- *A clear appearance.*
- *A manifest indication of the existence or presence or nature of some person or thing.*
- *An appearance in bodily form (as of a disembodied spirit).*
- *An appearance of a ghost or spirit.*

apparition	A ghostly appearing figure. <i>Natives were amazed at the apparition of this white stranger.</i>
appearance	A mental representation. <i>They try to keep up appearances.</i>
<u>declaration</u>	A formal expression by a meeting; agreed to by a vote. <i>A declaration of independence.</i>
demonstration	A public meeting or march protesting against something or expressing views on a political issue. <i>The lecture was accompanied by dramatic demonstrations.</i>
<u>disclosure</u>	The speech act of making something evident. <i>A judge ordered the disclosure of the government documents.</i>
display	The data or images shown on a computer screen or other device. <i>The museum houses an informative display of rocks.</i>

evidence	Signs or indications of something. <i>The evidence that smoking causes lung cancer is very compelling.</i>
example	A representative form or pattern. <i>I profited from his example.</i>
exemplification	A representational or typifying form or model.
exhibition	A collection of things (goods or works of art etc.) for public display. <i>A false exhibition of concern for smaller nations.</i>
exposition	A large public exhibition of art or trade goods. <i>The exposition will feature exhibits by 165 companies.</i>
expression	Expression without words. <i>We have an expression You don't get owt for nowt.</i>
illustration	A visual representation (a picture or diagram) that is used to make some subject more pleasing or easier to understand. <i>By way of illustration I refer to the following case.</i>
indication	(medicine) a reason to prescribe a drug or perform a procedure. <i>Indications of strain.</i>
instance	An example or single occurrence of something. <i>The search finds every instance where the word appears.</i>
mark	A figure or letter representing the total number of marks awarded in an examination or competition and signifying a person's score. <i>It was in London that he made his mark.</i>
materialisation	Something that comes into existence as a result.
materialization	Something that comes into existence as a result. <i>This skyscraper is the solid materialization of his efforts.</i>
presentation	A visual representation of something. <i>The Earl of Pembroke offered Herbert the presentation of the living of Bremerton.</i>
profession	A body of people engaged in a particular profession. <i>The news spread rapidly through the medical profession.</i>
proof	The strength of distilled alcoholic spirits relative to proof spirit taken as a standard of 100. <i>Spatial dimensions whose very existence is beyond all hope of proof.</i>
reflection	A remark expressing careful consideration. <i>The pulse is a reflection of the heart's condition.</i>
reflexion	A likeness in which left and right are reversed.

show	Pretending that something is the case in order to make a good impression. <i>A good show of looking interested.</i>
showing	The action of showing something or the fact of being shown. <i>Even on their own showing and by their own admission the evidence for this is very weak.</i>
sign	A gesture that is part of a sign language. <i>The last four bits hold a pattern to represent the sign of the number.</i>
substantiation	Additional proof that something that was believed (some fact or hypothesis or theory) is correct.
<u>symbol</u>	Something visible that by association or convention represents something else that is invisible. <i>The symbol <i>r</i> in Figure 5 represents a gene which is ineffective.</i>
symptom	An indication of the existence of something, especially of an undesirable situation. <i>Dental problems may be a symptom of other illness.</i>
<u>testimony</u>	A formal written or spoken statement, especially one given in a court of law. <i>His effort was testimony to his devotion.</i>
<u>token</u>	A word or object conferring authority on or serving to authenticate the speaker or holder. <i>A record token.</i>
visitation	The visit of the Virgin Mary to Elizabeth related in Luke 1:39-56. <i>A number of lay women devoted themselves to visitations of the sick.</i>

- albedo** The proportion of the incident light or radiation that is reflected by a surface, typically that of a planet or moon.
*The lunar maria have a lower **albedo** than the surrounding terrain.*
- bespeak** Order or reserve (something) in advance.
*The defendant's insurers took steps to **bespeak** his medical records.*
- betoken** Be a signal for or a symptom of.
*She wondered if his cold level gaze **betokened** indifference or anger.*
- cue** Sports implement consisting of a tapering rod used to strike a cue ball in pool or billiards.
*Ros and Guil **cued** by Hamlet also bow deeply.*
- demonstration** An outward show of a feeling or quality.
*He gave the customer a **demonstration**.*

denote	Be a sign of; indicate. <i>The level of output per firm is denoted by X.</i>
express	By express. <i>With a diplomatic smile she expressed herself more subtly.</i>
expression	Expression without words. <i>Expression of the TAT gene is restricted to the parenchymal cells.</i>
hint	Drop a hint intimate by a hint. <i>The restrained fronts of the terraced houses only hinted at the wealth within.</i>
image	Make a representation of the external form of. <i>He s the image of his father.</i>
imply	(of a fact or occurrence) suggest (something) as a logical consequence. <i>Salesmen who use jargon to imply superior knowledge.</i>
index	List in an index. <i>Index the book.</i>
indicant	A number or ratio (a value on a scale of measurement) derived from a series of observed facts; can reveal relative changes as a function of time. <i>Symptoms are the prime indicants of disease.</i>
indicate	Indicate a place direction person or thing either spatially or figuratively. <i>Cal indicated and moved across the road.</i>
indication	A symptom that suggests certain medical treatment is necessary. <i>There were indications that it was time to leave.</i>
instigation	The verbal act of urging on. <i>The Domesday Survey was compiled at the instigation of William I.</i>
logo	A company emblem or device. <i>The Olympic logo was emblazoned across the tracksuits.</i>
mean	Mean or intend to express or convey. <i>Something essentially vulgar and meanspirited in politics.</i>
portend	Indicate by signs. <i>The eclipses portend some major events.</i>
presage	Indicate by signs. <i>He had a strong presage that he had only a very short time to live.</i>
rally	Drive in a rally. <i>A rally of more than three strokes was a rarity.</i>
reflection	Serious thought or consideration. <i>The reflections from the street lamps gave them just enough light.</i>

reveal	(in a film or television programme) a final revelation of information that has previously been kept from the characters or viewers. <i>Brenda was forced to reveal Robbie's whereabouts.</i>
saying	A collection of short, pithy expressions identified with a particular person, especially a political or religious leader. <i>This is stated in the sayings of the Prophet.</i>
signal	Communicate silently and non verbally by signals or signs. <i>She signalled Charlotte to be silent.</i>
signify	Denote or connote. <i>The church used this image to signify the Holy Trinity.</i>
suggest	Suggest the necessity of an intervention in medicine. <i>The theatrical interpretation of weather and water almost suggests El Greco.</i>
suggestion	An idea or belief accepted by a person as a result of suggestion. <i>There is no suggestion that he was involved in any wrongdoing.</i>
symbolic	Using symbolism. <i>Klimt's symbolic painting of 1907.</i>
symptom	(medicine) any sensation or change in bodily function that is experienced by a patient and is associated with a particular disease. <i>The government was plagued by leaks a symptom of divisions and poor morale.</i>
