## Associations of "Manners" (30 Words)

<b>appropriate</b>	Take (something) for one’s own use, typically without the owner’s permission. <i>A book not <b>appropriate</b> for children.</i>
<b>aristocracy</b>	A privileged class holding hereditary titles. <i>A new <b>aristocracy</b> of talented young people.</i>
<b>aristocrat</b>	A member of the aristocracy. <i>A decadent old blue blooded <b>aristocrat</b>.</i>
<b>benefit</b>	Accord or comport with. <i>As <b>benefits</b> a Quaker he was a humane man.</i>
<b>befitting</b>	Appropriate to. <i>A country which can run the prestigious tournament in a <b>befitting</b> manner.</i>
<b>bohemian</b>	A member of a people with dark skin and hair who speak Romany and who traditionally live by seasonal work and fortunetelling; they are believed to have originated in northern India but now are living on all continents (but mostly in Europe, North Africa, and North America). <i>A <b>bohemian</b> life style.</i>
<b>characterize</b>	(of a feature or quality) be typical or characteristic of. <i>She <b>characterized</b> the period as the decade of revolution.</i>
<b>columnist</b>	A journalist contributing regularly to a newspaper or magazine.
<b>cultured</b>	Marked by refinement in taste and manners. <i><b>Cultured</b> tastes.</i>
<b>decorum</b>	Propriety in manners and conduct. <i>He had acted with the utmost <b>decorum</b>.</i>
<b>etiquette</b>	The customary code of polite behaviour in society or among members of a particular profession or group. <i>Court <b>etiquette</b> was now familiar to Joan.</i>

<b>formal</b>	Being in accord with established forms and conventions and requirements as e.g. of formal dress. <i>Cocktail parties every night so the ladies can show off their <b>formals</b>.</i>
<b>formality</b>	Something done or happening as a matter of course and without question. <i>Courtroom <b>formality</b>.</i>
<b>gentry</b>	People of good social position, specifically the class of people next below the nobility in position and birth. <i>A member of the landed <b>gentry</b>.</i>
<b>inimitable</b>	Defying imitation; matchless. <i>An <b>inimitable</b> style.</i>
<b>method</b>	A way of doing something, especially a systematic way; implies an orderly logical arrangement (usually in steps). <i>A <b>method</b> for software maintenance.</i>
<b>nobility</b>	The quality of belonging to the aristocracy. <i>A member of the English <b>nobility</b>.</i>
<b>patrician</b>	Belonging to or characteristic of a long-established and wealthy family. <i>A proud <b>patrician</b> face.</i>
<b>peerage</b>	The title and rank of peer or peeress. <i>On his retirement as cabinet secretary he was given a <b>peerage</b>.</i>
<b>polite</b>	Not rude; marked by satisfactory (or especially minimal) adherence to social usages and sufficient but not noteworthy consideration for others- W.S. Maugham. <i><b>Polite</b> society.</i>
<b>procedural</b>	Denoting a television series, film, or novel characterized by detailed, realistic treatment of professional procedures, especially police procedures. <i>The <b>procedural</b> about police officers going undercover will debut later this month.</i>
<b>proper</b>	Limited to the thing specified. <i>They had not followed the <b>proper</b> procedures.</i>
<b>propriety</b>	The details or rules of behaviour conventionally considered to be correct. <i>They questioned the <b>propriety</b> of certain investments made by the council.</i>
<b>protocol</b>	A set of rules governing the exchange or transmission of data between devices. <i>What is the <b>protocol</b> at a smart lunch if one's neighbour dozes off during the speeches.</i>
<b>relevant</b>	Appropriate to the current time, period, or circumstances; of contemporary interest. <i>Critics may find themselves unable to stay <b>relevant</b> in a changing world.</i>

- royalty** A royal right (now especially over minerals) granted by the sovereign to an individual or corporation.  
*It s not often you meet real Hollywood **royalty** let alone chat to Angelina Jolie and Dustin Hoffman in one day.*
- seemly** Conforming to accepted notions of propriety or good taste; decorous.  
***Seemly** behavior.*
- style** Make consistent with certain rules of style.  
***Style** a manuscript.*
- suit** Slang a businessman dressed in a business suit.  
*The flat has two bedrooms if it **suits** you can have one of them.*
- wont** Make or be or become accustomed.  
*He was **wont** to arise at 5 30 every morning.*
