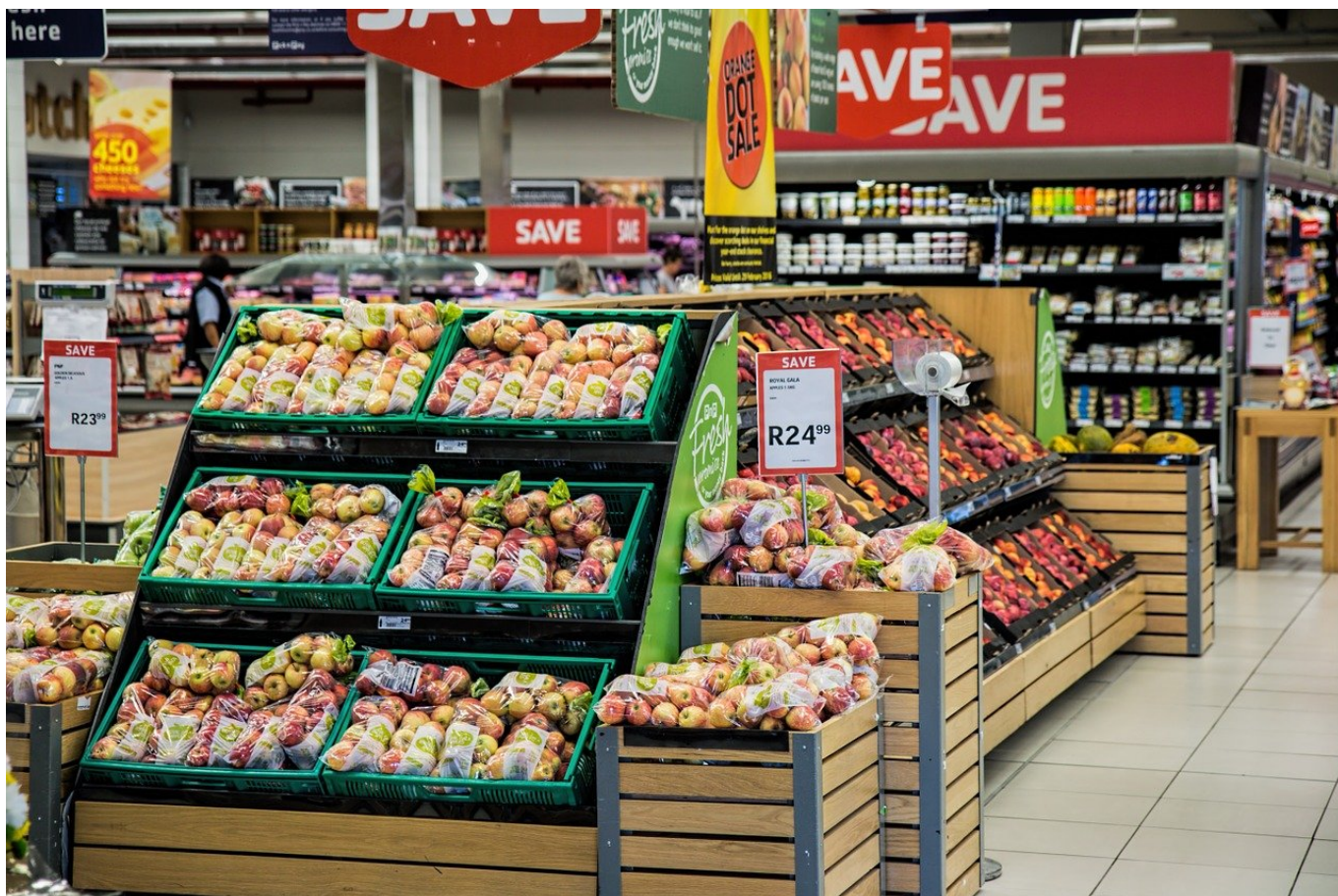
hawk

Make by shaping or bringing together constituents.

merchandise	Engage in the trade of. <i>A new breakfast food can easily be merchandised.</i>
offer for sale	Make available or accessible, provide or furnish.
peddle	Sell or offer for sale from place to place. <i>He peddled printing materials around the country.</i>
put on the market	Make an investment.
put under the hammer	Put into a certain place or abstract location.
put up for sale	Put into a certain place or abstract location.
retail	Sell goods to the public by retail. <i>The product retails for around 20.</i>
sell	Sell all of one's property possessions or assets. <i>The store sells hi fi TVs videos and other electrical goods.</i>
<u>trade</u>	Engage in the trade of. <i>They trade mud shark livers for fish oil.</i>

peddle	Sell or offer for sale from place to place. <i>He was arrested after trying to peddle guns.</i>
price	Attach price labels or tickets to an item for sale. <i>The grocer priced his wares high.</i>
purchaser	A person who buys something; a buyer. <i>One of the club's prospective purchasers.</i>
retail	Of goods be sold by retail for a specified price. <i>The retail trade.</i>
sales	Income (at invoice values) received for goods and services over some given period of time.
<u>salesman</u>	A man whose job involves selling or promoting commercial products, either in a shop or visiting locations to get orders. <i>An insurance salesman.</i>
sell	An act of selling or attempting to sell something. <i>The prime minister has come under fire for selling out to the United States.</i>
<u>seller</u>	Someone who promotes or exchanges goods or services for money. <i>The book became the biggest seller in the history of royal publishing.</i>

Offer (small items) for sale, either from a stall or from a slot machine.
*There was a man **vending** sticky cakes and ices.*

vendor

Someone who promotes or exchanges goods or services for money.
*An Italian ice cream **vendor**.*

wholesale

At a wholesale price.
*I buy food **wholesale**.*
