>recognizable</u>	Easily perceived; easy to become aware of. <i>His car was instantly <b>recognizable</b>.</i>
<u>transparent</u>	So thin as to transmit light. <i>Fine <b>transparent</b> fabrics.</i>
<u>undeniable</u>	Unable to be denied or disputed. <i>It is an <b>undeniable</b> fact that some dogs are easier to train than others.</i>
<b>undisguised</b>	(of a feeling) not disguised or concealed; open. <i>She looked at him with <b>undisguised</b> contempt.</i>
<u>unmistakable</u>	Not able to be mistaken for anything else; very distinctive. <i>The <b>unmistakable</b> sound of his laughter.</i>
<u>unquestionable</u>	Incapable of being questioned. <i>An <b>unquestionable</b> antique.</i>
<u>visible</u>	Present and easily available. <i>The <b>visible</b> trade gap.</i>

### conspicuous

Clearly visible.  
*He was very thin with a **conspicuous** Adam's apple.*

### conspicuously

In a manner tending to attract attention.  
*One important voice has been **conspicuously** absent.*

### detectable

Able to be perceived or noticed; discernible.  
*A **detectable** note of sarcasm.*



<b>discernible</b>	Capable of being perceived clearly. <i>The skyline is easily <b>discernible</b> even at a distance of several miles.</i>
<b>disclose</b>	Disclose to view as by removing a cover. <i>The auction house would not <b>disclose</b> the price at which the van Gogh had sold.</i>
<b>distinct</b>	Not alike; different in nature or quality. <i>A <b>distinct</b> outline.</i>
<b>distinctly</b>	Clear to the mind; with distinct mental discernment. <i>It s <b>distinctly</b> possible.</i>
<b>evident</b>	Clearly seen or understood; obvious. <i><b>Evident</b> hostility.</i>
<b>identifiable</b>	Capable of being identified. <i>There are no easily <b>identifiable</b> features on the shoreline.</i>
<b>marked</b>	Strongly marked easily noticeable. <i>The word drake is semantically <b>marked</b> as masculine.</i>
<b>noticeable</b>	Undesirably noticeable. <i>The church is <b>noticeable</b> for the fresco above the door.</i>
<b>observable</b>	Capable of being seen or noticed. <i>An <b>observable</b> change in behavior.</i>
<b>obvious</b>	Easily perceived or understood; clear, self-evident, or apparent. <i>Unemployment has been the most <b>obvious</b> cost of the recession.</i>
<b>overt</b>	Done or shown openly; plainly apparent. <i>An <b>overt</b> lie.</i>
<b>palpability</b>	The quality of being perceivable by touch.
<b>palpable</b>	(of a feeling or atmosphere) so intense as to seem almost tangible. <i>There was a <b>palpable</b> sense of joy in the air.</i>
<b>perceptible</b>	(especially of a slight movement or change of state) able to be seen or noticed. <i>A <b>perceptible</b> sense of expectation in the court.</i>
<b>preeminent</b>	Greatest in importance or degree or significance or achievement. <i>A <b>preeminent</b> archeologist.</i>
<b>pronounced</b>	Very noticeable or marked; conspicuous. <i>He had a <b>pronounced</b> squint.</i>
<b>recognizable</b>	Able to be recognized or identified from previous encounters or knowledge. <i>His car was instantly <b>recognizable</b>.</i>

<b>sensible</b>	Done or chosen in accordance with wisdom or prudence; likely to be of benefit. <i>Made <b>sensible</b> of his mistakes.</i>
<b>tangibility</b>	The quality of being perceivable by touch.
<b><u>tangible</u></b>	A thing that is perceptible by touch. <i>These are the only <b>tangibles</b> upon which an assessment can be made.</i>
<b><u>unambiguous</u></b>	Having or exhibiting a single clearly defined meaning- Mario Vargas Llosa. <i>Instructions should be <b>unambiguous</b>.</i>
<b><u>visible</u></b>	Visible imports or exports. <i>The church spire is <b>visible</b> from miles away.</i>
<b>visibly</b>	In a way that can be perceived or noticed easily; clearly. <i>The defendant paled <b>visibly</b> as the guilty verdict was announced.</i>
