### **Definitions of "Manifesto" as a noun**

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “manifesto” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *A public declaration of policy and aims, especially one issued before an election by a political party or candidate.*
- *A public declaration of intentions (as issued by a political party or government).*



## Synonyms of "Manifesto" as a noun (10 Words)

<b>announcement</b>	The action of making an announcement. <i>The <b>announcement</b> of the decision of the European Parliament.</i>
<b><u>declaration</u></b>	A written public announcement of intentions or of the terms of an agreement. <i>A <b>declaration</b> of love.</i>
<b>notification</b>	The action of notifying someone or something. <i>We have yet to receive formal <b>notification</b> of the announcement.</i>
<b>platform</b>	A raised floor or stage used by public speakers or performers so that they can be seen by their audience. <i>Orbiting weapons <b>platforms</b>.</i>
<b>policy statement</b>	Written contract or certificate of insurance.
<b><u>proclamation</u></b>	The formal act of proclaiming; giving public notice. <i>The government restricted the use of water by <b>proclamation</b>.</i>
<b>programme</b>	A system of projects or services intended to meet a public need. <i>The <b>programme</b> includes Dvo k s New World symphony.</i>
<b>pronouncement</b>	An authoritative declaration. <i>Distrust of the <b>pronouncements</b> of politicians was endemic.</i>
<b>pronunciamento</b>	(especially in Spain and Spanish-speaking countries) a political manifesto or proclamation.
<b><u>publication</u></b>	The preparation and issuing of a book, journal, or piece of music for public sale. <i>The <b>publication</b> of her first novel.</i>

## Usage Examples of "Manifesto" as a noun

- *A manifesto for gay liberation.*
- *Manifesto commitments.*

## Associations of "Manifesto" (30 Words)

<b><u>affirm</u></b>	To declare or affirm solemnly and formally as true. <i>They <b>affirmed</b> that policies were to be judged by their contribution to social justice.</i>
<b><u>allegiance</u></b>	Loyalty or commitment to a superior or to a group or cause. <i>Those wishing to receive citizenship must swear <b>allegiance</b> to the republic.</i>

<b>assurance</b>	Certainty about something. <i>His <b>assurance</b> in his superiority did not make him popular.</i>
<b>avow</b>	Assert or confess openly. <i>He <b>avowed</b> that he had voted Labour in every election.</i>
<b>betroth</b>	Give to in marriage. <i>In no time I shall be <b>betrothed</b> to Isabel.</i>
<b><u>commitment</u></b>	A pledge or undertaking. <i>His long <b>commitment</b> to public service.</i>
<b>consecrate</b>	Solemnly dedicated to or set apart for a high purpose. <i>The present Holy Trinity church was <b>consecrated</b> in 1845.</i>
<b><u>consign</u></b>	Send to an address. <i>She <b>consigned</b> the letter to the waste paper basket.</i>
<b><u>covenant</u></b>	An agreement which brings about a relationship of commitment between God and his people The Jewish faith is based on the biblical covenants made with Abraham Moses and David. <i>The landlord <b>covenants</b> to repair the property.</i>
<b>dedicate</b>	Give entirely to a specific person, activity, or cause. <i>Joan has <b>dedicated</b> her life to animals.</i>
<b>engagement</b>	The duration of an agreement to get married. <i>A dinner <b>engagement</b>.</i>
<b><u>exclaim</u></b>	State or announce. <i>She looked in the mirror <b>exclaiming</b> in dismay at her appearance.</i>
<b>fealty</b>	Formal acknowledgement of loyalty to a lord. <i>They owed <b>fealty</b> to the Earl rather than the King.</i>
<b>fiance</b>	A man who is engaged to be married.
<b>fidelity</b>	Faithfulness to a person, cause, or belief, demonstrated by continuing loyalty and support. <i>The 1949 recording provides reasonable <b>fidelity</b>.</i>
<b><u>herald</u></b>	Acclaim. <i>The band have been <b>heralded</b> as the great hope for the nineties.</i>
<b>marriage</b>	A combination or mixture of elements. <i>The <b>marriage</b> of music and dance.</i>
<b>oath</b>	A commitment to tell the truth especially in a court of law to lie under oath is to become subject to prosecution for perjury. <i>They took an <b>oath</b> of allegiance.</i>
<b><u>pact</u></b>	A formal agreement between individuals or parties. <i>The country negotiated a trade <b>pact</b> with the US.</i>



<b>pledge</b>	Bind or secure by a pledge. <i>They <b>pledged</b> to continue the campaign for funding.</i>
<b>proclaim</b>	State or announce. <i>He was <b>proclaimed</b> King.</i>
<b>profess</b>	Teach a subject as a professor. <i>He had <b>professed</b> his love for her only to walk away.</i>
<b>promise</b>	Make a promise or commitment. <i>He showed great <b>promise</b> even as a junior officer.</i>
<b>promulgate</b>	Put a law into effect by formal declaration. <i>In January 1852 the new Constitution was <b>promulgated</b>.</i>
<b>promulgation</b>	The formal act of proclaiming; giving public notice. <i>The <b>promulgation</b> was written in English.</i>
<b>renege</b>	Go back on a promise, undertaking, or contract. <i>The government had <b>renege</b>d on its election promises.</i>
<b>salutation</b>	An act of honor or courteous recognition. <i>We would not expect a love letter to include a formal address and <b>salutation</b>.</i>
<b>salute</b>	Make a formal salute to. <i>He was <b>saluted</b> king when he entered into Jerusalem.</i>
<b>troth</b>	A solemn pledge of fidelity. <i>A token of <b>troth</b>.</i>
<b>vow</b>	Dedicate to a deity by a vow. <i>The rebels <b>vowed</b> to continue fighting.</i>
