- *A public declaration of policy and aims, especially one issued before an election by a political party or candidate.*
- *A public declaration of intentions (as issued by a political party or government).*

<u>declaration</u>	A written public announcement of intentions or of the terms of an agreement. <i>A declaration of love.</i>
notification	The action of notifying someone or something. <i>We have yet to receive formal notification of the announcement.</i>
platform	A raised floor or stage used by public speakers or performers so that they can be seen by their audience. <i>Orbiting weapons platforms.</i>
policy statement	Written contract or certificate of insurance.
<u>proclamation</u>	The formal act of proclaiming; giving public notice. <i>The government restricted the use of water by proclamation.</i>
programme	A system of projects or services intended to meet a public need. <i>The programme includes Dvo k s New World symphony.</i>
pronouncement	An authoritative declaration. <i>Distrust of the pronouncements of politicians was endemic.</i>
pronunciamento	(especially in Spain and Spanish-speaking countries) a political manifesto or proclamation.
<u>publication</u>	The preparation and issuing of a book, journal, or piece of music for public sale. <i>The publication of her first novel.</i>

Associations of "Manifesto" (30 Words)

<u>affirm</u>	To declare or affirm solemnly and formally as true. <i>They affirmed that policies were to be judged by their contribution to social justice.</i>
<u>allegiance</u>	Loyalty or commitment to a superior or to a group or cause. <i>Those wishing to receive citizenship must swear allegiance to the republic.</i>

assurance	Certainty about something. <i>His assurance in his superiority did not make him popular.</i>
avow	Assert or confess openly. <i>He avowed that he had voted Labour in every election.</i>
betroth	Give to in marriage. <i>In no time I shall be betrothed to Isabel.</i>
<u>commitment</u>	A pledge or undertaking. <i>His long commitment to public service.</i>
consecrate	Solemnly dedicated to or set apart for a high purpose. <i>The present Holy Trinity church was consecrated in 1845.</i>
<u>consign</u>	Send to an address. <i>She consigned the letter to the waste paper basket.</i>
<u>covenant</u>	An agreement which brings about a relationship of commitment between God and his people The Jewish faith is based on the biblical covenants made with Abraham Moses and David. <i>The landlord covenants to repair the property.</i>
dedicate	Give entirely to a specific person, activity, or cause. <i>Joan has dedicated her life to animals.</i>
engagement	The duration of an agreement to get married. <i>A dinner engagement.</i>
<u>exclaim</u>	State or announce. <i>She looked in the mirror exclaiming in dismay at her appearance.</i>
fealty	Formal acknowledgement of loyalty to a lord. <i>They owed fealty to the Earl rather than the King.</i>
fiance	A man who is engaged to be married.
fidelity	Faithfulness to a person, cause, or belief, demonstrated by continuing loyalty and support. <i>The 1949 recording provides reasonable fidelity.</i>
<u>herald</u>	Acclaim. <i>The band have been heralded as the great hope for the nineties.</i>
marriage	A combination or mixture of elements. <i>The marriage of music and dance.</i>
oath	A commitment to tell the truth especially in a court of law to lie under oath is to become subject to prosecution for perjury. <i>They took an oath of allegiance.</i>
<u>pact</u>	A formal agreement between individuals or parties. <i>The country negotiated a trade pact with the US.</i>

<u>pledge</u>	Bind or secure by a pledge. <i>They pledged to continue the campaign for funding.</i>
<u>proclaim</u>	State or announce. <i>He was proclaimed King.</i>
profess	Teach a subject as a professor. <i>He had professed his love for her only to walk away.</i>
promise	Make a promise or commitment. <i>He showed great promise even as a junior officer.</i>
promulgate	Put a law into effect by formal declaration. <i>In January 1852 the new Constitution was promulgated.</i>
promulgation	The formal act of proclaiming; giving public notice. <i>The promulgation was written in English.</i>
renege	Go back on a promise, undertaking, or contract. <i>The government had reneged on its election promises.</i>
salutation	An act of honor or courteous recognition. <i>We would not expect a love letter to include a formal address and salutation.</i>
salute	Make a formal salute to. <i>He was saluted king when he entered into Jerusalem.</i>
troth	A solemn pledge of fidelity. <i>A token of troth.</i>
<u>vow</u>	Dedicate to a deity by a vow. <i>The rebels vowed to continue fighting.</i>
