social justice.

Loyalty or commitment to a superior or to a group or cause.

Those wishing to receive citizenship must swear **allegiance** to the republic.



assurance Certainty about something.

His **assurance** in his superiority did not make him popular.

Assert or confess openly.

He **avow**ed that he had voted Labour in every election.

betroth Give to in marriage.

In no time I shall be **betroth**ed to Isabel.

commitment A pledge or undertaking.

His long **commitment** to public service.

consecrate Solemnly dedicated to or set apart for a high purpose.

The present Holy Trinity church was **consecrate**d in 1845.

Send to an address.

consignShe **consign**ed the letter to the waste paper basket.

An agreement which brings about a relationship of commitment between

God and his people The Jewish faith is based on the biblical covenants

made with Abraham Moses and David.

The landlord **covenant**s to repair the property.

dedicate Give entirely to a specific person, activity, or cause.

Joan has **dedicate**d her life to animals.

engagement The duration of an agreement to get married.

A dinner **engagement**.

exclaim State or announce.

She looked in the mirror **exclaim**ing in dismay at her appearance.

fealty Formal acknowledgement of loyalty to a lord.

They owed **fealty** to the Earl rather than the King.

fiance A man who is engaged to be married.

Faithfulness to a person, cause, or belief, demonstrated by continuing

fidelity loyalty and support.

The 1949 recording provides reasonable **fidelity**.

Acclaim.

herald

The band have been **herald**ed as the great hope for the nineties.

marriage A combination or mixture of elements. The marriage of music and dance.

A commitment to tell the truth especially in a court of law to lie under oath

oath is to become subject to prosecution for perjury.

They took an **oath** of allegiance.

A formal agreement between individuals or parties.

The country negotiated a trade **pact** with the US.



Bind or secure by a pledge.

They **pledge**d to continue the campaign for funding.

State or announce.

profess

Teach a subject as a professor.

He had **profess**ed his love for her only to walk away.

promise Make a promise or commitment.

He showed great **promise** even as a junior officer.

promulgatePut a law into effect by formal declaration.

In January 1852 the new Constitution was **promulgate**d.

The formal act of proclaiming; giving public notice.

promulgation The **promulgation** was written in English.

renege Go back on a promise, undertaking, or contract.

The government had **renege**d on its election promises.

An act of honor or courteous recognition.

salutation We would not expect a love letter to include a formal address and

salutation.

He was **salute**d king when he entered into Jerusalem.

A solemn pledge of fidelity.

A token of troth
