Definitions of "Manipulate" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “manipulate” as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Control (others or oneself) or influence skillfully, usually to one's advantage.*
- *Influence or control shrewdly or deviously.*
- *Examine or treat (a part of the body) by feeling or moving it with the hand.*
- *Alter or present (data) so as to mislead.*
- *Handle or control (a tool, mechanism, information, etc.) in a skilful manner.*
- *Tamper, with the purpose of deception.*
- *Hold something in one's hands and move it.*
- *Maintain influence over (others or oneself) skillfully, usually to one's advantage.*
- *Alter, edit, or move (text or data) on a computer.*
- *Manipulate in a fraudulent manner.*
- *Treat manually, as with massage, for therapeutic purposes.*
- *Control or influence (a person or situation) cleverly or unscrupulously.*

change	Undergo a change become different in essence losing one's original nature. <i>I changed her on top of the table until she got too big.</i>

control	Control others or oneself or influence skillfully usually to one's advantage. <i>He was appointed to control the company's marketing strategy.</i>

<u>employ</u>	Put into service make work or employ for a particular purpose or for its inherent or natural purpose. <i>Temporary staff can be employed to undertake the work.</i>
<u>engineer</u>	Design as an engineer. <i>He engineered the water supply project.</i>
exploit	Work excessively hard. <i>We must exploit the resources we are given wisely.</i>
fake	Speak insincerely or without regard for facts or truths. <i>The politician was not well prepared for the debate and faked it.</i>
falsify	Insert words into texts often falsifying it thereby. <i>Changes falsify individual expectations.</i>
feel	Grope or feel in search of something. <i>She started to feel really sick.</i>
fiddle with	Manipulate manually or in one's mind or imagination.
fudge	Adjust or manipulate (facts or figures) so as to present a desired picture. <i>The authorities have fudged the issue.</i>
guide	Use as a guide. <i>Information is available to guide you through the planning and development process.</i>
handle	Handle effectively. <i>Don't handle the merchandise.</i>
influence	Shape or influence give direction to. <i>Government regulations can influence behaviour but often without changing underlying values and motivations.</i>
interfere with	Come between so as to be hindrance or obstacle.
<u>juggle</u>	Hold with difficulty and balance insecurely. <i>The player juggled the ball.</i>
keep in line	Allow to remain in a place or position or maintain a property or feature.

knead	Make bread or pottery by kneading flour or clay. <i>She kneaded his back.</i>
manoeuvre	Carefully guide or manipulate (someone or something) in order to achieve an end. <i>She tried to manoeuvre her trolley round people.</i>
massage	Give a massage to. <i>Gently massage the cream on to your face.</i>
misrepresent	Give a false or misleading account of the nature of. <i>This statement misrepresents my intentions.</i>
operate	Happen. <i>Neither company had operated within the terms of its constitution.</i>
orchestrate	Plan and direct (a complex undertaking). <i>The situation has been orchestrated by a tiny minority.</i>
palpate	Examine (a part of the body) by touch, especially for medical purposes. <i>The skin of the lower neck must be palpated for cysts and infection.</i>
pull strings	Take away.
pull wires	Remove, usually with some force or effort; also used in an abstract sense.
rig	Provide a sailing boat with sails and rigging. <i>The power plant of the lifeboat had been rigged to explode.</i>
rub	Make dry clean or smooth by rubbing. <i>She found a towel and began rubbing her hair.</i>
steer	Follow (a course) in a specified direction. <i>The fishermen were steering a direct course for Koepang.</i>
tamper with	Intrude in other people's affairs or business; interfere unwantedly.
tinker with	Work as a tinker or tinkerer.
turn to one's advantage	Cause to move along an axis or into a new direction.
twist round one's little finger	Do the twist.
use	Habitually do something or be in a certain state or place use only in the past tense. <i>They used to vacation in the Bahamas.</i>

retouch	Give retouches to hair. <i>This photograph has been retouched.</i>
torsion	The action of twisting or the state of being twisted, especially of one end of an object relative to the other.
transformed	Given a completely different form or appearance. <i>Shocked to see the transformed landscape.</i>
<u>twist</u>	Twist or pull violently or suddenly especially so as to remove something from that to which it is attached or from where it originates. <i>A barley sugar twist.</i>
warp	In weaving arrange yarn so as to form the warp of a piece of cloth. <i>The warp and weft are the basic constituents of all textiles.</i>
wrench	Turn something especially a nut or bolt with a wrench. <i>She slipped and wrenched her ankle.</i>
