- *An area of low-lying land which is flooded in wet seasons or at high tide, and typically remains waterlogged at all times.*
- *New Zealand writer of detective stories (1899-1982).*

bog	Wetland with acid peaty soil, typically dominated by peat moss. <i>A bog of legal complications.</i>
fen	100 fen equal 1 yuan in China. <i>55 acres of fen.</i>
fenland	The Fens of eastern England. <i>Thousands of acres of fenland.</i>
marshland	Low-lying wet land with grassy vegetation; usually is a transition zone between land and water. <i>Thousands of acres of marshland.</i>
mire	A soft wet area of low-lying land that sinks underfoot. <i>Caught in the mire of poverty.</i>
morass	An area of muddy or boggy ground. <i>In midwinter the track beneath this bridge became a muddy morass.</i>
ngaio marsh	United States painter (1898-1954).

peat bog	Partially carbonized vegetable matter saturated with water; can be used as a fuel when dried.
quag	A soft wet area of low-lying land that sinks underfoot.
<u>quagmire</u>	A soft boggy area of land that gives way underfoot. <i>A legal quagmire.</i>
reginald marsh	New Zealand writer of detective stories (1899-1982).
slough	A hollow filled with mud. <i>The economic slough of the interwar years.</i>
sump	A cesspool.
<u>swamp</u>	An area of low-lying, uncultivated ground where water collects; a bog or marsh. <i>The ceaseless deluge had turned the lawn into a swamp.</i>
swampland	Land consisting of swamps. <i>Many had trekked through swampland to reach the border.</i>
wetland	A low area where the land is saturated with water. <i>The draining of British wetlands.</i>

marshland	Land consisting of marshes. <i>Marshland landscapes.</i>
marshy	Characteristic of or resembling a marsh; waterlogged. <i>A marshy coastline.</i>
mire	Cause to get stuck as if in a mire. <i>The mud mired our cart.</i>
morass	An area of muddy or boggy ground. <i>She would become lost in a morass of lies and explanations.</i>
mud	Soil with mud muck or mire. <i>The two sides took over the local media to throw mud at each other.</i>
quagmire	An awkward, complex, or hazardous situation. <i>Torrential rain turned the building site into a quagmire.</i>
quicksand	A pit filled with loose wet sand into which objects are sucked down. <i>It s best to travel with a local as there are quicksands.</i>
ravine	A deep, narrow gorge with steep sides.
riparian	Of or relating to or located on the banks of a river or stream. <i>All the riparian states must sign an agreement.</i>
shoal	Of fish form shoals. <i>Shoals of people were coming up the drive.</i>
slough	Cast off hair, skin, horn, or feathers. <i>The economic slough of the interwar years.</i>
sludge	The precipitate produced by sewage treatment. <i>A sludge green.</i>
soggy	Dull and lifeless. <i>We squelched through the soggy ground.</i>
splashing	The act of splashing a liquid substance on a surface.
swamp	Low land that is seasonally flooded; has more woody plants than a marsh and better drainage than a bog. <i>He was trapped in a medical swamp.</i>
swampy	Characteristic of or resembling a swamp. <i>Swampy bayous.</i>
vale	A valley (used in place names or as a poetic term). <i>The Vale of Glamorgan.</i>
valley	A low area of land between hills or mountains, typically with a river or stream flowing through it. <i>The valley floor.</i>

wet

Wetness caused by water.

A **wet** bathing suit.

wetland

A low area where the land is saturated with water.

Wetland habitats.
