appropriate	Take (something) for one’s own use, typically without the owner’s permission. <i>A book not appropriate for children.</i>
<u>aristocracy</u>	A privileged class holding hereditary titles. <i>A new aristocracy of talented young people.</i>
aristocrat	A member of the aristocracy. <i>A decadent old blue blooded aristocrat.</i>
benefit	Accord or comport with. <i>As benefits a Quaker he was a humane man.</i>
befitting	Appropriate to. <i>A country which can run the prestigious tournament in a befitting manner.</i>
<u>bohemian</u>	A member of a people with dark skin and hair who speak Romany and who traditionally live by seasonal work and fortunetelling; they are believed to have originated in northern India but now are living on all continents (but mostly in Europe, North Africa, and North America). <i>A bohemian life style.</i>
characterize	(of a feature or quality) be typical or characteristic of. <i>She characterized the period as the decade of revolution.</i>
columnist	A journalist contributing regularly to a newspaper or magazine.
cultured	Marked by refinement in taste and manners. <i>Cultured tastes.</i>
decorum	Propriety in manners and conduct. <i>He had acted with the utmost decorum.</i>
etiquette	The customary code of polite behaviour in society or among members of a particular profession or group. <i>Court etiquette was now familiar to Joan.</i>

formal	Being in accord with established forms and conventions and requirements as e.g. of formal dress. <i>Cocktail parties every night so the ladies can show off their formals.</i>
formality	Something done or happening as a matter of course and without question. <i>Courtroom formality.</i>
gentry	People of good social position, specifically the class of people next below the nobility in position and birth. <i>A member of the landed gentry.</i>
inimitable	Defying imitation; matchless. <i>An inimitable style.</i>
method	A way of doing something, especially a systematic way; implies an orderly logical arrangement (usually in steps). <i>A method for software maintenance.</i>
nobility	The quality of belonging to the aristocracy. <i>A member of the English nobility.</i>
patrician	Belonging to or characteristic of a long-established and wealthy family. <i>A proud patrician face.</i>
peerage	The title and rank of peer or peeress. <i>On his retirement as cabinet secretary he was given a peerage.</i>
polite	Not rude; marked by satisfactory (or especially minimal) adherence to social usages and sufficient but not noteworthy consideration for others- W.S. Maugham. <i>Polite society.</i>
procedural	Denoting a television series, film, or novel characterized by detailed, realistic treatment of professional procedures, especially police procedures. <i>The procedural about police officers going undercover will debut later this month.</i>
proper	Limited to the thing specified. <i>They had not followed the proper procedures.</i>
propriety	The details or rules of behaviour conventionally considered to be correct. <i>They questioned the propriety of certain investments made by the council.</i>
protocol	A set of rules governing the exchange or transmission of data between devices. <i>What is the protocol at a smart lunch if one's neighbour dozes off during the speeches.</i>
relevant	Appropriate to the current time, period, or circumstances; of contemporary interest. <i>Critics may find themselves unable to stay relevant in a changing world.</i>

- royalty** A royal right (now especially over minerals) granted by the sovereign to an individual or corporation.
*It s not often you meet real Hollywood **royalty** let alone chat to Angelina Jolie and Dustin Hoffman in one day.*
- seemly** Conforming to accepted notions of propriety or good taste; decorous.

- style** Make consistent with certain rules of style.
***Style** a manuscript.*
- suit** Slang a businessman dressed in a business suit.
*The flat has two bedrooms if it **suits** you can have one of them.*
- wont** Make or be or become accustomed.
*He was **wont** to arise at 5 30 every morning.*
